Over 100 entries have been accepted for this year's show which is annually sponsored by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce. The Production Credit Association furnishes ribbons and trophies. Weighing of show entries will begin at 7:00 a.m., Saturday morning under the water tower in Wheeler. Judging of barrows and gilts will begin at 10:00 a.m. The official show judge is Bob Robinson, assistant County Extension Agent for Potter County who judged last year's show. James Verden is Superintendent of the County Show.

The annual 4-H and FFA Pig Sale will get underway at 3:00 p.m. at the City Fire Station on Saturday afternoon. Shelby Pettit will be the official auctioneer. Charlie Brown, President of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce, is Auction Committee Chairman. Ground and facilities chairman is Terry McCasland, Wheeler FFA Chapter Advisor

As a Western Artist he will be featured during the month of April at the Grand Central Galleries in New York; the first artist in the Southwest to be featured. Wyatt is the only Western Artist with paintings exhibited in the U.S. Steel private collection in Chicago.

After a very entertaining speech, Wyatt left the group with the thought, "You are the only one who can help your community", he urged those present to begin the day with a smile at home and greet your co-workers and customers with a smile throughout the day."

A Letter from E. T. Zybach

Feb. 8, '73
Las Cruces, N.M.

Owing to the fact that I am recuperating after a siege of complicated illnesses, I will try to tell in my humble and uneducated manner of this wonderful climate near the old Mexico border in New Mexico state.

How well I remember being in eastern New Mexico state in 1919 just a young fellow then. I went west to California and Oregon and said I didn't even want my picture hanging up in New Mexico.

Today I am here in person and would you believe it - the prettiest snow I ever saw is falling. I've been here three weeks today and this is the second snow. In talking to people I tell them dry weather is our worst enemy and I believe I am right about that.

In January 1911 four or five fellows met at the Old Zybach store to see if there was a possibility of establishing a post office at that place.

J. G. Brown, W.H. Brown, C.W. Helton and my father Fritz Zybach and possibly others were there and a number of names were suggested and someone said write Zybach. The list was sent to Washington D.C.I and to the surprise of most everyone it was Zybach.

The post office discontinued in 1937, since Allison and Briscoe were on the new Santa Fe Railroad.

About Jan. 1911 Bro. John Zybach had a general merchandise store at that place with the post office in one corner - pinto beans by the barrel, cheese on the counter with butcher knife not sanitarily wrapped like now - even a nasty cigar has to be sanitarily wrapped now days - times change.

One winter-like night about 8 o'clock the sheriff phoned and said a team of horses, harness and buggy was stolen north of Canadian. The sheriff told John on the phone to look for the two fellows and if you suspect them there is \$150 reward. In a short time two fellows came in the store, spent a little money and started east toward Oklahoma. John Zybach called J. G. Brown and he, being constable, knew about the reward and he and son, Fred Brown, went on horseback to catch up with the two fellows and each had rifles and told them to turn back toward the store and that they were under arrest. GENERAL TELEPHONE TO UPGRADE SERVICES

General Telephone Company of the Southwest will spend \$117.4 million during 1973 to add, expand or upgrade tele. hone service in 405 exchanges in four states, according to L. Gray Beck, president.

The 1973 construction budget is \$13.4 million or 12.9 per cent higher than the 1972 budget.

The expenditures planned during the year include providing 1 Plus Dialing to 38 exchanges and 1 Plus and 0 plus dialing to 4 exchanges.

Beck pointed out the largest portion of the construction expenditures is \$39 million for central office equipment. This includes equipment expansions in existing offices, equipment additions that automatically ticket long distance calls and check the accuracy of the dialed digits, expansion of toll facilities, equipment to provide Extended Area Service (EAS) and office replacements.

The company president said this also includes \$5.7 million to replace mechanical offices with the faster and more efficient electronic equipment.

An other major construction budget area is for facilities located outside the central offices or outside plant facilities. This portion of the budget is \$33.7 million and includes \$9.9 million to meet forecasted growth, \$2.9 million to provide additions to existing toll and/or

EAS facilities, \$4.4 million to cover rural zoning and upgrading rural line service from eight-party to four-party or better and \$5.5 million for conduit projects to growth areas.

The land and buildings section of the budget is \$7.6 million. It includes three land purchases to expand existing central offices or for new buildings. During 1973, General Telephone will complete four new central office buildings while starting three. Thirty-three building additions will be completed and two will be started.

Other items totaling \$37.1 million are included in the construction budget. These outlays will be for private automatic branch exchange (PABX) equipment, telephones, labor and materials to connect the customer's telephone to service lines, vehicles, furniture and fixtures, and tools and work equipment.

Beck said a gain of 80,000 telephones is expected during 1973, bringing the estimated year-end total to 1,051,897. The number of employees is expected to increase by 675.

J.H. Davis, Division Manager, stated that the Memphis Division will spend about \$478,500, which includes funds in Abernathy for additional central office equipment and cable to provide for growth within the city.

Across the Fence

BY MAX HATTER, CEA
A number of folks have been asking when spring seeded small grains should be planted in our county. Actually, seeding of small grain crops such as wheat, oats and barley is not recommended unless the fall-sown crop is winter killed. However, if spring seeding is necessary, the grains should be planted from about Feb. 20 to March 15 in our area. Lack of rainfall, high winds, cold fronts and late freezes may damage young small grain crops. If moisture conditions are favorable or if irrigation water is available, spring seeded small grains can produce good crops.

We have a limited number of a recent Internal Revenue Service publications called "Highlights of 1972 Changes in the Tax Law". If anyone needs a copy of this for filling your income tax, let us know.

There was an article in the March 1973 issue of Progressive Farmer Magazine entitled "You can Winter Cows on Standing Lovegrass". This article contained some of the material from research demonstration work done in Wheeler County.

Home vegetable gardening offers excellent opportunities for cooperative family activity. It gives the family a chance to do something together. And what better way to boost family harmony than to share a meal together which features fresh, nutritious homegrown vegetables.

Gardening can offer other thrills too, like growing a vegetable that none near you grows or having the first peas or beans of any garden on the block.

March 1 is drawing near as the deadline for farmers to file their 1972 income tax returns.

To be considered a farmer, two-thirds of your gross income must come from the sale of agricultural products. Although you may not have to pay income tax this year due to various reasons, you must still file a Schedule F if you had any income from farming.

To pay any income tax, a net farm profit must have been realized. If this was the case, the same exemptions and deductions that apply to any other individual can be used in determining income tax.

Married persons filing joint returns for 1972 will not have to pay any tax if their income was less than \$2,800. They will still need to file a Schedule F, however.

For Social Security purposes, farmers may need to file a Self employment return. This return can be filed on either the net or gross farm income if the net income was less than \$1,600.00

More detailed information on filing income tax returns is available at the county Extension office. A copy of the "Farmer's Tax Guide" is available and can be a valuable tool in assisting farmers and ranchers in preparing an accurate and complete return.


