New Eyesight Device Shown To Surgeons

CLEVELAND, Dec. 19. (AP)- A new eyesight device by which a person can chart the picture that forms on his own retina, the screen at the back of the eyeball, was shown to the American College of Surgeons today by Dr. William P. Williamson of the University of Kansas school of medicine.

Dr. Russell Meyers of Iowa City, State University of Iowa college of medicine, reported that lives formerly despaired of as the result of accidents that are equivalent to severing the brain from the rest of the body, can be saved by surgery and medical treatment. This trouble is called decerebration. It is due, he said, to clots forming near the base of the brain. He told of 28 such cases, some in the late war, of which 13 lived. Those who lived, however, had nervous troubles afterward, and a few of them either were demented or had spastic paralysis.

Clouds Obscure A Show By Planets

DALLAS, Dec. 19. (AP)—Over-cast skies early today foiled astronomers in the Dallas area when a rare celestial show of the lining up of the moon and the planets Venus and Jupiter were obscured

The juxtaposed heavenly bodies were supposed to have been lined up about 40 degrees above the southeastern horizon just before dawn at approximately 4:30 a. m.

Walter L. Oliver, Dallas astronomer, said "it would have been a good show" except for obscur-ing clouds. Since the frequency of an alignment of these three bodies of the great magnitude is punctuated by centuries rather than years, Oliver said "one of us will live to see it come again."







Our neighboring county to the east passed just as far out of the dairying pic-ture as Howard county did during the war, maybe farther. However, milk production on a commercial basis started a comeback there, and according to current information, the Mitchell county men involved have made thorough investigations into the requisites of good dairies and plan to enter the dairying field with a serious effort.

They are investing in register-ed dairy cows and registered dairy bulls, which, production statistics show, are essential to realization of maximum returns. Ted O. Roensch, the genial agricultural agent in Mitchell county, is encouraging these efforts to build up dairying, and he has some plans of his own. 
