



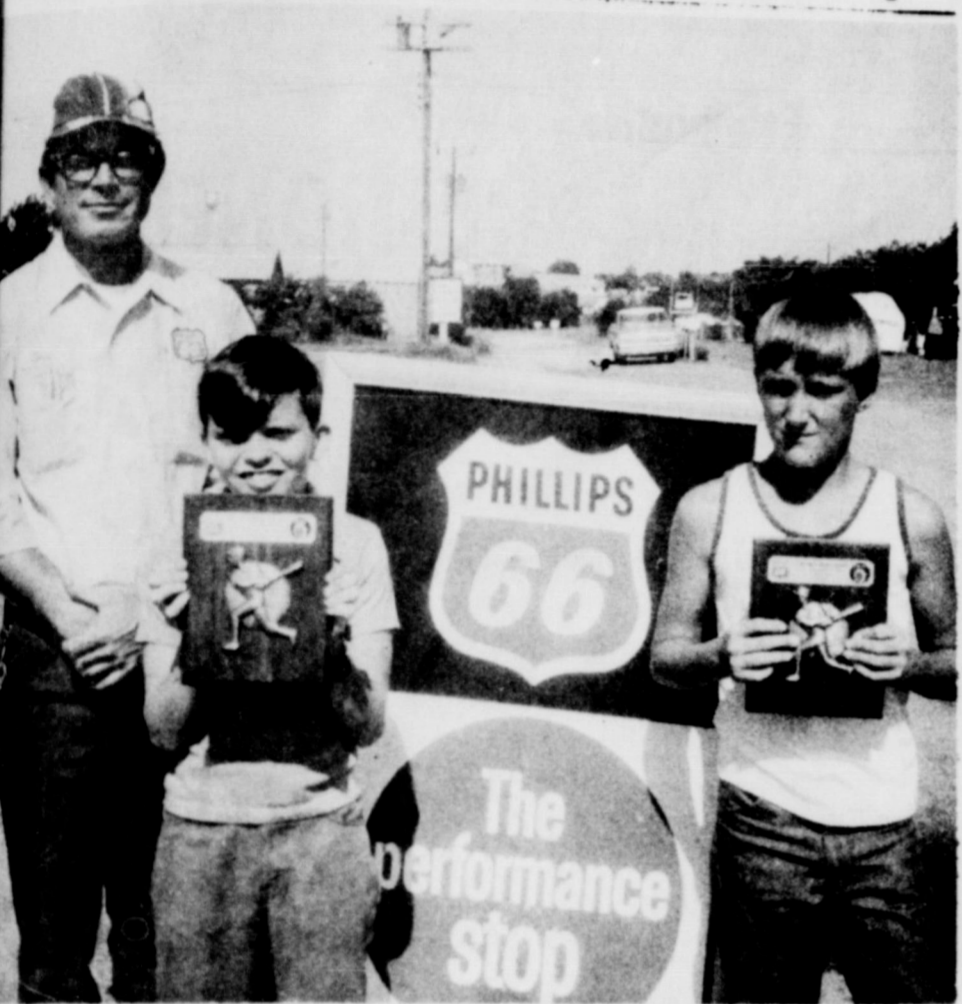

WHEELER VETERINARY CLINIC TO HOLD OPEN HOUSE SATURDAY, JUNE 24



Open House for the Wheeler Veterinary Clinic will be held Saturday afternoon from 12 noon until 6:00 P.M. west of Hi

of Wheeler on Highway 152. The all steel structure will serve as the office and clinic for Tommie A. Hennard, D.V.M. Dr. Hennard moved to Wheeler from Canadian in March.

Work was begun in April on the construction of the building to house the facilities needed for his practice. Dr. Hennard has complete facilities for the treatment of all sizes and kinds of animals. He has a dipping vat for the treatment of scabies, mites, ticks and grubs.

Dr. Hennard met with a large number of Wheeler area citizens the first of March and expressed an interest in moving to Wheeler and setting up a practice. Dr. Hennard had worked for the state for two years and desired to again enter private practice in the Panhandle. Concerning his move to Wheeler, Hennard stated, "When I was in practice in

Canadian, I not only had many people from Wheeler County use my clinic, but made many friends throughout the area.

"With the cattle and all phases of the livestock industry on the continuing upgrade, I feel that this area offers a great opportunity for a veterinarian."

Prior to selling his practice and going to work for the state, Dr. Hennard had practiced in Hemphill County for 10 years and had built up one of the largest single vet clinics in the state.

Dr. Hennard is a native of Honey Grove, Texas, and did all his college work at Texas A & M University. He received his B.S. degree in 1957 and his D.V.M. in 1959.

Dr. Hennard and his wife Betty have three daughters and one son. The family resides at 1118 Alan Bean Boulevard.

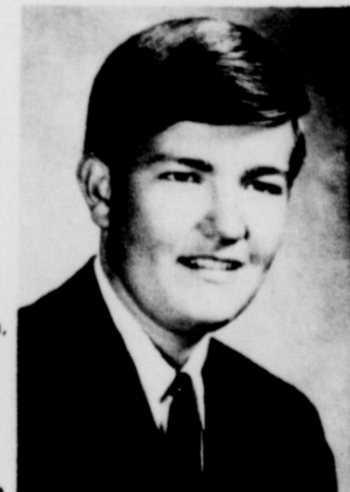
Mrs. Herd passed away Wednesday, June 13 at the Go den Spread Nursing Home in Shamrock after a lengthy illness.

Sims, a life long resident of Wheeler, obtained his Law Degree from Texas Tech this spring. Immediately

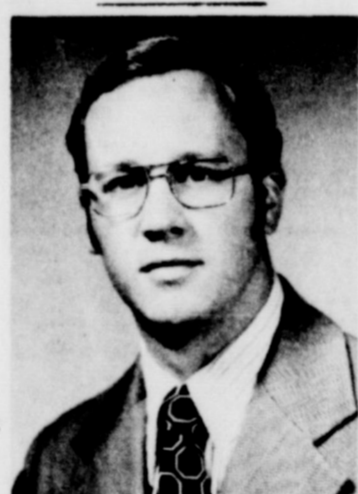
after graduation, he and his wife, Twyla, came to Wheeler and began working on the office.

Movie Chatter

Showing this weekend at the Rogue Theatre is "Celebration at Big Sur" which is a world-famed Esalen Institute, along the Pacific coast in northern Calif. started in 1962 as an occasional weekend retreat and now is a year-round seminar and workshop facility, a place where tired businessmen and frustrated families attempt to renew a nodding acquaintance with humanism. Esalen was originally called Hot Springs Lodge.

The first year of what later became the Big Sur Festival was actually a seminar on American folk music. Nancy Arlen was working at the lodge and there met an old acquaintance, Joan Baez.

They got together with folk artists and song writers and performers of their acquaintance limiting the seminar to 30 participants over and above the speakers and their own immediate entourages and friends. The Big Sur Festival has since become a part of Esalen which was named after the first festival in 1963. They tend to cater to families as opposed to an attendance exclusively by the young generation. In fact, the performers as well as their vacations around this festival. 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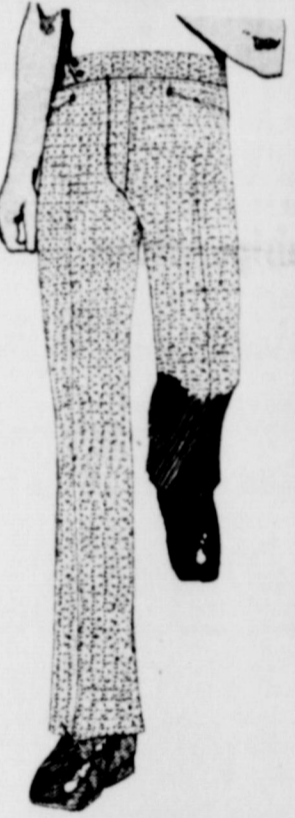

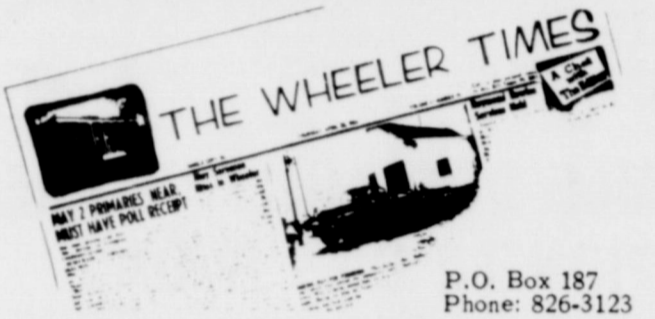

June is Dairy Month. Here
are some more dairy food
tips and recipes.

Desserts really reflect
the "homemade" touch when
you whip your own cream
topping.

Frothy puffs of fresh,
flavorful goodness are easily
whipped from heavy cream,
evaporated milk and nonfat
dry milk -- the trio of dairy
whippables, says the USDA.

Heavy cream, often labeled
whipping cream, doubles in
volume when whipped. Just
chill the cream, bowl and
beaters in the refrigerator,
then whip cream until stiff
peaks form. Add sugar and
other flavorings as desired
when cream is partially
whipped. This insures uni-
form flavoring and also
prevents over whipping cream
into butter.

Evaporated milk whips
to three times its volume.
Chill milk in freezer compart-
ment of refrigerator until fine
ice crystals form around
edges of the container.

Also chill bowl and beaters
in the refrigerator. Whip milk
until stiff, adding flavorings
desired as the milk becomes
thick. Lemon juice added
at this time helps to stabilize
the whip.

A half cup of nonfat dry
milk powder plus a half cup
of water, fresh or frozen
fruit juices or canned fruit
syrups will whip to 2 1/2 cups
of low calorie goodness.
Chill the liquid, bowl and
beaters in the refrigerator.
Stir milk powder into liquid
and beat until thick. Con-
tinue to beat until the mix-
ture is stiff and gradually
add flavorings desired and
lemon juice to stabilize the
milk.

Whipped dairy toppings
give a gala touch to dessert,
salad and entree fare. You'll

find plentiful supplies of
whipping cream, evaporated
milk, and nonfat dry milk,
now, according to USDA's
Agricultural Marketing Ser-
vice. In fact all of the many
dairy foods are in big supply.

Cheese Crisp
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup dairy sour cream
8 oz. cracker barrel cheese
(grated)

2 tsp. blue cheese (grated)
1 cup plus 2 tsp. sifted flour
2 tsp. seasoning salt
1/2 tsp. paprika
2 tsp. melted butter

Cut butter into flour. Mix
in sour cream. Divide dough
into two parts. Wrap each
part separately and chill
until firm. Preheat oven to
350°.

Roll out dough -- 1/2 at a
time -- on well floured surface
to a 12 x 6 rectangle. Sprin-
kle each half with 1 tsp. of
seasoning salt. Mix the
grated cheeses and sprinkle
half of mixture on each rec-
tangle. Roll up jeily roll
fashion. Seal edges and
ends. Brush rolls with melted
butter. Sprinkle 1/4 tsp.
paprika on each roll. Place
on cookie sheet with rolls
2 1/2 inches apart. Bake 30 to
35 min. Serve hot. Serves 10

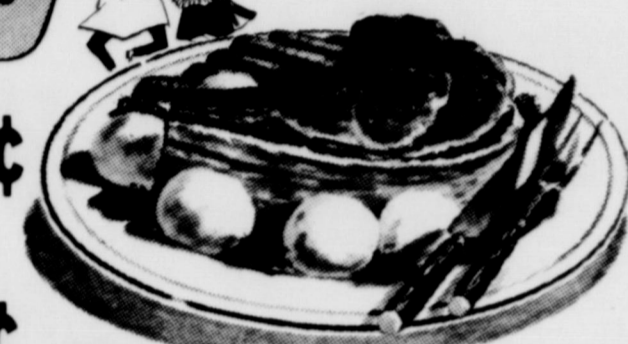
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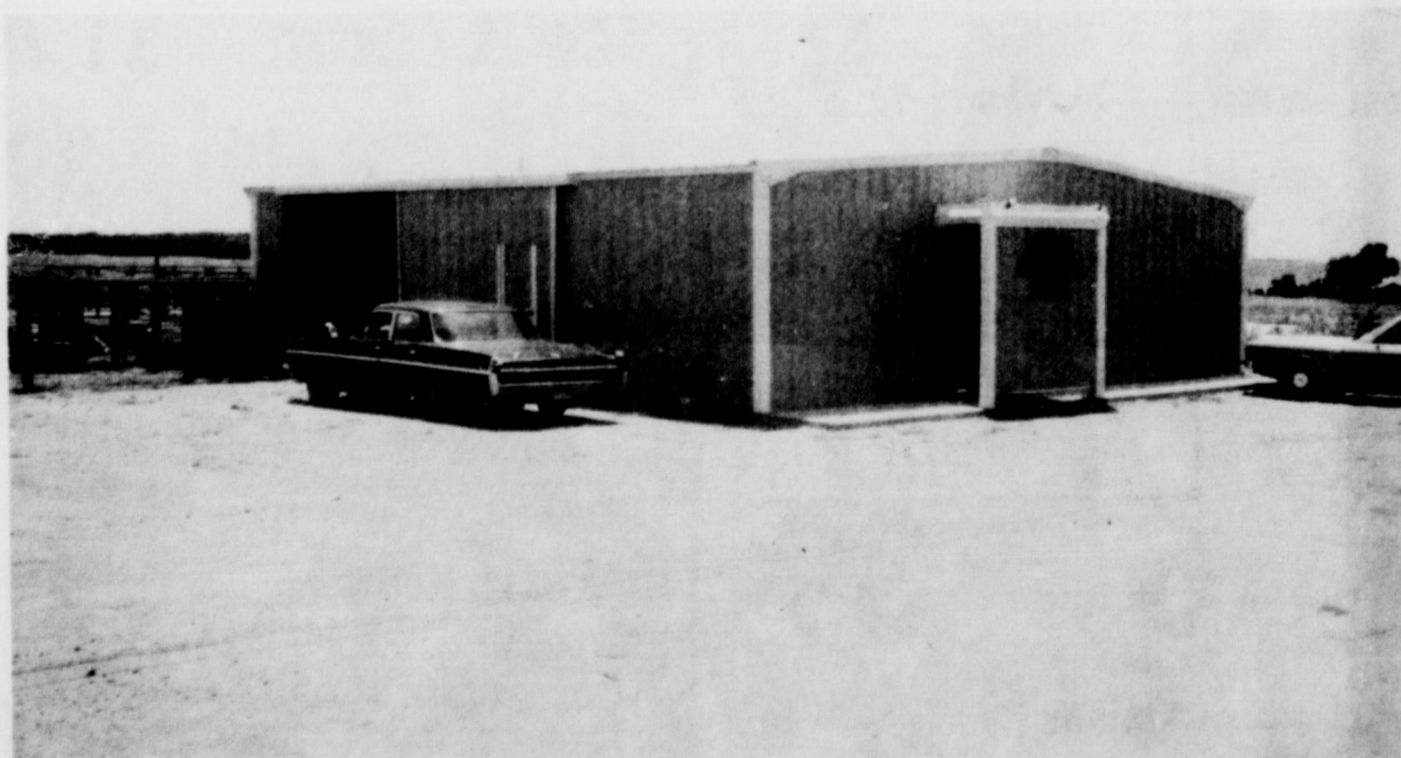

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

Across the Fence

Cotton and milo stands will probably make it. There will be crusting of the soil. Crop prospects look better than they have in several years.

A Minnesota farm publication says: a 500 pound bale of cotton, farm value \$122 - mill value of cotton thread \$407 - retail value \$6,399.

A cotton shirt sells for about \$7.50 (when you can find one that is all cotton). It takes one pound of cotton for which the farmer was paid 22-28¢.

A cotton house dress sells for about \$15. It takes 2 pounds of cotton, 44-50¢ of the price goes to the farmer. This analysis looks like we're getting the short end of the marketing stick!

Everybody continues to plant lovegrass. Sam Ross, Reed Grogan, I. A. Brooks, Jr. and Vernon Davenport from Shamrock and Gary Hardcastle from Wheeler are but a few of the folks getting a stand of grass. Lovegrass is one of the grasses that will give at least 2 months of longer grazing in the summer. Properly managed, it is a money-maker.

John Vise has his share of grasshoppers. They are also getting their share of the grass that our cows need. We accompanied John on a tour of his grassland last week. If you want to save your grass from the hoppers keep an eye open. If sufficient interest is shown in an area and a sanctuary isn't being provided, then a cost share spray program might be of assistance to you.

With the continued upswing in horse power of farm tractors, some farm people are experiencing hearing losses. Certain danger signals from the effects of loud noises are ringing ears or head noises that persist for a few hours after you get off the tractor, following a day's work. Another sign of trouble is when your own speech seems muffled after you've been around loud noise for an extended period.

Researchers say that noise becomes potentially damaging at 85 decibels. For comparison, ordinary conversation comes in at about 60 decibels, the average radio at 70 decibels and a pneumatic drill at 90 decibels.

A South Dakota study which showed most farm tractors tested made enough noise -- above 85 decibels -- to be potentially dangerous to hearing found the farmers involved wearing accoustical ear muffs reduced the noise to comfortable and acceptable levels. Initial discomfort from wearing the muffs lessened as farmers became used to them.

In Canada a test showed farmers have a greater loss of hearing than the general public. The test also showed that hearing loss is increased the longer farmers spent operating tractors.

Don't take the chance of having your hearing damaged by long exposure to tractor noise. A pair of accoustical ear muffs could be an important investment.

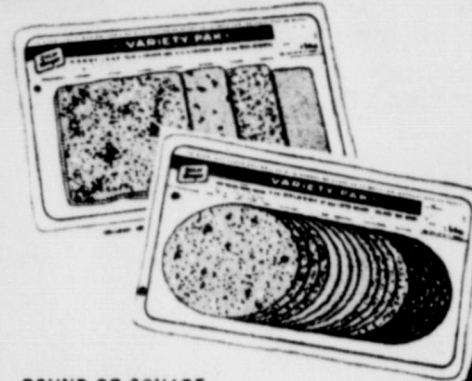
