Briscoe For Governor Of Texas

We have come to a critical period in our state government. Sam Kinch, Jr., the Austin correspondent of the Dallas Morning News, and Dr. Ben Proctor have an authorative study of the Sharpstown scandal just off the press titled, "Texas Under A Cloud". This gives us a clear view of some of the questionable practices which have prevailed in our state government in Austin for, at least, the past three years. Without any implications or assumptions we can safely say that some odd coincidencies have occurred in our state affairs over that period, culminating in the trial in Abilene of Mutscher, Shannon and McGinty.

Whether or not any further developments will be forthcoming in the above scandal, we have no way of knowing, but we can assure ourselves of an all out effort for capable, honest government by electing Dolph Briscoe as our next governor. One may disagree with him on some issues - that is our inalienable right-, but no one can question his dedication or sincerity.

First prepare eggs by hard cooking (You may

shell if you wish) To hard cook eggs, cover them with water from the tap and bring just to boiling point in a neavy, covered saucepan. Set the pan off the heat and

let the eggs set for about 20 minutes in the hot water. To hurry the process, simmer (but don't boil) for 10 minutes. Immerse cooked eggs immediately in cold water.

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with eggs that don't have cracks and keep the dye warmer than the egg. If a warm egg is left in cool water, the dye may seep through the pores of the

shell. Brown shelled eggs color equally as well as white shelled eggs. Brown shells give bright, vivid colors; white shells are best for pastels.

To dye the eggs, wipe the shells throughly with a moist cloth, then allow them to dry. Eggs that have limey shells dye with tiny white spots.

Eggs dye best when they're hot or warm. Hot water dyes are also faster. Prepare the dye according to the manufacturer's instructions. A statement that the color is harmless

may be found on the package containing Easter egg dyes. Immerse the eggs until they become the desired color shade. Letthe eggs dry and decorate.

Speaking of eggs, I received several copies (enough for you to have one) of an article by Dr. Robert C. Atkins, a specialist in diet, nutrition, internal medicine and problems related to heart disease. He presents in this articld

his viewpoint on eggs in the American diet. He says, and supports with statistics, that the consumption of eggs is not the chief cause of high cholesterol level in the blood. He says the cause is too much sugar and carbohydrates. This is an interesting article. Call me if you're interested

in reading it.

You may want to use some of the Easter eggs in recipes, after the kids have had fun decorating, hiding and finding them. Here's one that's a little different. Remember to use them after a day or two at the most!



Across the Fence

ranchers are fidgetin' and putterin' about in anticipation of the heavy calving deal. This time of year our minds wander from one thing to another just like an ole cow rushing over the range in early spring grasping for a green tuft of grass here and yonder. If we don't get moisture

soon, our farmers and ranchers may be shopping for the new bicycle with no seat and ho handlebars that the NFO newsletter was advertising last week. They report that the new bicycle is for farmers who have lost their behinds and don't know which way to turn.

When you plant roses, place the bud union slightly below the soil level to protect it from a severe winter. A mound of soil about 6 inches high around the canes will also protect the canes from drying winds and sun until the roots have a chance to grow. When growth is well started. remove this mound.

Time is approaching when Shin Oak (Quercus havardi) poisoning in cattle may become a problem. This particular type of poisoning has been a problem to us during early April in past years. Total annual losses in livestock from Shin Oak has been estimated to be more than \$10 million in Texas alone. The shin oak plant is very palatable and toxic when it first buds in spring. The blossoms, buds, leaves and stems are all toxic. The time of budding depends on the temperature and this has been an early spring Ordinarily it occurs in late March.

A good supplementary feed will reduce livestock losses due to oak poisoning, but will not always prevent intoxication. A supplementary feed containing calcium hydroxide is more effective. A feed formula that incorporates calcium hydroxide, that is palatable and economically feasible is as follows: Lbs Ingredients

ground alfalfa cottonseed meal (41%) 1080 120 vegetable oil Calcium hydroxide 200

Calves can be creep fed and cows should be fed at the rate of four pounds of the formula daily.

This is an open formula and can be mixed by the owner or any commercial feed producer. This feed is available from Godbald Inc., Lubbock, Texas and possibly from other feed producers.


