## WHEELER WINS BATTLE OF THE MUSTANGS

When the dust had settled the once proud Claude Mustangs had been put to rest as a group of fired up Mustangs from Wheeler and the final score of the satisfying game was 28-12.

The win put the local game at the top of the district standings, tied with Clarendon, and the Claude Mustangs fell with a thud to the cellar.

Claude was in the position of having to whip the Mustangs to stay in the district race, but Coach J.T. Hill's charges would have nothing of this even though Claude started out as if the visitors from Wheeler could be easy prey.

Claude drove to the Wheeler 17 late in the first period but lost the ball on downs at the center of the Mustangs line rose up and threw fields for no gain. Claude got the ball back on the first play of the second period as Donald Rives fumbled and Fields recovered at the Mustang 30. Campbell passed to Bartley on first down and Bartley sped the distance to put Claude in the lead. The kick was no good but the homecoming fans from Claude were happy at this point.

Bobby Ware returned the kickoff 38 yards to the Claude 47 and in two plays the Mustangs scored. Frankie Rogers got cleared at the line and tight walked the sideline to the Claude 8 and from there it took Fred Goad just one smash at left guard to get the touchdown. Goad split the uprights with an extra point kick and it was the Wheeler fans that were making the noise.

Campbell fumbled the kickoff and Ronald Rives recovered for the Mustangs but they were unable to cash in on the break and gave up the ball at the 25 with a holding penalty helping stop the Mustangs advance.

Claude moved downfield to the Mustang 31 but once more the aggressive Mustang defense put them down and took over at that point. Kennedy stepped in front of a Ware pass at the Claude 47 and returned six to the Wheeler 47 and Claude made it to paydirt in nine

plays with a pass interference call against Wheeler aiding the drive. Campbell got a running start as he sneaked over for the TD with only 48 seconds remaining in the half. Campbell tried to run the two pointer but was stopped short and Claude took the five point margin in for the halftime breather.

The initial drive by Claude in the third period was halted by a fumble by Bartley and Ware recovered at the Wheeler 40. Facing third and eight, Ware hit Rives with a pass and 23 yards later Rives was brought down at the Claude 25. Goad and Rogers each carried twice to put the ball at the Claude 8 and then Goad ripped off three to the 5 and then bulled off left guard for the touchdown. They did not know it at the time, but Claude's homecoming had just been spoiled. Goad kicked the point and Wheeler had a 14-12 bulge.

Wheeler stopped Claude for the third time in Mustang territory as the third period was coming to a close and took over on downs at the Wheeler 36. Three plays got only three yards for the Mustangs and they had to punt. Britt's punt rolled dead at the Claude 25 and this set the stage for the back breaker that the Mustangs applied to Claude. Picking up a first down in two tries, Claude chose the airways to try and get back in the lead but Donnie Manning intercepted a Campbell toss and 35 yards downfield was the Claude end zone and Manning set sail. Goadance more was true with the kick and Wheeler had built their lead to 21-12.

By this time the Wheeler defensive unit was really aroused and Claude was unable to dent it for any yard-

age. A fake punt and run which gained only one yard gave the Mustangs possession at the Claude 36 with a little over four minutes to play. Rives got 15 yards in two smashes off the Mustangs left side and a 5 yard fine against Claude put the ball at the 16. Fred Goad made short work of this yardage as he broke a tackle at the line of scrimmage and went off his left tackle for the touchdown that silenced Claude for good. Goad got his 22nd point of the night when he kicked the extra point to bring the final score to 28-12.

### Colts to Visit Clarendon Thurs.

Wheeler's Jr. High Colts hit the road Thursday for a 630 game with the Jr. High of Clarendon.

This will be the Colts' final district game and a win would give them a tie for the Jr. High District championship. The Colts were defeated by White Deer and have victories over Claude and McLean. The Colts close out their season next week with a non-district tilt with Groom.

Fresh from two straight wins, the Colts will be at peak strength for the first time this year as there are no ineligible this week.

"Clarendon is real tough and they beat White Deer 6-0 and we all know what White Deer did to us," Coach Gaines said this week. "Our boys have been coming along every week and we hope to be able to give Clarendon a big test for the championship."

The Wheeler Mustangs play their final non-conference game this Friday night at Nicholson Field and the ever powerful White Deer Bucks will furnish the opposition.

White Deer is coming into the game with a 6-1 record and they are ranked in the top ten in all Class A rankings in the state. Last Friday night the Bucks defeated Canadian and the Wildcats were one of the two teams to defeat the Mustangs.

This game will pit two strong defensive clubs and all indications are for the Mustangs to be going all out to avenge the 12-6 defeat suffered at White Deer last year.

"We are real proud of the job the kids did at Claude last week and the entire ball club played their best game of the year," Coach Hill reported. He went on to say, "The boys are looking forward to playing White Deer and one thing for sure is that the Bucks will know that they have been in a ball game."

No new injuries have been reported by either club and both ball clubs should be raring to go for the 7:30 kickoff.

### Colts Trim McLean 16-0

Having to fight for their lives for three quarters, the Wheeler Colts scored twice in the final period to whitewash the McLean Cubs last Thursday night 16-0.

The Colts had the ball for a grand total of eight plays in the first half and only eight plays in the third period while holding off several threats by the visiting Cubs.

Jimmy Cole put the Colts in business early in the final period as he blocked a Cub punt at the McLean 28 and the Colts recovered at the five yard line. Cole got a yard at right guard and on the next play Archie Trimble swept right end for the touchdown with 5:18 remaining. Trimble added the two points and even though the Colts had the ball for few plays in the contest, they owned the scoreboard by 8-0.

McLean couldn't move after the kickoff and gave up the ball on downs at the Cub 34 trying to pass for the first down. Weatherly got the Colts headed for paydirt on the first play as he picked up 7 yards and Robert Brickley added 8 more with a couple of carries. Weatherly tacked on 7 to the 12 and Trimble skirted left end for the final touchdown. Weatherly sneaked across for the two points and only 1:25 remained in the game.

The maize crop's a little over half cut. Dryland yields of a ton and half or better seem to be near the ordinary. Wallace Biter, Rt. 1, Twitty, said some of his cut out around 3,000 pounds. These damp mornings have kept

the moisture content of some of our maize too high to store.

**4-H Awards Program:** Preparations for the 4-H awards banquet set for November 4 at 7 p.m. at the Shamrock High School Cafeteria are progressing. This year's banquet is being sponsored by the Agricultural Committee of the Shamrock Chamber of Commerce. 4-H members who turned in project records and their parents will be recognized. Donors to the banquet include: West Texas Utilities, Harrison Oil Company, Farmers and Merchants State Bank, Renua Seed Company and Cantrell Fuel and Supply.

**Calf and Pig Show:** A 5-7 week old pig purchased now would qualify weight wise for the 4-H and FFA Pig Show the first week in March. All calf projects must go on feed December 10 and must have been born between January and March of 1967 to qualify for this year's Junior Calf Show. A certified weight slip should be obtained on your calf at time of purchase. Bulls, steers or heifers may be shown, but all will be judged as slaughter steers regardless of sex.

**4-H Texans Jr. Rodeo:** Mrs. Richard Smith, Shamrock and Mrs. Dan Luttrell, Wheeler tell me they've really received a lot of entries for their Junior Rodeo to be held October 28-29 at the Shamrock Sheriff's Posse Arena in Shamrock. If you plan to enter be sure to get your entries in by Wednesday, Oct. 25.

**Milo:** Holding milo, if you have storage, should make you some money. We look for prices to sag downward until November when most of our milo'll be in and then recover kinda slow.

**Cotton defoliation:** We've seen a few fields defoliated around the county. We believe it's a good idea cause you'll get cleaner cotton at the gin and you can get it before adverse weather sets in. If you have last year's defoliation guide from our office, continue to use it as the recommendations are still correct.

## Soil Conservation News

Small watershed projects in South Texas took the brunt of Hurricane Beulah's record breaking rains last month and prevented vast flood damages, according to a report from H.N. Smith, State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, Temple.

Smith said six projects had been installed with SCS help in the area hit by the heavy rains and that inspections so far showed that none were seriously damaged by the storm.

At Bishop, city councilmen reported that a channel-levee project, part of the Chilipin-San Fernando Creek watershed project, saved their city and prevented at least \$500,000 in property damages.

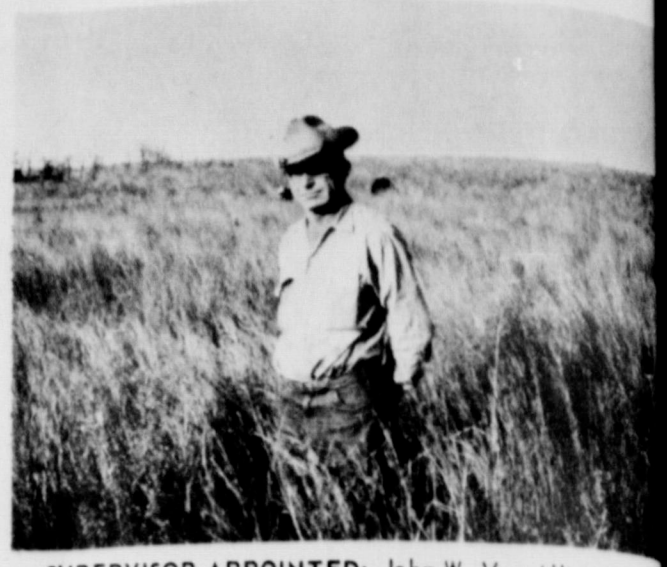
Alice, San Diego, Kenedy, LaPuerta, La Casita, Garcia and other communities reported similar benefits from the upstream projects, Smith said.

The heavy rains again underscored the value of work done by soil and water conservation districts in preventing erosion and sediment damage. Cultivated land with a cover of either a growing cover or crop residues had little damage. Bare land suffered severe damage, Smith said. He also said that bare, brush infested rangeland had scour damage and soil loss while grassland with good cover was not damaged.

Soil that washed off bare land became the mud that blocked roads and covered furniture and carpets downstream, Smith pointed out. He said this again bears out the fact that everyone has a stake in soil and water conservation work—from the farmer to the business-

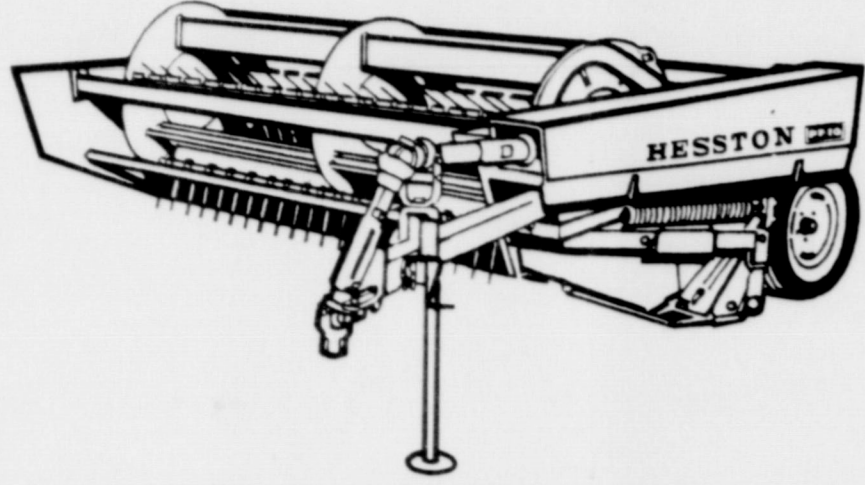
man to the house. SCS helps landowners through local conservation districts plan and apply soil and water conserving measures on farm and ranch lands. SCS also helps local sponsors install watershed projects when sponsors are willing to secure needed rights-of-way as well as operate and maintain completed projects. Watershed dams have pipes built through them that automatically release water at a rate slow enough to prevent downstream flooding.

Smith said several pending projects now under consideration by sponsors would have greatly reduced flooding in other areas if they had been installed.

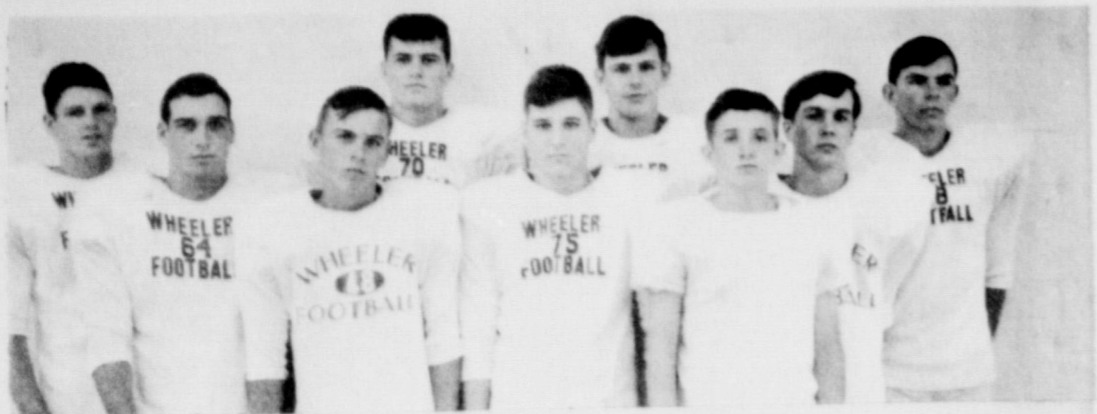
