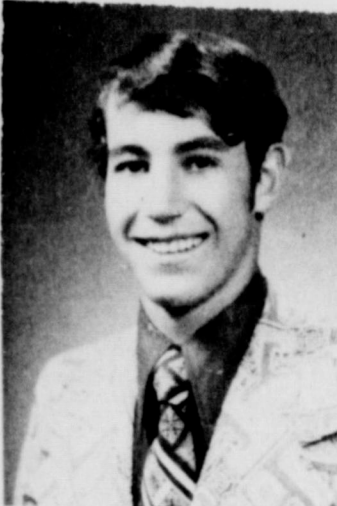

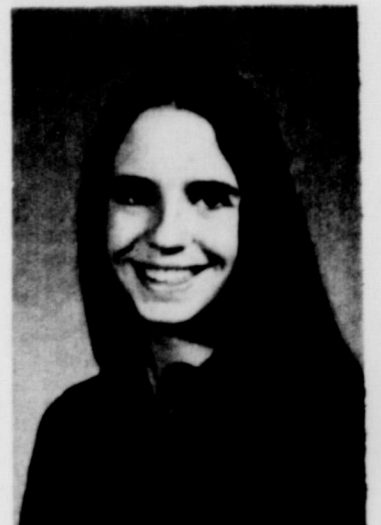

Students are: Durwood Adams, Jr., a Belinda Wilhelm, Ric Helton, Doris Adams, Mary Jane Adams.

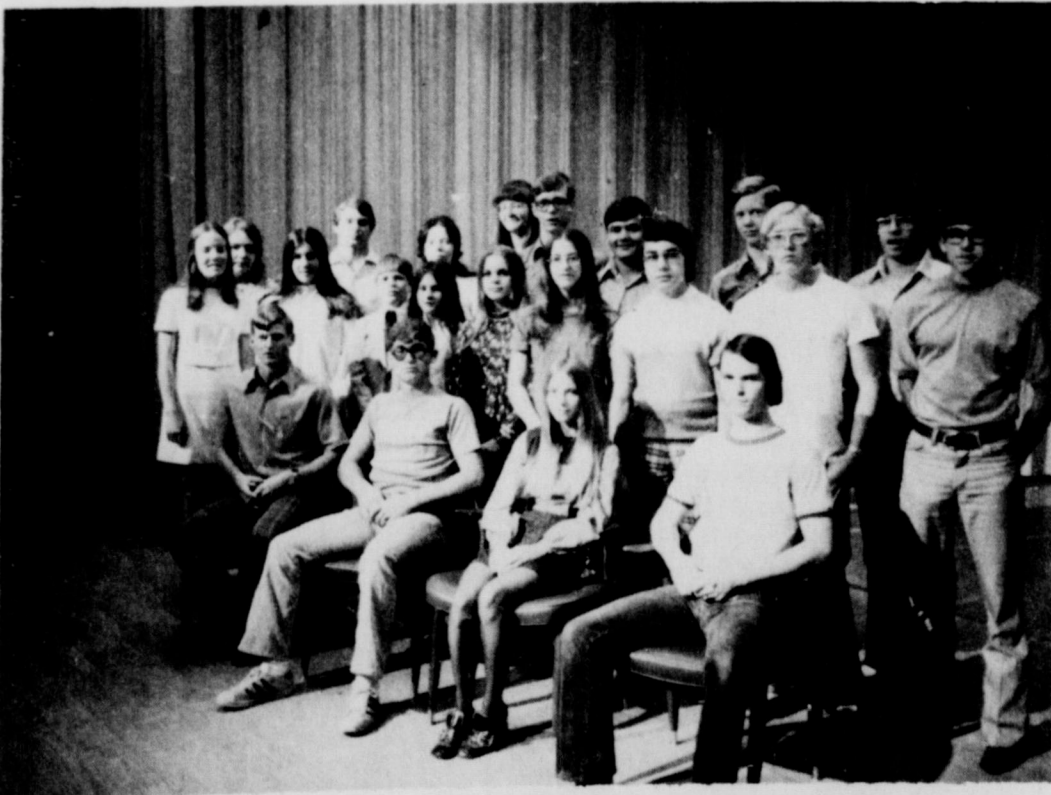

Three Wheeler Co. 4-H'ers will compete in the 1973 Texas 4-H Roundup at College Station June 5-6.

They earned the right to compete by taking top honors at the district contest held at West Texas State University at Canyon, Texas on May 5.

The Texas 4-H Roundup is held each June on the campus of Texas A & M University. It is designed to give 4-H members the opportunity to match their skills in 33 different contest areas through demonstrations, judging teams, food preparation and other forms of competition.

Wheeler County 4-H'ers participating in the Roundup will be Steve Gaines, Wheeler competing in the Pasture Management Contest with a demonstration entitled Black-sheep Grass, Mary Puryear, Briscoe competing in the Snacks and Beverages division of the State 4-H Food Show. She will give a demonstration on Pumpkin Pie Squares. Charlotte Smith, Shamrock, will compete in the Public Speaking Division.

"The Texas 4-H Roundup represents many things to these young people," said County Extension Agents Max Hatter and Mrs. Rodney Chambers, in praising the achievements of the 4-hers. The fun, excitement and challenge of participating in the Roundup becomes one of

the major highlights of their lives, especially if they win and go on to national competition.

"We firmly believe that the rigors of competition sharpen these 4-Hers not only in skills and decision-making but also in helping them become self-disciplined, confident, and outstanding citizens of tomorrow," they said.

Max Hatter (CEA) emphasized that local volunteer adult and junior leaders played a key role in helping 4-H members reach state competition.

"Without the help of these leaders," he said, "they probably would not have been able to achieve a rich 4-H experience."

To qualify for state competition participants must be enrolled, actively participating in 4-H, and conducting a 4-H project during the current year. They must be between the ages of 14 and 19. Teams and individuals must be one of the two high scoring teams in their district contest.

Mrs. Chambers said that the Food Show group will leave for the Roundup June 3, Public Speaker and Method Demonstrations will leave June 5. Accompanying them will be Mrs. Everett Smith, 4-H leader for the Shamrock Public Speaking Club and Mrs. Jeff Puryear, 4-H leader from Briscoe 4-H Club and The County Extension Agents.

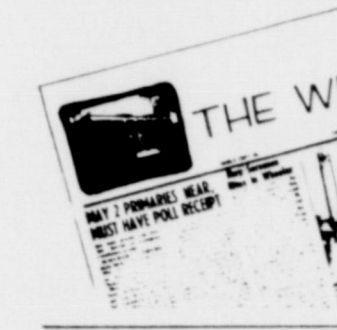

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# Across the Fence

Prospects for a bumper wheat crop were never better. Coy Reviours, Wheeler, who is a wheat pro says so. Although he cites the potential hail and drying winds as deterrent against getting to the market. It is real pretty. It would certainly be educational, I think for some of the city folks to take a Sun. afternoon drive with their youngsters to see this years crop and see where their bread and cereal comes from.

It would also be a good lesson for them in economics since it takes a \$20,000 to \$25,000 combine, \$7,000 truck, and \$4500 pickup, \$2000 stalk shredder, or \$2500 disc, and \$7000 to \$14,000 average tractor to grow the crop. Considering that a loaf of bread costs only 31¢ to 41¢, it should be pointed out to the youngsters what a bargain a loaf of bread is. We hope that the price of wheat and beef will remain at a decent level so our farmers can have some kind of decent return for their labor in investment.

Ever so often I get a Card of letter from someone commenting about something I said in this column. I'm always happy to get opinion s from other people, and I welcome suggestions and questions. Naturally I can't print them all because of lack of space. Probably the greatest compliment we had recently was when those farmers and ranchers in Mississippi and Alabama saw our article on lovegrass in the March issue of Progressive Farmer and wrote us. As a rule, we County Agents are usually reluctant to recommend anything we haven't tried ourselves. Several years ago I planted several acres of lovegrass on my own farm in Central Texas. It attracted so much interest among local farmers and the cattle o, the place did so well on it that a lot of lovegrass is being seeded down there this year. It does better o, than I do a better on the lighter land.

The heavier soils are not as readily established as many of our folks here have found out. Here is a little note from Mr. George Goodrich in Woodville Jississippi who apparently read the article in the magazine: "Dear Sir: Could you tell me where I can locate this lovegrass. If so please let me know or send me about 10 pounds for a trial. Sincerely George Goodrich

Smile alfalfa farmers Smile! The alfalfa weevil has taken his toll of the first cutting. However you stand a good chance of saving the next cuttings. Cut and swath the alfalfa anget it off the field as soon as possible to offer the weevils very little protection from the rays of the sun. A lot of spraying has done no good in killing the weevils. The adult stage is not destructive.

Grasshoppers are thick as hair on a dog's back. Looks like they will eat a lot of grass up before they're done. If you're having a problem with hoppers, talk to your neighbors early. We still have the Federal Grasshopper Control Program available that we used in 1966 when the grasshoppers were so bad. This has been a long winter. Don't let the grasshoppers eat the grass your cattle need. For the first time in 20years you stand a chance to get what your product is worth in the market place.

To the Small Farmer: Get going before other farmers cut their own throats by overplanting all the acreage to soybean, wheat, corn and mila. Take the Yellow Out! Yellowing of Petunias, roses and other garden plants is a symptom of iron chlorosis. The plant loses its green color and eventually dies. We take a teaspoon of iron sulfate or coppras that we can buy readily at the drug store and mix it with a gallon of water. Add a teaspoon of liquid household detergent and spray this on the leaves of the yellow plants to the run off point. The result are a most immediate. Within 48 hours the plant greens up. Repeat every few days in severe cases. Soil additives are worthless as such. Don't throw your money away on them.

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# CHATS WITH GLORIA

few more weeks will turn out for the Here are some for fun at home for folks.

For finger painting, a smooth, washable surface is needed. The table will need to be in oilcloth or papers if it is a top which might be injured. When the weather permits, outdoors is a good place for finger painting.

The paper for finger painting needs to be glazed on

one side. Ordinary shelf paper that comes in rolls is satisfactory. A piece of oilcloth may be used also. Oilcloth does not give the child the satisfaction of having a finished painting.

**HOME MADE FINGER PAINTS**  
 Laundry starch - 3/4 cup  
 Cold water  
 Soap flakes - 1 1/2 cups  
 Boiling water - 1 Quart  
 Coloring (cake or frosting colors, bluing or water colors paints or poster paint)  
 Mix the starch with a little cold water. Pour the mixture slowly into one quart of rapidly boiling water. Stir constantly until the mixture thickens; when it cools

slightly, as the soap flakes. Stir well. Divide into three or four parts and color each part a different color.

Finger painting is done on a piece of glazed paper of a size that will fit easily on the table. Wet it on both sides, put it down on the table, shiny side up, and smooth out all wrinkles with wet hands. With a spoon put a scant teaspoonful of paint on the paper, with wet hands smear the paint over the paper, using both hands and a free arm and shoulder motion. Many effects can be obtained with fingers, fingernails and fists. When the painting is finished, pull

it off the table, and hang it up to dry. When dry, the painting may be pressed on the back with a hot iron. Cleaning up afterwards should always be a part of finger painting.

Stand up to use free movement of body. Paint using whole arm, flat or palm, side of hand, or finger tips for variety of effects. For all over patterns, borders, diagonals, decorative effects, naturalistic imaginative, press down firmly for light and dark values. Blend in other colors for brilliancy

and contract harmony. Have fun doing it! Remove from table top carefully, lay on news paper to dry. Children delight in modeling. In some parts of the state there are clays that can be used for modeling. Try the kind that is near where you live. Several kinds of clay can be bought. They may be sold in powdered form which can be mixed with water or by the pound as moist clay.

Modeling materials may be made at home:  
 1 cup flour  
 3 tsp. alum  
 enough water to hold together  
 1/2 cup salt  
 vegetable coloring  
 Mix as for dough and bread to consistency of clay  
 This modeling material will remain soft for weeks if it is kept in a moist cloth.  
 Pasting is another activity which is interesting for children. Try this recipe for homemade paste:  
 1 cup flour  
 1 tsp. benzoate of soda (keeps paste from drying)  
 3 cups water  
 Addition wintergreen flavor makes paste more like commercial kind  
 Prepare as for starch and boil 5 minutes.  
 Pour into old cold cream jars. These jars wrapped attractively made an acceptable gift.

Nothing's as loving as something from the oven. Cinnamon rolls and muffins were popping out of the oven last Friday. Wheeler County 4-H leaders received training on training on these products for the annual 4-H Bake Show. Among those present were: Aline Corse, Zana Corse, Kay Batton, Shannon Batton, Shonda Quarles, Cindy Meek, Phobe Meek, and Martha Meek.

A Wheeler County home-maker has had problems with success of baking two Bundt cake in the oven at one time. If anyone else has had this problem, here are some hints... The pan or pans should be placed as near the center of the oven as possible. If two or more are used, they should not be placed directly over one another nor so close to one

another on the same shelf as to interfere with the circulation of air.  
 Also, perhaps the bundt pans were not of the same material. The material of which the pan is made influences the product by the rate at which it absorbs heat. Bright aluminum or new tin pans give a lightly browned crust, desirable in cakes. Dull aluminum (Dull by long use), dark teflon, or glass pans produce a thicker brown crust appropriate for bread and pastry. The makers of oven glassware recommend baking at a temperature 25 degrees lower than called for in the recipe.  
 Remember, two cooks equal in intelligence and experience, working with equally good equipment in individual kitchens, will not produce identical results. The differences may be due to the ingredients, the manipulation, the measurements, and in a very small measure to luck.  
 Here's a spring recipe we have found to be quite tasty.  
**Chantilly Cake**  
 1 yellow cake mix  
 1 teaspoon mace  
 Filling  
 1 cup orange juice  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 2 envelopes unsweetened gelatin  
 1 small can crushed pineapple, drained  
 1 pint sliced strawberries  
 1 cup whipping cream  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 Prepare the yellow cake mix as directed on the package adding mace to mix. Bake in two round 9" cake pans Cool. Slice each layer in half to make 4 layers. Heat orange juice, sugar, and gelatin until the gelatin dissolves. Cook gelatin mixture in refrigerator until it begins to thicken. Beat whipping cream and add vanilla, strawberries, and pineapple. Fold gelatin mixture into cream and fill between each layer. Refrigerate cake for at least three hours before serving.

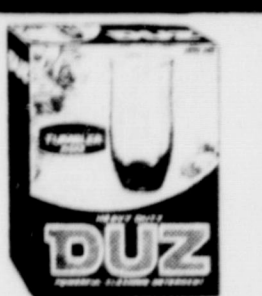

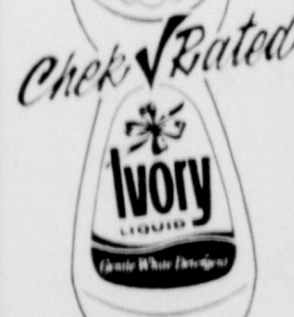
