Dr. Sone served in Nanking until 1951, two years after the communist take-over of mainlandChina. In that year, heleft China and was transferred to Singapore, Malaya (now a part of Malayasia.) He was appointed to the faculty of the union Trinity Theological College in Singapore, where many Methodist ministers and church leaders in Malaya and the nations of Southeast Asia are trained. He taught and served as President of that college until his retire-

Dr. Sone grew up in Plainview and attended Clarendon College, taught school in Dumas before he became a missionary.

Most of the 60,000 veterans returning to civilian life each month will be buying homes that are comparable in quality to the homes many World War II veterans 'traded up' to after years of building equity in their less expensive first homes.

Jack Coker of the Waco Veterans Admini stration Kegional Office said that nationally 130,000 veterans have applied for loans under the 1966 G.I. Bill. Many of the homes bought by this group, he says, arein the \$17,000 class. The average home bought on a G.I. loan immediately after World War Il cost \$5,395.

Vietnam era veterans and cold war veterans are eligible for home loans and most other benefits on the same basis as veterans of other wars. They must have at least 181 days active military service with at least one day of that service after January 31, 1955. Veterans can get a VA guarantee for up to \$7,500 of a home loan. Coker said, for 10 years after di scharge: plus one year for each three months of active duty

It was the World II G.I. loan program, Coker theorizes, that accounted for much of the upgrading in homes for veterans. World War II veteranspurchased homes at the rate of half a million per year, he said, and few could afford down payments. A VA guarantee allowed them to get loans from private lenders and the equity they

Congressmen, Senators, Governors, former President Eisenhower and others, re cently released a report and recommendations titled, 'Revitalizing Our Rural Areas." This report called the attention to the fact that our rural areas are being de pleted of people while 70 percent of the population now clusters in cities that cover one percent of our land area. If present trends continue unchecked, by the year 2000 A.D., 80 percent of our people will beliving in metropolitan areas and most of

them will be crammed into five super strip-cities. This urban crush not only creates problems in the already overcrowded cities but by depopulating the country side, creates problems in the rural areas from where

From 1950 to 1960 the rural population - farm plus non-farm - declined by 400,000 rest among certain minorit while the urban population increased by 28 million. Since %0 the farm population has been declining at the rate of about 6 percent. And these people move into our great aties without necessarily desiring it and almost by de-

they came.

The total return to farmers

simply is not large enough provide enough income ! wages for agricultural labor to attract workers from the cities where they can drax relief checks and do no work at all.

This is forcing farmers to adopt every possible mecha ization to get their crops planted, cultivated and ha vested. The machinery is very costly and is beyong means of the smaller and medium-sized farmers. The are going out of business. The larger farmers with credit resources and the small family groups who wer for less than a living wage are the only ones able to survive.

And, unless we confi a way to pay fair prices to ne production of food. w are headed for a corporate type, conglomerate agricu ture that will force thousands and thousands more

rural people into the cities The American people w some balance between the rural and the urban sectors There should be some opport tunity for those who wish to live in the country to find decent work there and to have access to reasonably good education and health services.

And the flood of migrant is no better for the cities than for the declining rura

The result of this economic imbalance has been substandard housing, polluted air, uncontrolled crime i the streets, congested high ways, rundown schools and growing discontent and ungroups.

Do you wash it or dry clean There are so many textiles on the market to day, that how to clean the fabrics is no longer a simple problem of wash or dry clean. So don't fret when you don't have the answers on how to clean them all. Very few people

Many of today's fabrics are blends. Cleaning characteristics vary with the kinds of fibers combined and the proportions used. Some of the blends that are rated as having good wash; and-wear qualities are as follows: 65% or more Dacron with cotton; 55% or more Dacron with rayon; 50% or more Dacron with Orlon; 75% or more Orlan with rayon; 70% or more with Orlon with wool; 80% or more Achian with cotton; 70% or more Acrilan

with rayon's 70% or more

ROLLS

Acrilan with wool; 55% or more Kodel with rayon; 50% book. or more Kodel with cotton; 70% or more Kodel with wool; and 50% or more Kodel with Orlon.

Also keep in mind the slip, suit or etc. A dress made of washable fabric could be trimmed with a material whose color would run.

The National Institute of Dry Cleaning suggests these i deas to protect yourself.

Do not buy products that do not carry complete clean. ing instructions, that you do not know to clean from previous experience, or that the store can't tell you how

2. Don't throw away hang tags. Keep information handy 3. Read labels carefully, particularly the small type with detailed instructions 4. In some cases you may be able to locate a brand with a round seal with the words 'Certified Washable, American Institute of Laundering" meaning that sample of the product have passed the institute's test for washability.

5. Where shrinkage is important, look for a manufacturer's guarantee. When not guaranteed, buy the article a size larger and let it shrink to shape.


