The song can be sung in a variety of ways. In Great Britain and the United States, it often becomes a game song in which each person, following a leader in repetitions, must pay a forfeit if he misses a line. Sometimes the descriptions of the gifts turn into mouthdefying tongue twisters!

Burning the Log

From a miraculous Star to a tiny candle, gleaming lights have cast a glow over holiday festivities for centuries.

Pagan sun-worshippers lit candles and kindled fires at winter festivals to help the returning sun gain strength.

Traditional for both light and warmth is the blazing Yule log. Like all "Christmas lights," it has both a religious and a festive significance in holiday lore.

Because legend says that the Christ Child was washed and dressed beside an ash wood fire, the people of early England always had Yule logs of ash wood. Ash had a practical aspect, too, because it was the only green wood which would The Yule log of England and

continental Europe was often believed to have mystical powers to protect the home. To give this protection, the Yule log had to be kept burning all through the 12 days of Christ-

Later, the "blazing Yule" was primarily associated with the feasting and festivity of the winter holidays.

"/ git - before you buy your toys, stop and think! for a toy? Is it just for entertainment? A toy developes imagination, creativity, skills, talents and values. Let's take for an example a a doll--the basic human need to love and express affection. As little girls cuddle baby dolls, they learn how to be a girl and identify with their mother. They pretend dolls are their babies. They love them. They play at being nurturing mothers and housewives. They are developing imagination and values.

On the other hand there are fashion dolls. A fashion doll is too old and grown up to be a baby. Her features are too small for clumsy preschool fingers to dress. Fashion dolls represent many beautiful clothes and good looks! Little girls learn to expect to be valued by increasing wardrobe and their ability to manipulate their fathers and later husbands

Children love role playing with puppets, dolls, dress-up clothes, house-keeping kits, farm equipment, science toys What need does a child have or building equipment. Red Cross News

The national chapter of the American Red Cross has gone the second mile in aiding a disaster victim in Mobeetie, Mrs. Shackleford, an old age pensioner, told disaster representatives at the time of the storm she was not covered by insurance but her family would repair her home. Some three months later she asked the aid of the Red Cross in getting her home fixed before cold weather. It has now been repaired at total Red Cross expense and she is happy. Out thanks to Cicero with his case. This brings to a total over \$1000 spent in our county for disaster aid plus hours of volunteer labor. This brings to three the number of disaster vicing their storm of last July.

In addition to this some 25 calls, local and long distance, have been placed through the Red Cross to and for Servicemen overseas and at home this month. This brings the years total calls in behalf of Servicemen to 105. The robin seemed to understand that something wondrous was happening. After the departure of the Magi, when the Holy Family was asleep, the robin noticed that the stable fire was dying. Only a few coals smoldered.

In a valiant attempt to revive the flickering embers, the robin swooped down to fan the

Hovering above the coals, he flapped his wings, fanning the embers to life. As the fire burned brighter, flames singed the robin's breast, scorching his brown feathers a brilliant red gold.

Through the night he fanned the fire to keep the Child warm. Ever since, the robin has worn a red vest, symbolizing his gift.

As a Christmas symbol, the robin embodies the spirit of giving. Like the Magi, the robin gave a precious gift, and he gave it at the cost of personal sacrifice. Thus the robin's gift suggests the deeper meaning - the giving of one's self - the legend notes

On November 11, 1967, the people of Texas voted in favor of a Constitutional Amendment which authorizes the reopening of the Veterans State Land Program.

This program, will as in the past, be administered by the Veterans Land Board, a division of the General Land Office, in Ausin, Texas. The Board has announced that they expect to make a bond sale sometime during mid-December 1967, and that they expect to have money to commence processing applications for land loans by January 15, 1967.

The Board does not propose to have any numbering or other type of waiting list for this program. They expect to be able to process the loan applications as they are received. Because of this, veterans should be adthey wish to buy before asking the Board for the loan application papers. The Board has stated that they will accept letters, telephone calls, telegrams or any other type of communication on and after January 15, 1968 and will return by mail the loan application papers to the vetern who asks for

Even those who entered service from other state other than Texas may now be eligible after they have legally resided in Texas for a period of 5 years. The maximum loan will be \$10,000 repayable in terms of up to 40 years. The minimum size permitted for a purchase under this program is 15 acres, with no mineral right requir-

Many other dolls in the Pryor collection make it plain that mechanical accomplishments are by no means limited to the dolls of today. For instance, a group of early American dolls includes the "Autoperipatetikos"-a walking doll patented in 1862.

Another kind of ingenuity is manifest in the craft dolls, lovingly fashioned by thoughtful hands from virtually any and every convenient material - pen wipers, shells, newspapers, wishbones, sponges, corn cobs, pine cones, pipecleaners, clay pipes, even an old potato
