

with good producing ability are the profit markers. Performance and record keeping seemed to be the theme of the tour. I was surprised to see so many commercial ranchers keepng performance records on their herds. The commercial men wanted planty of size and stretch on their bulls. They wanted bulls with a high weight per day of age, of course this will reflect a high weaning weight and a high rate of gain when tested, law Mrs. Leroy Hudson, They prefer using bulls in that area that they can breed to their cows which

weigh 875#-1100# and wean calves at 500#-550# at seven months of age that would grade choice and fancy. Many of these ranchers they receive the proper rainfall. Most commercial ranchers wanted a bull that would weigh 1500 lbs. and up when grown. One rancher commented that he certainly wanted a bull larger than his cows.

Alis not bright on the cattle front as was pointed out by Joe S. Fletcher, General manager, Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association of Ft. Worth. He pointed out that the shift in population from rural to urban and by having less representation in government was certainly not for the betterment of agriculture. He pointed out that taxes could be the downfall of the cattle industry. Already one county in the state of Texas has its property tax set at above \$7.00 per animal unit. 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
