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## CHAMBER DISCUSSES NEEDS OF WHEELER COMMUNITY

The Tuesday evening meeting of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce consisted of an informal discussion on the needs of Wheeler.

Listed as needs for Wheeler were the "Big Dam" on Sweetwater, Water and Sewer improvement for the City, Rest Home, Community Building and further consideration of the proposed school plan.

The Big Dam has been on the drawing board for the past 10 years and remains as a proposed project for the future. Ideas and persons willing to give of their time toward the building of this project are needed.

The water and sewer facilities in Wheeler are adequate, but could be extended and made available to areas not presently served. At times during the summer, with the heavy watering, certain areas run low on water due to the size of the water line serving the area.

Last year as a project, the Chamber took on the obtaining of a rest home for Wheeler. At this time the Hospital Board is working out the details of what type of facility is needed and what approach should be taken for the financing of the project.

Wheeler needs a place to hold large meetings, shows and/or displays with facilities for cooking without having to impose on the school. These needs could only be met with the construction of a community building.

The Wheeler School Board spent quite a lot of time last year working up a projected plan for the improvement of the school facilities. This plan included a park area behind the school with tennis courts, a track, football stadium, baseball diamond and bus barns. This project was discussed by both the school trustees and the City Council. The drawings of the proposed project along with an explanation of the project ran in the Times with a request for citizens to comment on the proposal. The comments were all negative and the project is at the present time tabled. Members of the Chamber have expressed a revived interest in the

project and would like to again see the board and council work on the project.

Once more it is time for the Chamber to hold a membership drive. A Breakfast will be held Tuesday, March 28 at 7:00 a.m. at Nora's to kick off the membership drive. Chamber members and especially members of the board are

now, even though it's actually an ancient art. Macrame (from an Arabic word meaning fringe or braid) is the art of creative knot tying. Actually two simple knots and their variations are all that you have to learn. Then you may follow a pattern or create your own. Belts, chokers, pillow covers, vests, decorative wall hangings, lamps and hanging planters can be made using this "knotty" art. It's really a lot of fun. Try it, you might like it!

Just as there is variety in fabrics for clothing and home fashions, so dinnerware differs, not only in pattern and shape, but in basic materials and range of quality. The smart homemaker should know what type and quality tableware she is buying or using in order to follow the best and easiest care routines for long and pleasurable service.

Because shopping for tableware is done occasionally, it is important to shop carefully, browse, determine taste preferences. Collect and compare manufacturers' descriptive leaf-

lets and shop different stores for greater selection. It's a good idea to keep a notebook for details on patterns and shapes of interest.

Usually, less expensive tableware is sold in sets, high price in open stock and middle price range either way. Open stock means the purchase of tableware by the piece. This is a good way to acquire high-priced dinnerware. But it is important to keep in touch with the store because there is no guarantee that the pattern chosen will be in production for a long time.

Price is determined by the quality and grades within each type of tableware. However, the shape, handwork required in making, finishing and decorating also plays a part.

Less expensive ware may have more daring styles while higher priced patterns excel in subtle shapes and detailed decoration.

Pottery, man's earliest dishmaking material, is today a heavy, opaque, informal, gaily decorative type of tableware. It is easily chipped and broken and the glaze may eventually scratch and craze leaving the porous substance underneath unprotected.

Earthenware, developed in the 18th century, is made with finer clays and fired at a higher temperature than pottery, making it more durable and somewhat less porous. It is thick and opaque, though stronger and lighter than pottery. Earthenware should not be shed in boiling water or put in the oven to warm. These may cause it to crack. When crazed, chipped or cracked, the porous body will absorb liquids and darken. This type of tableware is available in a wide range of price and quality.

Semi-vitreous ware, called fine earthenware in England, is fired at high enough temperatures to become partially fused or vitrified and less absorbent. Made from partially refined clays, it is opaque, thinner than earthenware but thicker than china.

Ironstone and stoneware are similar and harder than any of the above types of tableware. Very good strength, chip resistance and interesting forms make it a popular choice particularly for family meals. Hard, closegrained clays are used in the manufacture and fired at temperatures high enough to fuse the clay particles to present an opaque, non-porous surface. Developed during the 19th century, early examples enjoy popularity in the antique market as collectors' items.

China or chinaware is porcelain. It is called china after the country of its origin. For a long time its manufacture was a well-kept Oriental secret. The effort to duplicate the Chinese product led to the discovery of "bone china" in England around 1789. Grades in China vary widely depending on thickness, cost of ingredients and quality of workmanship. Top quality in a "lesser" tableware may be better and more serviceable for family use.

Though there are differences in casual china, fine china and bone china, all use choice refined clays as a basic ingredient and are fired at such high temperatures that the clay particles melt and fuse to form a hard, non-porous, translucent body. All are thin, highly glazed, delicate in appearance, light and very strong in proportion to size. All have high resonance, giving off a bell-like sound when tapped.

Casual china in informal, heavier and very durable. It is often ovenproof and highly resistant to chipping and cracking.

Fine china is made from a variety of super-refined clays and powdered minerals and is fired at intense heats for longer periods of time at each firing than less costly dinnerware. It is strong, thin and very translucent. In making fine china, the hard glaze is actually fused onto the body making protection complete and permanent. Decorations, usually by hand, are added after the glaze and then fired.

Bone China differs from fine china in color. Fine china tends to be cream or ivory colored, while bone china is chalk white because animal bone ash is added to the mixture.

Melamine, an inexpensive, practical, break-resistant plastic for informal use, is one of the two strictly modern dinnerware materials.

When introduced, plastic was often relegated to picnics and child-oriented family meals. But with better grades, manufacturing processes and more sophisticated designing, melamine became a staple in dinnerware departments and a favorite for daily family feasting. The del-

icate lustrous appearance of some top quality melamine can fool the eye.

Pyroceram, the registered trademark for a family of glass-ceramics, is the other miracle material of the 20th century. Concocted for nosecone duty in outer space, Pyroceram eventually found its way into earthenware kitchens in freezer-to-range-to-table pieces. Then came dinnerware that is guaranteed not to break, chip or crack but has a ring and feel akin to fine china. A glossy glaze protects decorations and wards off stains. Of course, it is dishwasher-safe and oven-proof.

### STRAWBERRY CAKE

1 white cake mix  
2 eggs  
1 Pkg strawberry jello  
1 small pkg frozen strawberries  
1 3 cup oil  
Mix half box of strawberries with water to make 1 cup. Add to cake mix gradually, mixing well. Add jello. Add eggs, one at a time mixing completely after addition. Add oil, mix well. Pour into a greased and floured pan (rectangular) for a smaller size pan, this recipe will make 2 regular cake layers. Bake at 325° for 25 min.  
Icing  
1 box powdered sugar mixed with remaining strawberries and spread on warm cake.

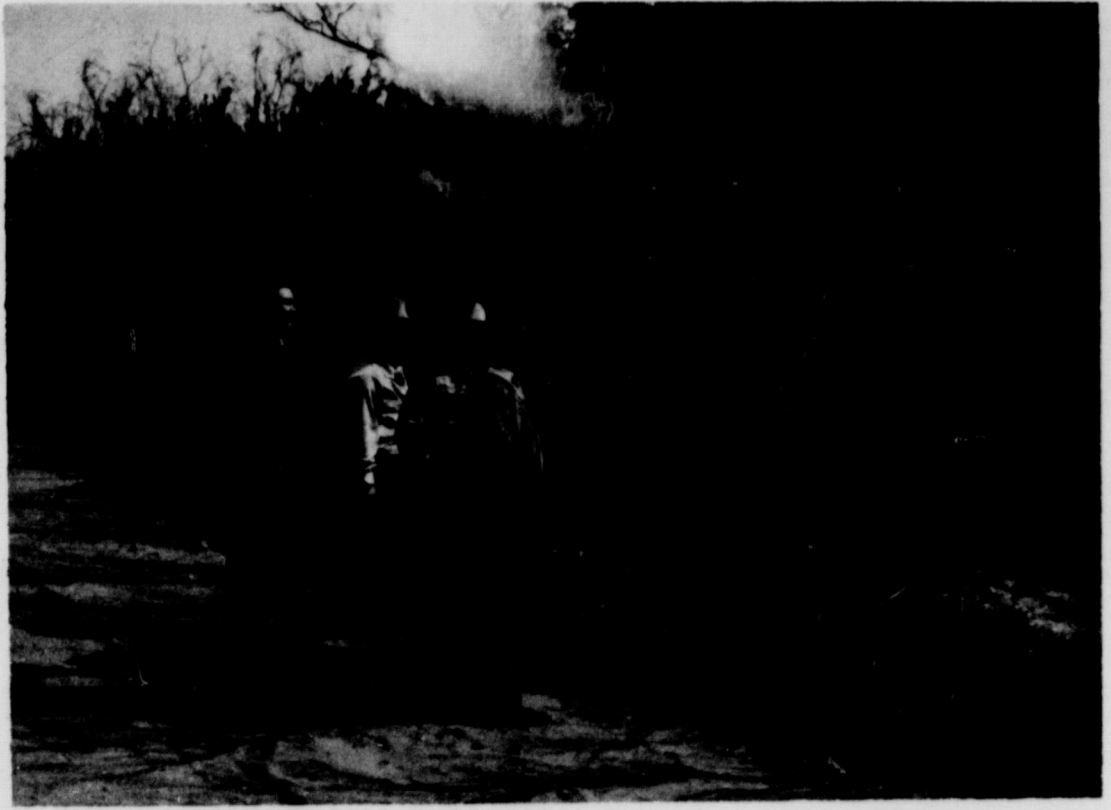

## Across the Fence

We need a rain. Subsoil moisture is better than last year; however, we need to get the crop up first.

Now is the time of year when 4-H club members and 4-H leaders in our county will be selecting

club calves for the Wheeler County Calf Show and the Pampa Livestock Shows of 1973. They'll be looking for 18 to 22 months of age by showtime. If you as a producer have some calves coming off wheat that you think might make a good club calf, I'd appreciate you letting me know so that we can pass the word on to the boys and girls and their leaders.

It's time to start selecting bulls for next year. The selection now is much greater than it will be later in the spring. Most purebred breeders still have their yearling bulls on hand which will give a buyer a good chance of finding a top bull. We attended the Pantex Performance Tested Bull Sale last Thursday with Jack Wardlaw of Shamrock. Jack purchased a registered Santa Gertrudis bull bred by Burrell Ranches of Whitesboro, Texas. On test, he gained a little over 3 pounds a day average daily gain.

Lovegrass is growing up at the base of the plants. The old growth needs to be removed now. Under no circumstances should the growth be burned unless the ground is moist following a rain. Fertilizer needs to be applied before the grass greens up. Thirty pounds of nitrogen and forty pounds of phosphorus is a good rule of thumb. Follow up with another thirty pounds of nitrogen in June. Liquid or granular is satisfactory. Don't exceed over 120 pounds of actual nitrogen, especially if moisture is limited.

Pecans need to be planted now. Wheeler County Commissioners have planted 15 Western Schley

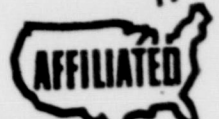
