The initial drive by Claude in the third period was halted by a fumble by Bartley and Ware recovered at the Wheeler 40. Facing third and eight, Ware hit Rives with a pass and 33 yards later Rives was brought down at the Claude 25. Goad and Rogers each carried twice to put the ball at the Claude 8 and then Good ripped off three to the 5 and then bulled off left guard for the touchdown. They didnot know it at the time, but Claude's homecoming had just been spoiled. Goad kicked the point and Wheeler had

Wheeler stopped Claude for the third time in Mustang territory as the third period was coming to a close and took over on downs at the Wheeler 36. Three plays got only three yards for the Mustangs and they had to punt. Britt's punt rolled dead at the Claude 25 and this set the stage for the back breaker that the Mustangs applied to Claude. Picking up a first down in two trys, Claude chose the airways to try and get back in the lead but Donnie Manning intercepted a Campbell toss and 35 yards downfield was the Claude end zone and Manning set sail. Thursday night 16-0. The Colts had the ball for a grand total of eight plays in the first half and only eight plays in the third period while holding off several threats by the visiting Cubs.

Jimmy Cole put the Colts in business early in the final period as he blocked a Cub punt at the McLean 28 and the Colts recovered at the five yard line. Cole got a yard at right guard and on the next play Archie Trimble swept right end for the touchdown with 5:18 remaining. Trimble added the two points and even though the Colts had the ball for few plays in the contest, they owned the scoreboard by 8-0.

McLean couldn't move after the kickoff and gave up the ball on downs at the Cub 34 trying to pass for the first down. Calf and Pig Show: A 5-7 week old pig purchased now would qualify weight wise for the 4-H and FFA Pig Show the first week in March. All calf projects must go on feed December 10 and must have been born between January and March of 1967 to qualify for this year's Junior Calf Show. A certified weight lip should be obtained on your calf at time of purchase. Bulls, steers or heifers may be shown, but all will be judged as slaughter steers

Cotton defoliation: We've seen a few fields defoliated around the county. We believe it's a good idea cuase you'll get cleaner cotton at the gin and you can get it before adverse weather sets in. If you have last year's defoliation guide from our office, continue to use it as the reommendations are still corSoil Conservation News

Small watershed projects in South Texas took the brunt of Hurricane Beulah's record breaking rains last month and prevented vast flood damages, according to a report from H.N. Smith, State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, Temp-

Smith said six projects had been installed with SCS help in the area hit by the heavy rains and that inspections so far showed that none were seriously damaged by the storm.

At Bishop, city councilmen reported that a chennel levee project, part of the Chiltipin-San Fernando Creek watershed project, saved their city and prevented at least \$500,000 in property damages.

Alice, San Diego, Kenedy, LaPuerta, La Casita, Garcia sville and other communities reported similar benefits from the upstream projects, Smith said.

The heavy rains again underscored the value of work done by soil and water conservation districts in preventing erosion and sedi ment damage. Cultivated land with a cover of either a growing cover or crop residues had little damage. Bare land suffered severe damage, Smith said. He also said that bare, brush infested rangeland had scour damage and soil loss while grassland with good cover was not damaged.

Soil that washed off bare land became the mud that blocked roads and covered furniture and carpets down-He said this again bears out the fact that everyone has a stake in soil and water conservation work--from the farmer to the business-

rect. The only change is that Paraquat has received full federal label approval with a tolerance or allowable of .5p.p.m. on the cotton seed. Be sure that you don't apply the defoliant too early. Bolls at the top or ends of limbs should not be easily sliced with a knife; fiber should string out. If you plan to use a defoliant and have misplaced your cotton defoli ation guide, drop by our office in Wheeler and get a copy. It may save you some troub-

man to the house. SCS helps landowners through local conservation districts plan and apply soil and water conserving measures on farm and ranch lands. SCS also helps local sponsors install watershed projects when sponsors are willing to secure needed rights-of-way as well as operate and maintain completed projects. Watershed dams have pipes built through them that automatically release water at a rate slow enough to prevent downstream flood-

Smith said several pendng projects now under consideration by sponsors would have greatly reduced floodng in other areas if they had been installed.

When baking or apple pie or making applesauce use a tart or slightly acid variety such as Grime, Golden, Jonathan or Newton, For bak ing select the firmer fleshed types such as Rome Beauty, Northern Spy or Winesap. 

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
