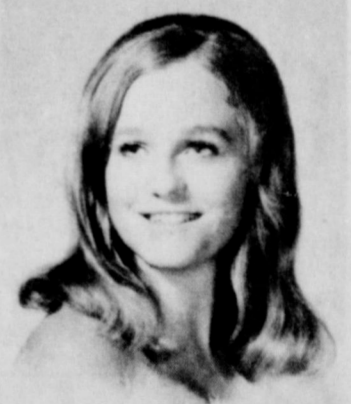
Mr. Hutchison passed away Sunday, March 12, 1972 in the Shamrock Gen. Hospital after a sudden heart attack.

He was born in Hugo, Oklahoma Sept. 15, 1913 to Mr. and Mrs. Ballard Hutchison.

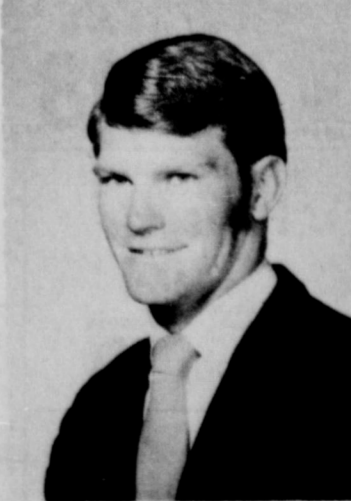
On August 21, 1939 he was married to Opal Anglin in Wheeler. He had lived in Wheeler since 1929 and was a long time employee of Wheeler County.

WHOLE NEW LOOK: The Courthouse square took on a whole new look Thursday as county employees under- took the task of removing 16 of the trees which were planted over 40 years ago.

Sixteen Chinese Elms had to be removed because of insects. The insects not only eventually kill the trees, but move into buildings and cause damage.

The American elms located at the side of the court- house were left.

The Commissioners Court plans to replace the trees which were removed. They have discussed the possibility of planting pecan trees.

According to J.W. Hooker, a resident of Wheeler since Feb. 15, 1906, three sets of trees have surrounded the courthouse. First to be planted were honey locus; these were removed because of the long thorns.

In discussing the length of time the trees had been in the square, Commissioner Shorty Sechrist recalled passing through Wheeler at the age of 15 when the present courthouse was fairly new in 1928. Sechrist said he remembered the square looking bare at the time and could not recall trees.

Nice Ware Is on Deans List

Nice Ware, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. N.D. Ware, Jr. of Wheeler is listed among students in the College Education at Texas Tech University qualified for the year's honor list for the fall semester, according to Dean Gordon C. Lee.

To qualify for the honor list, a student must be enrolled in 12 semester hours courses, excluding pass- courses, and have at least a 3.0 grade point average. Texas Tech uses a 4.0 point grading system.

The College of Education consists of six colleges and 20 schools at Texas Tech University, with a total fall enrollment of more than 10,000 students. The others are the colleges of Agricultural Sciences, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Engineering and Architecture and the Graduate School and the School of Law.

The Federal Trade Com-
mission has passed a ruling
that should be of great help
to consumers. Effective
July 3 of this year, all
articles of clothing must
have labels with washing
or cleaning instructions
permanently attached to
them rather than on throw-
away tags which can easily
be misplaced.
Home sewers will bene-
fit by the new rule, too.
All textiles and fabrics

which are sold for the pur-
pose of making wearing ap-
parel must be accompanied
by similar care labels which
the home sewer can attach
permanently to her finished
garment.

Hosiery is included under
the new rule. Exceptions
are shoes, gloves, and items
used exclusively as head-
wear.

- 1 tbs. chopped parsley
- Water
- 2 potatoes, diced
- 4 small carrots, diced
- 1 turnip, diced

Sprinkle the meat with
salt, pepper and flour. Brown
it with the onion in the fat.
Add water to cover.

Cover pan and cook slow-
ly until meat is almost done—
about 1½ hours.

Add potatoes, carrots
and turnip and cook until
tender— 20 - 30 minutes.
Then add parsley. Makes 4
servings.

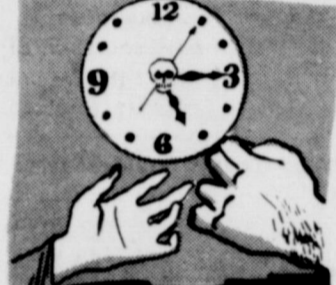

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Last To Die

Husband and wife both perish
in an automobile accident.
Seemingly, they die at the same
time. Yet, if one has outlived
the other even for an instant,
that may make an enormous
difference to their heirs. It may
decide whether the husband's
relatives or the wife's relatives
inherit the estate.



Accordingly, in this "common
disaster" situation, strenuous
efforts are often made to figure
out which of the two victims
was the last to die.

In a recent case, double
deaths occurred when a speeding
truck rammed into the passenger
side of a car. Both husband and
wife died instantly.

But since the wife—sitting on
the passenger side—had been
struck first, a court concluded
that the husband must have lived
a fraction of a second longer. By
this split second, the wife's re-
latives lost out on their claim to a
share of the estate.

With common disasters be-
coming more frequent, many
kinds of evidence have been
found useful in deciding who
died last. Anything from the po-
sition of the bodies to their
physical condition may provide
the telltale clue.

On the other hand, there may
be no evidence at all, good
enough to be trusted in the
courtroom.

In another case, a mother and
daughter were found dead of
asphyxiation. The only "evi-
dence" as to which one died last
was that the daughter probably
held out longer because she was
younger.

But a court said this was
plain guesswork, and turned
down a claim put forth by re-
latives of the daughter.

Suppose the victims really did
die simultaneously (or, at least,
no one can prove otherwise). To
cover this situation, most states
have passed a Simultaneous
Death Act. This Act lays down
specific rules to settle the var-
ious conflicting claims that may
arise.

A better solution in many
cases is to have a "simultaneous
death clause," tailored to your
individual wishes, included in
your will. In these days of high-
speed transportation, such a con-
tingency is well worth taking into
account.



committed to a particular activity or project, he can work with it and, at the same time, grow and develop himself. An animal project, whether it be a steer, horse, dog or rabbit, can be the beginning of real life experiences for many a youth," noted Holbrook.

Building the Panhandle! The current state of High Plains agriculture will be the theme of the annual meeting of the Board of Directors of the Panhandle Economic Program in Amarillo, March 17th.

Wheeler County directors include John Dabery of Kelton, Clarence Zybach of Briscoe and Mrs. Bob Frankenberg of Wheeler.

The Panhandle Economic Program was begun in 1964 in an attempt to furnish High Plains agricultural producers and homemakers the most current information available to increase income and raise the standard of home life. The program is administered by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The conference will be highlighted by reports of the various task forces, which serve as subcommittees of the program.

The current state of High Plains agriculture will be the theme of the annual meeting of the Board of Directors of the Panhandle Economic Program in Amarillo, March 17th.

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I don't spray my trees and make good quality peaches. The time to spray is when you have an insect problem. If the quality of peaches made last year left something to be desired, you may want to spray. We have spray schedules in our office.

A lot of other things can be done right in the cattle business but unless the percent calf crop is high enough, there's not going to be any profit. A new bulletin on Ways to Increase Percent Calf Crop in Beef Cattle is now available at our office. If you're not pleased with the way your calf crop is turning out, come by and get a copy.

4-H projects have much to offer youth, especially those involving animals. Perhaps one of the foremost advantages of an animal project is the contribution that it makes to a youngster's development into adulthood.

The values of a youth's association with an animal were voiced recently by Dr. J. T. Holbrook clinical director of the Brazos Valley Mental Health Center in Bryan.

"Youngsters can transfer feelings of need and love from animals to humans," said Holbrook. "Experiences with animals help mold the individual's personality and attitudes."

In today's mechanized urban society, many youngsters have largely been removed from the reality as far as nature and the life processes are concerned, noted the psychiatrist. Thus, they must rely on other opportunities, and 4-H project work provides such an opportunity, he added.

Nearly every child who has cared for an animal has experienced some common crisis--daily feeding of a pet, occasional sickness and even death of an animal, or parting with a prize steer on sale day after months of careful attention and handling. "Support from parents and leaders can help young people cope with such stress and thereby enable them to tolerate more difficult future crises," Holbrook pointed out.

The clinical director noted that closely related to the development of youth into adulthood is the idea of becoming accustomed to the normal stress of everyday living. "Exhibiting an animal, for instance, puts a 4-H'er under pressure; he learns to cope with the situation by accepting it and meeting the challenge."

Caring for an animal also allows a youngster to become "goal oriented," emphasizes Holbrook. In feeding, caring and showing animals, the 4-H'er feels his worth because he has some goals. He receives a chance for self-motivation in the fulfillment of his goals with the animal.

"People who can't relate to past experiences or goals tend to have problems in adapting to changes in life," the psychiatrist pointed out. "Consequently, they seldom make useful contributions to society."

Another advantage of working with and caring for animals is that youngsters learn patience, or the ideas of delayed gratification, Holbrook added. "Once a youngster is
