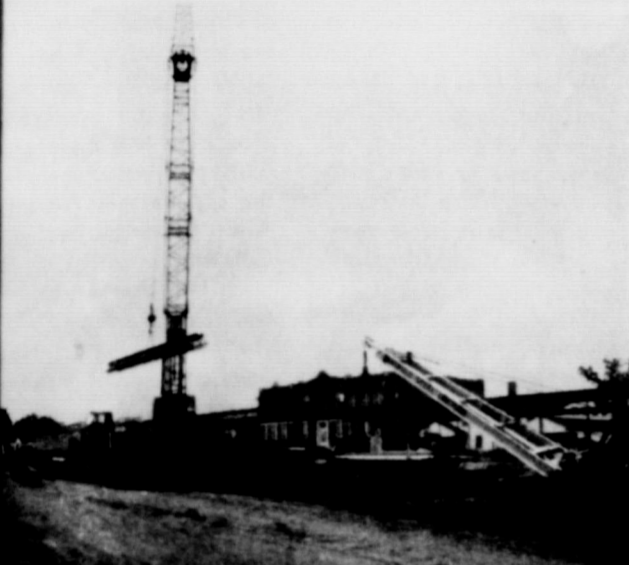

NUMBER OF COMMERCE PRESIDENT REPORTS:

SWEETWATER CREEK DAM NEARS REALITY



Sweetwater Creek Dam was the subject of discussion at the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce meeting held Tuesday evening at Nora's.

President, Jim Wright presided at the meeting. He reported having discussed the Dam project with Fred Parkey, of the Red River Authority in Wichita Falls Tuesday afternoon. At that time it

was learned that part of the \$4.2 million will be obtained through the Texas Water development board and the Red River Authority is making an effort to obtain the rest of the money with a grant from E.D.A. (Economic Development Administration.)

Mr. Parkey reports that the Texas - Oklahoma - Louisiana Pact would not affect the reservoir. It had been

feared that the three state pact would limit the amount of water which would be stored in the reservoir.

Construction could begin before the end of the year. Mr. Parkey reports with the way things are progressing, there is a possibility the actual construction could get underway before the end of the year.

Dr. Paul Stewart member of the Park Beautification Board, reported on progress being made by his committee. The committee had some \$1100 with which to work. The park has been cleaned up with several of the trees removed. New picnic tables have been added and play ground equipment has been repainted. With the remaining \$700, the group hopes to

build some type of shed and possibly a barbecue pit.

The funds for the project were obtained from the Chamber of Commerce, City of Wheeler and a Volleyball tournament. The Chamber gave \$500, the City gave \$400 and \$200 was netted through the tournament.

Jim Kelly, minister of the Church of Christ, was a guest

of the Chamber at Tuesday's meeting. Mrs. Thomas Daugherty was in attendance with her husband at the meeting.

In the absence of Betty Risner, who is recovering at home from illness, Mrs. Laura Guthrie served as secretary.

The meeting was adjourned until the July meeting which will be July 18.

WHEELER CO. MUSEUM OPENS



The Wheeler County Historical Society met in the Commissioners Courtroom with Mrs. Grady Harris presiding at the meeting. The group set July 1 to begin receiving items to be placed in the museum to be located in the Old Jail on the courthouse square.

The name for the museum was decided by the group. The museum which will be open Monday, Wednesday and Fridays will operate under the name "Wheeler County Historical Museum." The group plans to keep the museum open on Sunday at a later date.

The office will be furnished in the room formerly occupied by the Justice of the Peace. The other rooms will be located up stairs.

Hospital Approved By For Medicare

Parkview Hospital has met the necessary requirements set forth by the Social Security Administration to provide medical care under Part A of Title XVIII of the Social Security Act effective July 1, 1966.

Most people 65 and over in Wheeler County have already received their Medicare handbook and their red, white and blue health insurance identification cards. Identification cards were mailed first to those signed up for both the hospital insurance and the voluntary medical insurance. Anyone who signed up for Medicare, but has not received his identification card by the end of the 2nd week in July, should inquire at the social security office. If a person must go to a hospital before he has received his health insurance identification card the hospital will arrange to check his eligibility.

There are new books on the shelves besides the gifts. Please let us help you with your reading problems.

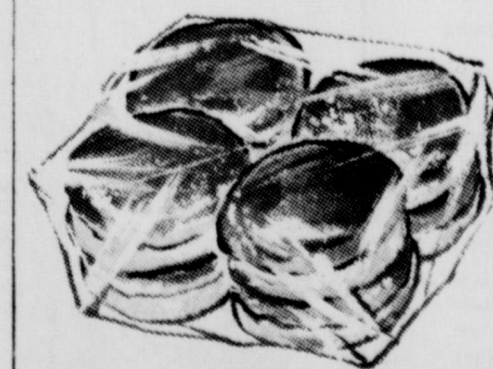
