Commissioners Court Holds January Session

Two delegations of citizens met with the County Commissioners Monday at the regular session of the court.

A delegation from Shamrock composed of Mayor Seibert Worley, Durward Vinyard, Billy Jack Thompson, Robert Adams, Robert Laycock and Jerry Hnrciar met with the Commissioners to request the removal of the Sleeper Cell in the County Building in Shamrock and build in its place an office to house the Chief of Police of the City of Shamrock.

A motion was made by E.E. Henderson and seconded by Clois Hanner that the County partition off such office and the county pay for construction.

Mobeetie Mayor, Calvin Stuart, J.T. Johnston, Melvin May, Lester Hathaway and Paul Hathaway met with the group to request the hiring of S.B. Hooker as Deputy Sheriff and station him in Mobeetie.

Mobeetie was notified to make arrangements for a night watchman for Mobeetie after the December meeting of the Court. With the incorporation of the City of Mobeetie, the Court did not feel they could continue

The gas rates for Wheeler will be increased with the February 1 billing by Wheeler Gas, Inc. The rate increase was approved at the Dec. 18 meeting of the Wheeler City Council with the increase to go into effect with the reading of the meters for gas used in January.

The request for increased rates was presented Dec. 4. Bill Wiley of Miami, representative of Wheeler Gas, Inc. met with the City Council in a special meeting Monday, December 4 and presented a proposed rate schedule. The council agreed to take action at their regular December meeting.

On December 18 after reading and studying the proposed rate increase, the council voted to approve the raise.

The increase in the cost of gas is the first raise requested by Wheeler Gas, Inc. since 1957. The Wheeler Gas Co. was established in 1926 and operated at the rates first established until

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1957 when an increase was sought by the company. Because the City Council and Wheeler Gas could not agree on the new rates, the matter was taken to District Court. A District Court order established the new rates necessary to provide operating revenues sufficient to meet increased operating costs and increased gas purchase costs. The rate established by the court has been in effect for the past 15 years.

Gas for Wheeler was produced southeast of Wheeler. Wheeler Gas owned its own wells for use by Wheeler residents until the depletion of production forced Wheeler Gas to turn to Natural Gas Pipeline Co in 1964. In order to provide adequate volumes and pressure to meet customer requirements. Wheeler Gas, Inc. continued to look for and purchase field gas in order to reduce gas costs.

In 1971 a new supply pipeline was constructed to the Basin Well northwest of Wheeler. This well became non productive in the fall of 1971 due to formation flooding. In 1971 a new supply pipeline was constructed to a Gulf well in Oklahoma. By enlarging five miles of pipeline north of Wheeler, three-fourths of Wheeler gas requirements can be supplied. The remaining gas supply for Wheeler must be purchased from Natural Gas Pipeline Company.

In addition to the increased cost of gas, taxes on the system have continued to increase. Total taxes paid in 1965 were \$4,240.58 and total taxes paid of 1971 were \$8,391.96.

Wheeler Gas, Inc is the successor to the family partnership, Wheeler Gas Co., formed by H.M. Wiley who installed the original natural gas system in Wheeler in 1926.

BEEF SHORT COURSE OFFERED

A beef production short course for adult farmers will be held Jan. 22-25 under the sponsorship of the Wheeler High School Vocational Agriculture Department according to Mr. Dorman Thomas Superintendent, and Mr. Terry McCasland, Teacher of Vocational Agriculture.

Dr. Elmer V. Krehbiel, Beef Production Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Science at Texas A&M Univ. will be the instructor for the course. He is headquartered at A&M University.

Dr. Krehbiel is a native of Oklahoma. As a farm boy and FFA member, he had shown livestock and won many awards, including

championships at the Southwestern Livestock Exposition in Ft. Worth and at the American Royal Livestock Show in Kansas City.

He has a strong background in animal production and genetics. He received a B.S. degree from Oklahoma State University in 1950, an MS degree from the University of Arkansas in 1959, and a Ph. D. degree from Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1966. His graduate studies were based on selection for type and reproductive performance of cow herds.

Between periods of formal training, Dr. Krehbiel worked with the beef cattle industry as artificial insemination technician, beef cattle herdsman, and ranch manager in Oklahoma. He

also served as beef cattle research assistant in Arkansas, and animal geneticist for the USDA at Miles City, Montana. For the past two years prior to joining the agricultural education Specialist Program, he served as Area Livestock Extension Agent in Ohio.

The short course at Wheeler High School is scheduled to begin Jan. 22 at 7:30 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture Building. Other meetings in the series of Four will be held Jan. 23, 24 and 25 at 7:30 p.m. During the dates the short course is in progress, Dr. Krehbiel will be available to assist cattlemen with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Terry McCasland.

Cattlemen interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. Thomas, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Mr. McCasland. An entry fee of \$3.00 will be charged.

Beef Production Short Course certificates will be presented to each cattleman who attends all the training sessions.

Dr. Krehbiel states that the field of beef cattle production must take a close look at efficiency of production in the future. With land prices, feed, and taxes rising, the producer is meeting more and more competition for the consumer's dollar at the meat counter. From the economic view of the beef cattle business, there is every indication that in comparing the producer of yesterday and the producer of tomorrow, beef must be produced more efficiently in order to be a profit-making business. Dr. Krehbiel indicates that the beef production short course will deal with methods of producing beef at a lower cost and the ways of producing the kind of beef that the homemaker wants to buy. He also states that the course will include such important topics as cattle reproduction and pregnancy diagnosis, selecting bulls and replacement heifers, calf crop percentages, and supplemental winter feeding. The course can be changed to meet the wishes and interests of the farmers and ranchers en-

rolled.

"Short courses in beef production, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the cooperative program between Texas Education Agency and Texas A & M University," states Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M University, who coordinates the program for Texas A&M.

"This cooperative program," states Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people."

Specialists are now available in the fields of beef production, farm electric wiring and safety, farm electric motors, arc welding, swine production, tractor maintenance, pasture and oxy-acetylene welding.

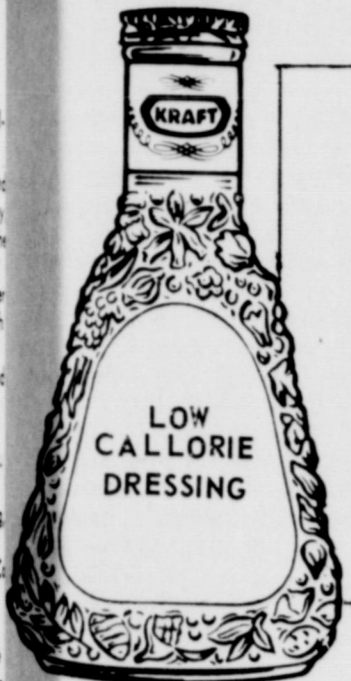

PAT'S PARAGRAPHS

It was great to be with friends and family and to sample all those holiday "goodies". But, it's also good to be back here. Don't know how many of

you use an electric bean pot in your cooking. I received one for Christmas and am enjoying trying different recipes in it. It's sure not the appliance for an impatient cook. You really have to plan ahead. But, talk about a good pot of beans!

We're all reading a lot about "truth-in-labeling". What does this mean to us as consumers? It means that the U.S.D.A. assures you not only that products are wholesome, but also that information on their labels is truthful. Did you know that the label, the container or packaging material, the formula or recipe for the product, a description of the way it's made, and a sample of the product must all be submitted to U.S.D.A.'s Animal and Plant Inspection Service for approval before the label can be used? If there is a picture of the product on it, it must truly represent the product inside. When you read the label of a U.S.D.A. product, note that the list of ingredients begins with the item weighing the most and continues to the item weighing the least. That's a good way to tell how much meat you're actually getting in canned meat products. Or how much of any ingredient you're getting in a product.

I guess I'm just a ground beef lover. Different recipes using ground beef always catch my eye. Recently my office received a supply of a recipe pamphlet, "Ground Beef - Passport to Far-Away Eating". The recipes are not as "far-out" as the name implies. There are some good recipes in it. It gives a basic meat ball (or meat loaf) recipe in it and then gives variations from different countries. I'm fond of Italian and Spanish food, so I tried the Italian style meat balls and spaghetti. You may have this recipe on one similar. If not, hope you enjoy this one. If you would like to have this recipe pamphlet, let me know. MEAT BALLS & SPAGHETTI (ITALIAN STYLE)
1 recipe meat balls (using 1 lb., making 12 meat balls)
1/4 cup chopped green pepper

2 cans (No. 2) tomato juice
1 small bay leaf, crumbled
1 pkg. (7 oz.) uncooked spaghetti broken into small pieces (2 1/2 cups)
Parmesan cheese
1/2 cup chopped onion
1 tsp salt
1/2 tsp. crumbled oregano
After meat balls are browned, push to sides of skillet to form a ring. Place green pepper and onion in center and cook until tender. Pour tomato juice over meat balls and sprinkle with salt, bay leaf and oregano. Bring to a boil over high heat. Add spaghetti and stir to moisten. Cover skillet tightly, turn heat as low as possible and cook 40 min. or until spaghetti is tender. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Makes 6 servings.

1040 U.S. Individual Taxpayers Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q) My child is co-owner of my savings bonds. Does this mean that he is taxed on one-half of the interest?

A) No. If a child is named as co-owner of U.S. Savings Bonds bought and paid for by his parent, interest on those bonds is taxable to the parent. This applies even if the parent permits the child to redeem the bonds at or before their maturity, and to keep the entire proceeds. However, interest on such bonds bought solely in the child's name is income to the child, even if the parent paid for them and is named as beneficiary. The interest is included in the child's income in the year the bond's mature or are redeemed, unless he has elected to report the interest income as it accrues annually. IRS Publication 576, "Tax Information on United States Savings Bonds," furnishes additional information. A free copy may be obtained from your IRS district office.

Q) What is the social security tax rate for 1972?

A) The current social security tax rate is 5.2 percent for both employers and employees. This tax rate applies to a maximum wage base of

\$9,000. This means that an individual will generally pay up to \$468 in social security tax in 1972.

Q) My employer pays the premiums on a group-term life insurance policy providing \$20,000 worth of coverage for each of his employees. Can I be taxed on the premiums?

A) No. The only time such premiums must be included in your income is if the coverage of the group-term life insurance exceeds \$50,000 and then only the cost of the policy in excess of the amount charged for this coverage is taxable.

Q) Can a farmer's livestock qualify for the investment credit?

A) Yes. Livestock other than horses acquired after Aug. 15, 1971, or before Aug. 16, 1971 (if ordered after March 31, 1971), qualifies for the investment credit. For more information, see IRS Publication 572, "Tax Information on Investment Credit." It's available free by dropping a postcard to your Internal Revenue district office.

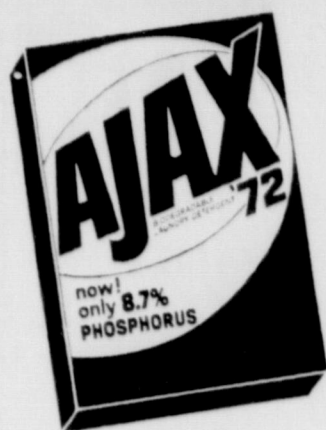

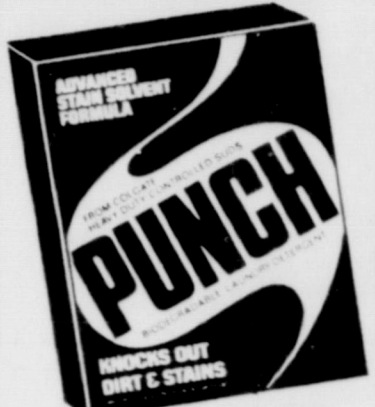
