373 BIRDS KLLED IN HUNT

The first Prairie Chicken season in thirty years was deemed a success by Dick De Arment, wildlife biologist for the Panhandle district. The total kill for the three county area was 373 birds. The majority of the kill was turned in Saturday of the two

World renouned authorities of Prairie Chicken and Grouse, Drs. Fred and Frances Hamerstrom of Plainfield, Wis., were present and helped the biologists identify the birds shot. Department personell collected the crops of the dead birds in order to further study the food habits of prairie chickens. Shinn-oak property owner was free to and acrons were found to be the main source of food

Approximately 18 game wardens patroled the three county area to check on hunters and their kill. There were three check points located in this area. They check points were at Higgins, Allison and Wheeler.

Mr. DeArment was not able to say whether or not this would be an annual event. This will be determined by the number of birds still inhabiting the area.

Veterans of Vietnam and all servicemen recently separated from active duty are reminded by Jack Coker, Man-dent authorizes flight trainager of the Waco Veterans Admini stration Regional Office ce of the right to apply for an individual life insurance policy within 120 days after separation from service. More than 99 percent of

the servicemen participate in the Servicemen's Group Life Insurance program and are eligible to convert to private insurance when they are discharged, Coker added. group policy for 120 days ter separation, without f ther payment of premiums.

During the 120 - day post - separation period any insured veteran may apply for an individual life insurance policy from any of the 540 participating insurance companies without taking a physical examination, the Manager said.

Because they are no longer paying premiums many returning veterans forget about their life insurance and fail to apply for individual insurance policies until after the 120-day period has expired, Coker said.

These veterans lose the advantage of becoming insured without a physical examination and, if they have a disability, may not be able to obtain private insurance at standard rates, the Manager cautioned.

Veterans who plan to take flight training under the new G.I. Bill benefit were cautioned today to check carefully into their eligibility before committing themselves for flight les sons.

By CARROLL WILSON CLARENDON - Visualize the land - an ocean of rolling, wide open prairie speckled with scrubby mesquite.

Now, visualize the lake it surrounds — blue, spring-fed and full of fish.

The land and the lake are realities, but some of the resiidents at Clarendon along with a young man from Austin visualize more - much more for their Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial reservoir. What they see in the future,

and what they are planning for as fast as they can, is a water playground unequaled on the almost water-starved plains. Even though the Greenbelt dam and reservoir were built to alleviate water shortages in Clarendon and for other area towns, recreation potential is almost unending, they say.

More than a year ago, the water authority board hired Marvin D. Springer and Associates, a Dallas city planning firm, to plan recreation and further development for the lake. "In general, what we an-

ticipate are maximum facilities for intense recreational use by the public," said Dr. George Smith, president of the Donley County Industrial Foundation. 'We anticipate everything the public would like to have from trash cans to marinas to trailer camping areas.

But, that's not all. Public beaches are in the plan, as well as swimming pools, riding stables, bridle paths and camp sites.

Yesterday's plans are already a reality at the lake. Only four miles north of Clarendon, the maximum depth of 88 feet of water, the static level lake now has a depth of about 37 feet.

With the transportation and preservation of today, there is no reason not too. Shrimp is a very well known seafood particularly in this area. The shrimp meat is all lean, low in calaries and rather popular with all age groups. Like all seafoods they're rich in protein, calcium, phosphorous and iodine. As a matter of fact, it is the main source of iodine besudes the iodized salt. Thelacks of this jodine over a period of time can cause goiter. Put shrimp in your diet.

Serve them plain - boiled with salt or a favorite spice, with rice butter rumb, cheese cream or curry treatment. They're delicious fried. breaded and broiled or served in a casserole.

Boiling is the basic method of cooking shrimp for cold serving. Shrimp should be cooked in enough salt water to cover them - 1 quart of water and two tsp. of salt per pound. Place shrimp in the boiling salt water. Let it resume to boiling, then remove and let it stand two to four minutes depending on

the size of the shrimp. SHRIMP CREOLE (serves 4 to 6)




