a transcript for college, job, or scholarship application. Membership must be maintained each year on these same four dimemsions. Each member's record is reviewed periodically to determine his continuing membership. Any member who deliberately violates a school or civil law

or acts in a manner unbecoming a member of the National Honor Society is sub ject to dismissal after receiving a written warning.

Election to the Honor Society of Wheeler is based on the National requirements. Students are evaluated by the principal and faculty members on the basis of four areas: Leadership, Service, Character, and Scholarship. The first requirements for membership is that the student must have a B average or better. To rate high in Leadership the student must take a constuctive lead in classroom and school activities, contribute constructive ideas, and show initiative in his studies. Service is rated on the basis of contribution not for personal gain but for the class,

school, and community as a whole; on courtesy to all; and on representation in various types of competition. responsibility of meeting obligations to the school and teacher; by highest standards of attitude toward honesty, reliability, fairness, and tolerence for others; by willing cooperation with all

Repeat every few days in severe cases. Soil additives are worthless as such. Don't throw your money away on them.



A Wheeler County homemaker has had problems with success of baking two Bundt cake in the oven at one time. If anyone else has had this problem, here are some hints... The The pan or pans should be placed as near the center of the oven as possible .. If two or more are used, they should not be

another nor so close to one

another on the same shelf as to interfere with the circulation of air.

Also, perhaps the bundt pans were not of the same material. The material of which the pan is made influences the product by the rate at which it absorbes heat. Bright aluminum or new tin pans give a lightly browned crust, desirable in cakes. Dull aluminum (Dulled by long use), dark teflon, or glass pans produce a thicker browner crust appropriate for bread and pastry. The makers of oven glassware recomenough water to hold together mend baking at a temperature 25 degrees lower than called

for in the receipe. Remember, two cooks equal in intelligence and experience, working with equally good equipment in individual kitchens, will not produce identical results. The differences may be due to the ingredients, the

manipulation, the measurements, and in a very small measure to.luck. Here's a spring recipe we have found to be quite tasty Chantilly Cake yellow cake mix teaspoon mace Filling 1 cup orange juice 1/2 cup sugar 2 envelopes unsweetened gelatin 1 small can crushed pineapple, drained pint sliced strawberries cup whipping cream teaspoon vanilla Prepare the yellow cake mi as directed on the package adding mace to mix. Bake in two round 9" cake pans Cool. Slice each layer in half to make 4 layers. Heat orange juice, sugar, and gelatin until the gelatin dissolves. Cook gelatin mixture in refrigerator until it begins to thicken. Beat whipping cream and add vanilla, strawberries, and pineapple. Fold gelatin mixture into cream and fill between each layer.
