Please mark this date on your calendar and make plans to support the local chapter of the American Cancer Society. Donations will be accepted in place of admissions.



We saw Olin Nabors, Howard and Helen Metcalf, Mahota Stamper, Iva Thompson, Clella Myers, and Buck Tipton in town.





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# FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

## OCTOBER 9-15, 1988

### Governor Proclaims Fire Prevention Week

Citing the tragic loss of lives and property from fire each year in Texas, Governor William P. Clements, Jr., today proclaims the week of October 9-15, 1988, as Fire Prevention Week. "Fire continues to be a major threat to all our citizens, particularly the young and the old," Governor Clements said. Fires in Texas killed 322 people, injured more than 2,000 and destroyed in excess of \$300 million in property during 1987, the governor noted.

"Much of this tragic loss could have been prevented," the governor said. "We have the knowledge and technology today to prevent much of the needless loss of lives and property in this state and we urge every Texas citizen to practice fire prevention every day in an effort to conserve our valuable Texas resources." This year marks the 66th anniversary of National Fire Prevention Week. The week-long observance was first established in 1922 by President Warren Harding in memory of the so-called "Great Chicago Fire" of October 9, 1871.

That conflagration killed 250 people and destroyed 17,430 buildings at a cost of \$168 million. People began thinking in terms of fire prevention in addition to fire fighting as a result of this fire.

### Fire Prevention GUIDELINES

The State Board of Insurance, State Fire Marshall's Office offer the following guidelines for practicing fire prevention in the home:

1. Make sure that heating and cooking appliances are properly installed and used according to instruction.
2. Do not use gasoline or flammable liquids for cleaning in the home. Do not use them to start or freshen a fire for heating or cooking.
3. Provide proper ventilation for portable gas and oil heaters or fire places.
4. Do not smoke in bed.
5. Before going to bed, check upholstered furniture to ensure that smoking materials are not lodged in the furniture.
6. Dispose of smoking materials safely. Store them out-of-doors in a metal container and immerse them with water to make sure that they are completely out.
7. Keep matches and lighters away from small children.
8. Make sure that all electrical cords

are safe. Electrical cords should not be placed under rugs, over hooks, in door openings or other traffic paths. Check cords routinely for wear. Do not puncture cords with tacks, nails or other sharp objects and do not use cords which appear to be cracked, pinched, punctured or otherwise damaged. Electric cords that are worn or damaged should be disconnected and immediately disposed of.

9. Use only the correct size fuses in fuse boxes.  
10. Keep basement, closets, attic and garage cleared of combustibles such as papers, cartons, old furniture, clothes or oil soaked rags.  
11. Store gasoline and other flammable liquids in closed containers away from heat, sparks and children, preferably away from the house. Never store flammable liquids in glass jugs, old bleach bottles or makeshift containers.

12. Keep paint stored in closed metal containers and discard of paint-laden brushes.  
13. Furnaces, stoves and stove pipes should be kept well away from combustible walls and ceilings. These appliances should be installed and maintained by qualified service people.

14. Heating equipment should be checked yearly by a qualified service person.

15. Do not overload electrical circuits with too many appliances.

16. When adding electrical wiring or appliances, have a qualified electrician do the installation.

17. Only special circuits should be used for heavy-duty appliances such as air conditioners.

18. Use only appliances that carry the seal of a nationally recognized testing laboratory.  
19. Plan ahead.

a. Purchase a smoke detector with a nationally recognized testing laboratory label and install one or more at least outside the sleeping areas of your home. Check your detectors every week to make sure that they work properly. Clean the detectors according to manufacturers instructions. If detectors are battery powered, put in new batteries at least yearly.

b. Determine at least two means of escape from each bedroom. One will be the normal exit from the house or apartment. The other can be a window or a second door between bedrooms. Consider installing an escape ladder from windows.

c. Draw a floor plan to indicate the location of doors, windows, stairs and roof tops that can be used for escape. Always keep escape routes free from obstructions.


d. Agree on a warning device to be used when a fire is discovered. Set a meeting place outdoors for a head count of occupants.

e. Practice escape procedures:  
—Sleep with your bedroom door closed. It could increase escape time.  
—If you suspect fire, test the door. If it is hot, do not open it because the area on the other side of the door is too hot to enter safely.

If a chimney fire occurs in your home, first place a "Chimfex Extinguisher" directly in appliance, then call the fire department for verification of extinguishment.

The "Chimfex Extinguishers" cost \$5.00 each.

—If you think it is safe, brace your shoulder against the door and open it cautiously. Be ready to slam the door if heat or smoke rush in.  
—Practice escaping and meeting outdoors at an assigned spot.  
—In case of fire, call the fire department from a neighbor's phone.

Due to increased acreage in grass in Wheeler County this year, extreme caution should be used when burning off pasture lands.

Please notify the Wheeler Sheriff's Office or the Shamrock Police Department prior to starting an intentional burn.

This will eliminate unnecessary false alarms for county fire departments.





**From the Minister's Desk:**  
 On a stormy night in 1860, a steamboat was rammed by a lumber schooner on Lake Michigan and sank. Two hundred and seventy-nine of the three hundred and ninety-three passengers, who were on the steamboat, drowned.

The hero of this tragedy was a young man, Edward Spencer. This young man plunged into the cold water of the lake and rescued—one by one—seventeen people. But the physical strain on this young man, confined him to a wheel chair for life.

On his twentieth birthday this young hero was asked to tell his vivid memory of the tragedy. And his reply was: "Not one of the seventeen ever thanked me."

It is a familiar story. In His ministry, Jesus was once confronted by ten lepers who said: "Jesus, Master, have mercy of us." (Luke 17:13). Jesus told them to go and show themselves to the priests. (Verse 14) And the text says: "—As they went they were cleansed." (Verse 15) Imagine the feelings of these lepers. They were suddenly and miraculously cured of a dreaded disease. But what was their reaction?

The text says: "Now one of the, when he saw that he had been healed, turned back, glorifying God with a loud voice, and he fell on his face at His feet, giving thanks to Him. And he was a Samaritan." (Verse 16) Then the text says: "And Jesus answered and said, 'Were there not ten cleansed? But the nine -- where are they?'" (Verse 19)

Ten lepers were healed. But only one expressed gratitude. Is the percentage any better with you and me? While we have not been healed of leprosy, we have been blessed. But are we grateful?

It appears that many of us are ungrateful people. And since we are, there are several observations that are relevant. These observations are:

1. Gratitude is a key element in a relationship with God and other people. The Apostle Paul stated

that prayer should be characterized by "—thanksgiving—" (Philippians 4:5). And gratitude should also characterize the relationship that Christians have with other people. Christians are saved by the grace of God. (Ephesians 2:8-9) Their salvation is the free gift of God which Christians have through an obedient faith. (Romans 1:1-7, 5:12-21) For this reason, Christians are gracious to other people, urging them to accept by an obedient faith the free gift of God. The Apostle Paul said: "Let your speech always be with grace, seasoned, as it were, with salt, so that you may know you should respond to each person." (Colossians 4:6) Genuine Christianity is characterized by gratitude.

2. Gratitude is a virtue that must be controlled. It should be treated like perfume. We should like it, but not drink it. The purpose of Christianity is to glorify God and this purpose is warped when Christians are overly concerned with self gratification. (Matthew 5:17, Colossians 3:17) It is imperative that Christians control their desire for gratitude.

3. Gratitude is expected, but it is not demanded. Jesus healed ten lepers and only one returned to thank Him. Jesus was obviously disappointed. Yet there is no Biblical evidence that Jesus refused to heal the other lepers because these nine lepers were not grateful. Like Jesus, Christians will not allow the ingratitude of people to nullify their good works. We will be deeply concerned about God's reward, believing that His reward is more important than the gratitude of other people.

Gratitude is a neglected virtue. Edward Spencer and Jesus Christ experienced its neglect. And so will we. May we resolve that we will always be grateful. And may we resolve that we will always glorify and serve God, whether other people are grateful or not.

### A Return To A

Dressier Look Menswear and Boyswear Typify Classic Lines

Fall styles for men and boys indicate a dressier approach than in season's past. Refinement is in. Sportswear for men now means softly cut jackets with matching pants. Nubby Cardigans are the alternative, worn with mock turtle necks or shirts with small patterns. The eclectic look has given way to fluid classic lines, according to reports received by The Soap and Detergent Association. And so the lines between the sexes are blurred. It's hard to tell the difference between silhouettes or the kind of clothes worn.

To fit the dressier, more sophisticated mood, men's fashion colors are moderately toned down. Neutrals such as brown and caramel are basic. So are black, navy, grey and white. Dark hues are deep jeweled, not blackened. Brights are rich, not startling. Pastels are soft and pale, midtones are muted. Berries and fuchsias show the way to the future.

Sport shirts appear in colorful fine-combed cottons that look dressy and expensive. The shirts are often printed with tartans or stripes that are spaced widely apart. Rich colors are offset by black accents. Greens and reds are often seen in shirt prints. Purple and violet are sometimes combined with green tones.

Wool suits are lightweight, and often have plaid patterns. These plaids are fairly large, yet the look is classic because colors are well blended this season. Vibrant hues are used sparingly, while medium tones and darks give suits dressy flair.

The wool used for tailored jackets, however, is spiced with brightly colored accents reminiscent of autumn. Teal, red and mallard are key colors, as are plum, grape and the various greens found in forests. Warm reds and golden wheat have become base colors. The new jacket prints are outdoor classics and include such designs as plaids, windowpanes and the sort of checks that woodsman wear. These striking patterns are refined, however, because they appear on fine smooth fabrics.

The light-toned whitened denims are far less popular this year. The alternative is darker shades of indigo appearing as deep rich blues after stonewashing. Sometimes, the stonewashing is done in such a way as to give denim a pebbly textured quality. The new denims and other heavy cottons have a more comfortable cottony feel with a softer and more natural laundered look. Boyswear, too, is being designed to show off a put-together silhouette. The trend is towards a more elegant, conservative and sophisticated look. The crested/heraldic look is often seen in back-to-school wear.

Boy's pants are cut narrow at the hips and full along the leg. At the ankle, they narrow again, and the look is accentuated by small cuffs, blazers have wide lapels, cut wide across the shoulders and chest, and narrow at the hip. The overall effect of this combination is an interesting curving silhouette that emphasizes a boy's form, yet is relaxed. In keeping with this style, shirts are not as baggy as they were last year but slightly tucked at the waist.

In casual wear, roomy sweatshirts and pants are in. Denims include some acid-wash, black and dark indigo. In general, colors are more true blue than washed out. This playwear is fun even if it is neat and somewhat preppy. Varsity accents are popular for schoolwear.

Top colors include blue and green as well as sophisticated combinations of white, red and black. Another dynamic color mix is red, royal and kelly. Black and Ecru combinations are also strong. Tartan trims are popular as well.

Fabrics for boyswear include such basics as corduroy, cotton twill, polyester/rayon and polyester/wool. Patterns and textures are important, the favorites being plaids, checks, and stripes, tweeds and twisted twills.


