RODEO, BARBECUE ARE DEEMED SUCCESSFUL

Wheeler Merchants Serve Barbecue To 2,000 People

Two thousand people were served barbecue Thursday night, the first night of the 12th annual Wheeler Riding Club Rodeo. The huge success of the parade barbecue and rodeo was the result of the combined efforts of the Riding Club, Chamber of Commerce and a host of willing other workers.

The afternoon parade, the largest in several years, formed a block east of the

stop light. The parade went down main street and turned to pass in front of Parkview hospital. Mayor Don Earney and Rev. Dale Cain served as announcers for the parade of seven riding clubs - the Reydon Wagon Train, Pampa Trail Riders, Bus Walker's Covered Wagon, a clown and two commercial floats. Placing in the riding club division were Elk City, first; Little Wranglers of Sayre, second and Reydon Rangers, third. The Reydon Wagon Train took home the first place trophy with the Pampa Trail Riders being awarded a second place trophy.

In the commercial division Quinton Jenkins with his Belgian horses took first place honors and Bob Willson's "Wheeler Dealers" Fuller Brush Wagon was given the second place honors.

The serving of barbecue by Chamber of Commerce members began at 6:00. The 2000 who went through the line received generous helpings of barbecue, sauce, beans, pickles, onions, apple sauce, bread and coffee, iced tea or Cokes.

The merchants in Wheeler, as they have done for nine years, furnished the food for the barbecue. Required for the feed were 1502 lbs. of beef of which 1400

lbs were served. Mrs. J.B. Ogleby with the aid of Mrs. Lorene Waggon prepared 150 lbs. of pinto beans. Trimmings required for the feed were 32 gal. of apple sauce, 15 gal. of pickles, 11 gal. barbecue sauce and 80 lbs. of onions, 2 lbs. coffee and 2 lbs. instant tea.

As they have done in the past, Meads Fine Bread, Earl Jolly, distributor, furnished the bread for the feed. Two thousand miniature loaves and 8 large loaves were required to feed the large crowd.

Coca Cola Bottling Co. of Shamrock was on hand furnishing free Cokes, Sprite or Orange to all in attendance at the barbecue.

Dan Luttrell furnished a milk truck filled with water for use at the barbecue.

The Wheeler Riding Club extends their thanks to all who made donations and worked with the preparing and serving of the barbecue.

K. D. Ford was recognized for hauling stock water and soaking the parking areas and rodeo arena to keep down the dust. Wheeler Lumber Co. again furnished the truck for the speakers stand. Rev. Dale Cain, Rev. Wilbur Goede and Rev. C. M. Abercrombie offered the invocations.

Red Meadows, E. J. Meadows, Floyd Davidson and Truman Bradstreet handled the stripping shutes.

Sheriff Bus Dorman, Deputy Doyle Ramsey and Deputy Don Copeland did an excellent job of policia activities.

Chamber of Commerce President Jim Wright was well pleased with the turnout of helpers in the serving of the barbecue. He stated that a list was impossible due to the number who helped.

The Wheeler Riding Club is to be commended for the excellent job of organizing and putting on the rodeo and barbecue. Officers bearing the brunt of the load were: Loyd Davidson, President, Milton Liles, vice-president, Fat Jones, secretary and Pete Burton, treasurer. Parade Marshals were Earn Barnes and Russell Hull, Directors were Owen Jones, Bus Walker, Bob Hutchison, Russell Hull and Earl Barnes.

More Information On Blood Drive

A plea to Americans planning their vacations to include a blood donation in their preparations was issued today by the American Red Cross.

Pointing out that "accidents and illness never take a holiday," Dr. Tibor J. Greenwalt, medical director of the Red Cross Blood Program, said that blood donations invariably dwindle to their lowest point in the summertime, while the need for blood, mainly due to summer highway accidents, frequently increases.

Basing his estimate on the July August accident rates of other years, Dr. Greenwalt said that motor vehicle fatalities in the two-month period are expected to be around 9,000, "with disabling injuries, many of them requiring immediate blood transfusions, correspondingly high."

In this current fiscal year, daily blood collections for civilians by the American Red Cross ranged from a low of 9,074 last July to a high of 13,633 in April of this year.

"The solution is for all healthy Americans between the ages of 18 and 60 to donate blood to the Red Cross or their community Blood Bank before leaving for their vacations," Dr. Greenwalt said. "It will be for their own protection as well as for others."

Many U.S. citizens will spend their vacations in Canada this summer to attend Expo 67. In case American tourists are ill or injured while in Canada, their blood needs will be met by the Canadian Red Cross Transfusion Service, sole source of blood in that country. The ARC, reciprocally, meets the needs of Canadians who fall ill or become injured while in the United States.

From July 1, 1966, through April 30, 1967, the American Red Cross Collected 2,460,800 units of blood. May and June collections are expected to bring the total for the fiscal year to near the 3,000,000 mark.

In March 1964 an earthquake created havoc in Alaska. Persons given mass care totaled 11,900 families were assisted to recover, approximate expenditure by the Red Cross was \$1,309,200.

There will be a blood bank drawing here August 9 from 9:00 to 1:00.

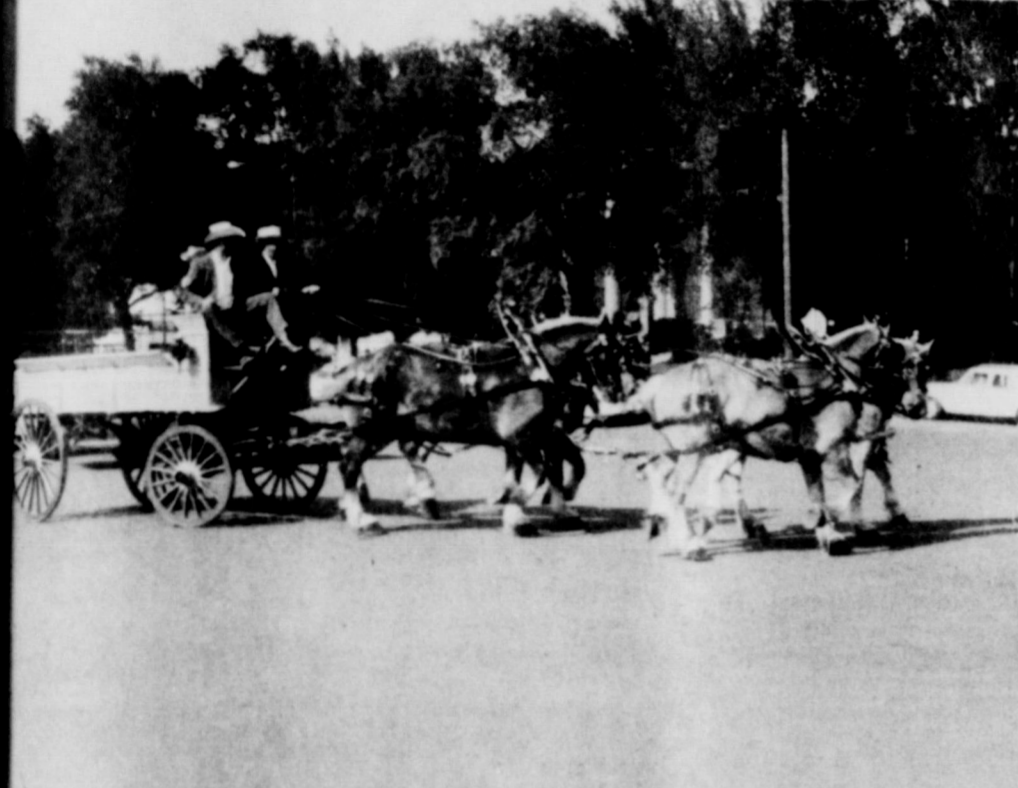

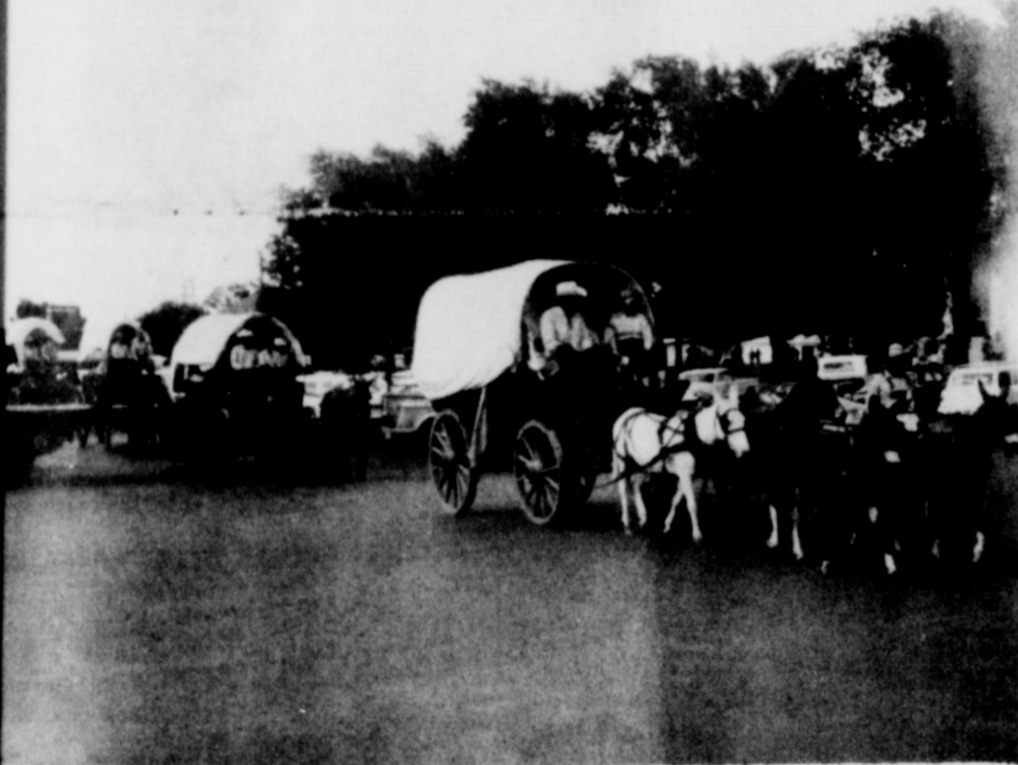

TOP TEXAS RODEO DATES GIVEN; JUDY LYNN STARS

The twenty-third annual Top O' Texas Rodeo, featuring the Judy Lynn Show, is scheduled in Pampa July 29.

Judy Lynn and her eight-piece band will entertain at rodeo performances and dancing in the National Guard Armory building Wednesday through Saturday.

The Judy Lynn Show has been popular for several years at all of the major rodeos throughout the nation.

It is currently playing at the Gold Nugget in Las Vegas.

The street parade at 4:00 p.m. on Wednesday, July 1, and Wednesday, July 26.

Get the rodeo underway, with eight performances scheduled at 8:00 p.m.

Butler Bros., of Elk City, Okla., will furnish the stock and direct the arena.

All of the regular RCA events will be included.

Prize of \$3,800, plus all entry fees, will attract the cowboys of the rodeo circuit.

A special prize of \$500 will be offered the All-around cowboy.

By Tallon, popular rodeo announcer of Denver, Colo., will describe all events.

Years of work as a rodeo announcer have made it unnecessary for him to carry any written file. He

can call every cowboy by his first name and tell you his rodeo record.

Another special feature of this year's rodeo will be a "Bloodless Bull Fight" with Larry McKinney fighting real Mexican fighting bulls. This act has been popular in many of the large rodeos throughout the world, but this is the first appearance in this particular area for the event.

A miniature rodeo for children ages 5 through 15 will be held Tuesday, July 25, prior to the opening of the big rodeo.

We soils prevented county farmers from getting into cotton and milo fields until the latter part of the week. The grass and weeds did not grow so well. It might take a little more hoeing bill than was formerly anticipated. Saw a planting of soybeans a few days ago on land south of Carleton's store at Twitty. Stevens invites any farmers in the county to come by and take a look. We understand some of the gins in the county have facilities for processing the beans. Cotton that wasn't damaged too much by hail and high winds is growing fast. We've seen some approaching the bloom stage with insects not being a problem. However, if we get more rain, we look for insects to get started.

DID YOU KNOW???
THAT farmers produced one sixth more crops this past year than they did in 1965 on a seventh less acreage.

THAT Farmers work an average of fifty hours a week while factory workers average 40 hours.

THAT Americans spend only 18cents out of their take home dollar for food-with farmers realizing only 40 cents out of the food dollar's cost. (the rest goes to build in processing and marketing services.)

THAT each dollar spent in commodity programs raised the farmer's income \$2.36. Without these programs farm income would be cut one-third.

LAWNS - We've noticed some lawns in Wheeler County area with irregular shaped dead areas from a few inches to more than several feet in diameter with a few sprigs of live grass left among the dead. And we've had confirmation from our Plant Pathologist at Texas A & M that several samples we submitted from lawns here have a very heavy infestation of the "fading out" organism. The organism, a fungus, seems to be more infectious when the grass is under a drought stress or a stress due to some nutritional deficiencies in the soil. Two or three applications of a recommended fungicide will control it. Mowing the grass only when its dry would help also.

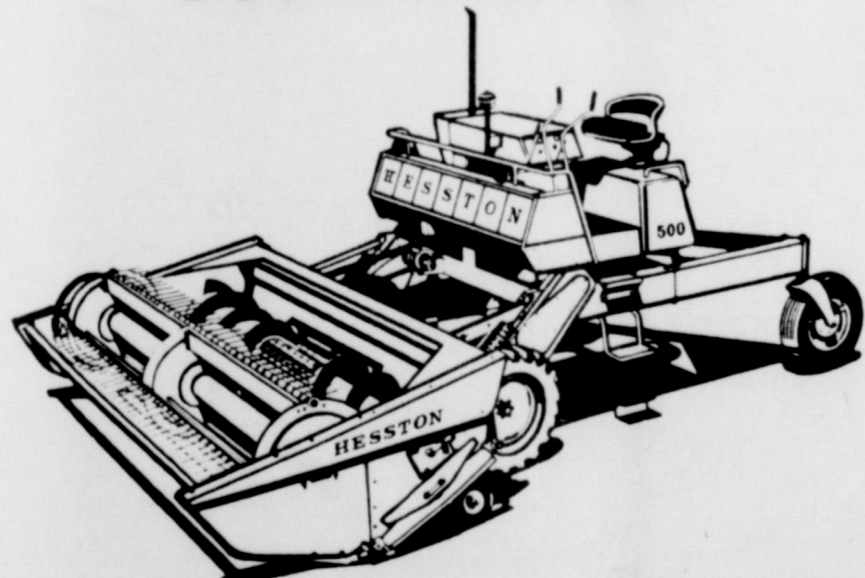
