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MUSTANGS CLOSE SEASON

Taking advantage of a big break in the fourth quarter, the Clarendon Broncos put the damper to the hopes of the Wheeler Mustangs last Friday night and went away from Nicholson Field with a 7-0 victory and the District 2-A championship.
A capacity crowd watched as the game turned into a defensive battle from the opening kickoff with both teams slugging it out between the 20's.
Clarendon, by virtue of the victory, goes on to Bidistrict play and will meet the Gruber Greyhounds at Berger this Saturday night at 7:30. The Mustangs ended

their season with a 5-5 record and a third place finish in the district.
The Mustangs put the Broncos deep in the hole early in the first quarter when Dave Britt kicked out on the Broncho 6. Forcing Clarendon to punt, the Mustangs got the ball at the Broncho 43 but this mild threat vanished as the Broncos held Wheeler to 3 yards in three downs. Having the chance to put the visitors deep in the hole once more was wiped out as Britt sliced a punt only 9 yards out of bounds on the Clarendon 31.
The first quarter ended with the Mustangs having made the only first down and it was apparent that both clubs would have trouble scoring.
Midway of the second period, Ware fumbled and Monroe recovered for the Broncos at the Mustang 39 to give the Broncos a break. A 15 yard penalty and a 12 yard loss by Mooring got it back as he broke off his right tackle on a keeper and went 29 yards to the Mustang 31. Louis got the Broncos only first down of the half on the next play at the 28. Picking up seven yards in three cracks at the line forced the Broncos into what appeared to be a field goal try on fourth down. Mooring went through the motions of putting the ball down for the kick and rose up and passed downfield, but the receiver couldn't hold on and the pass dropped free and the Mustangs took over.
Clarendon made their only other real threat on their first possession in the third quarter. Following a punt to the Broncho 15 the Mustangs dug in but Clarendon came out from this danger point and in a hurry. Louis got 33 big yards on second down and the ball was on the Mustang 46. After a gain of five, Mooring gave the pigskin to Land and he rambled for 20 to the Wheeler 21. Having their backs to the wall, the Mustangs limited the Broncos to 7 yards and took over on downs at the 14.
With 10:04 still to play, the Mustangs were forced into a punting situation at their 30 yard line. What had looked like a scoreless duel quickly found the Mustangs on the short end of the score. The snap sailed over Britt's head and when the ball was finally recovered it was in the Mustang end zone and Everett Monroe was draped on it for the Broncos. Phillip Logan put the ball through the uprights and that proved to be the old ball game.
The closest to the Broncho goal the Mustangs were able to get in the remaining time was to the 29 where they lost the ball on downs.
The Clarendon loss was the final game in the black and gold for the following Mustangs: Fred Goad, Bobby Ware, Frankie Rogers, Jamie Whitener, Mike Holt, Richard Sechrest, Dwight Richard and Tommy Puryear.

BANQUET WILL HONOR CONGRESSMAN BOB PRICE

Don Earney of Wheeler and John Hrcira, Jr. of Shamrock have been named Wheeler County ticket sales chairmen for the Nov. 17 fund raising dinner in Amarillo honoring Cong. Bob Price on completion of his first year as Panhandle representative.
Cong. Gerald R. Ford of Michigan, House Republican Leader, will be featured speaker. Also attending will be Cong. George Bush of Houston, 1964 U.S. Senate Candidate.
Cong. Ford has been the leader of recent successful attempts in the House of Representatives to reduce Federal spending in hopes of avoiding the necessity of a tax increase this year.
A strong believer in the maximum use of American conventional air and sea power in Vietnam, Cong. Ford has called for attacks on all significant military targets and a blockade of the port of Haiphong in order to bring the war to a speedy conclusion.
Like Panhandle Congressman Price, the Michigan congressman has also been an outspoken critic of Administration welfare legislation and has offered alternatives to Great Society programs.

Wheeler County Voters Against Amendments

Wheeler County voters turned down each of the six amendments to the Texas Constitution. Balloting was very light in Saturday's election.
Here's how Wheeler County voted on the state amendments:
No. 1, for consolidating county taxes: 105 for, 248 against.
No. 2, for municipal health service: 169 for, 182 against.
No. 3, Veterans' Land Fund: 156 for, 188 against.
No. 4, county medical aid: 156 for, 197 against.
No. 5, park development fund: 124 for, 226 against.
No. 6, dual employment for state employees: 106 for, 236 against.
A total of 357 votes were cast in the constitutional amendments election. Total votes cast at each box: Mobeetie--43; Briscoe--8; Wheeler--53; Allison--16; Stanley--39; McBee--10; Twitty--15; Pagan--15; Heald--15; Lela--10; Shamrock--90; Shamrock--34; Kelton--4; and Absecon--14.

The Wheeler Colts ended their season last Thursday night at Groom and were victorious 8-0.
The win gave the Colts a 3-2 record for the year and they ended up in third place in the district race behind Clarendon and White Deer.
For awhile at Groom it appeared that the Colts were going to run into too many red flags to come out on top.
Rodney Weatherly ran the opening kickoff back 80 yards for an apparent TD but the referee said he stepped out of bounds on the Cub 33. Two plays later, Archie Trimble found daylight at right end and went over untouched from the 33 but a red flag was thrown and the Colts were assessed 15 for clipping.
Groom drove deep into Colt territory late in the first half and again the penalties against the Colts were a factor in the drive. The first half ended with the Colts holding on downs inside their 10 yard line.
Neither team really threatened in third period on this cold night and it was midway of the final period before the colts hooked up for a 55 yard drive that ended with the only touchdown of the night.
Archie Trimble skirted his right end from 12 yards out for the score and Jimmy Cole got the two pointer for the one and only time the Colts got to the end zone without being flagged down.
This was the final game for 15 eighth graders who will be striving to make the Mustang varsity next year.

Pvt. Larry Henry Completes Basic

Marine Private Larry D. Henry, son of Mr. and Mrs. J.R. Henry of Twitty, was graduated from eight weeks of recruit training at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot in San Diego, Calif.
He will now undergo from two to four weeks of individual combat training and then after leave at home, will report to his first Marine Corps assignment.
The intensified Marine recruit training emphasizes rigid physical conditioning and survival techniques, both at sea and ashore, to develop self-confidence and endurance. Marksmanship with the M-14 rifle and 45 caliber pistol are equally stressed and close order drill instills the traditions of Marine Corps teamwork.
A thorough study of basic military, hygiene, first aid and sanitation and the customs, courtesies, history and mission of the Marine Corps serve to polish the new Marine's recruit education and prepare him to join the Marine combat forces.

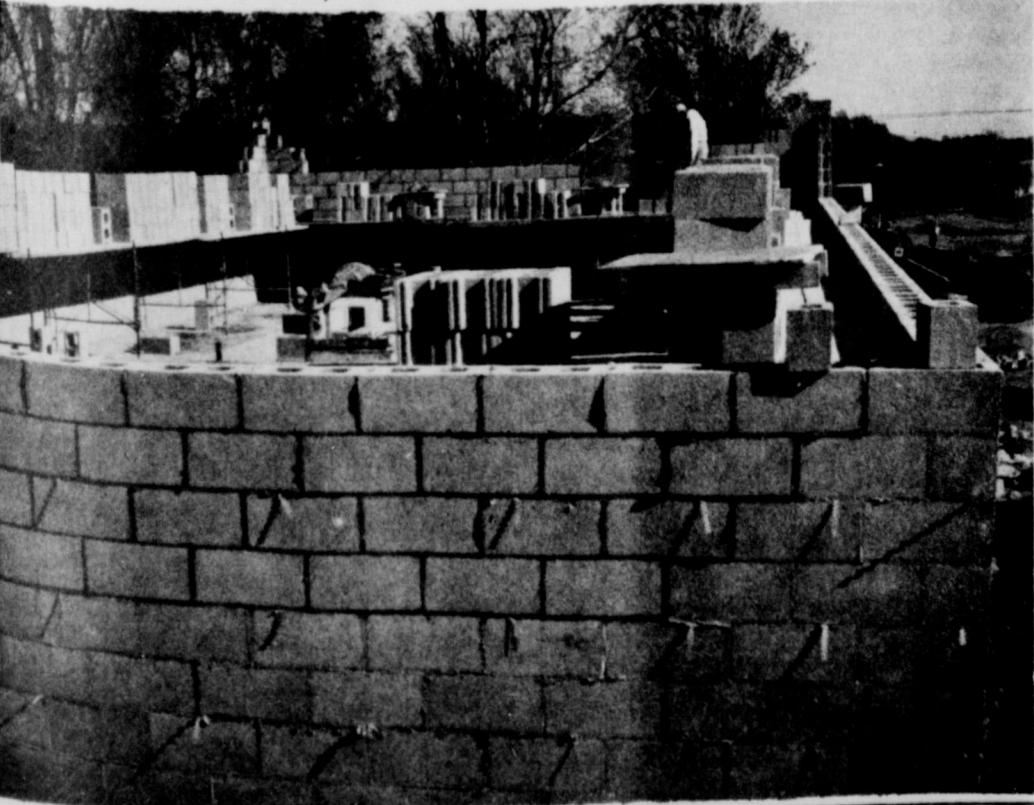

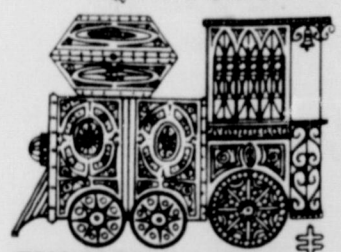

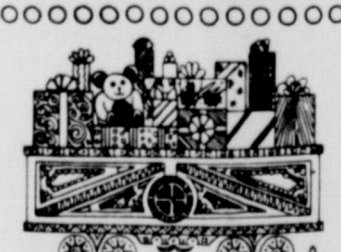

THANKSGIVING DAY--History, Meal

Thanksgiving day com-
memorates the harvest of the
Plymouth Colony in 1621.
The colonists had endured
a long hard winter. Being
pleased with the plentiful
harvest, the colonists invited
the nearby Indians to cele-
brate their good fortune. A
national day of thanks was
proclaimed by George Wash-
ington for November 26,
1789. The custom was lost
along the way and was later
revived by Lincoln in 1863.
In 1941 Congress made a res-
olution for Thanksgiving

Thursday in November. Since
then the holiday has been
celebrated at that time. But
has it really been celebrated?
Yes, we do eat a big meal
and watch football games all
day long - but what about the
celebrating in the heart. Do
we truly feel thankfulness.

that we live in a nation in
which the people have more
freedom than any other in
the world, or do we take it
for granted? Take if for
granted like our big dinner
and football games.

This Thanksgiving let's

Since four wild turkeys
were served at the Pilgrims
first Thanksgiving, the cus-
tomary meat served at the
holiday is turkey. Do you
know what to look for in the
turkey you will buy?

Size of the ready to cook
bird may range from 4 to 24
pounds and larger-from fryer
roasters to large toms. Prac-
tically all turkeys retailed
-are young (3 to 6 months)
quickly grown and suited to
much methods of cooking as
broiling, frying or roasting.
Boneless turkey is increas-
ing in volume--boned and
rolled, both cooked and un-
cooked. Boneless cooked
turkey rolls are a real con-
venience item.

The following suggestions
for buying are based on the
number of servings you can
expect to get from various
sized birds. When buying
whole ready-to-cook turkeys
under 12 pounds, allow 3/4 to
1 pound per serving. For
larger birds allow 1/2 to 3/4
pound. With uncooked bone-
less turkey roasts allow 1/3
pound per serving. The fol-
lowing is a guide for turkey size
and number of servings:

Ready to cook weight

Whole turkey (pounds)	servings
5 to 8	6 to 10
8 to 12	10 to 20
12 to 16	20 to 40
16 to 20	32 to 40
20 to 24	40 to 50

In most cases, large tur-
keys are more economical
and they are excellent for
use in future meals.

The majority of turkeys
are sold frozen and thawing
requires special care. There
are two recommended pro-
cedures for thawing: (1) Thaw
in the refrigerator in the ori-
ginal wrap or on a tray. This
requires one to three days,
depending on the size of the
turkey. (2) Thaw the
bird, still in its original water
tight wrap under running
water (cold) or emmersed in
cold water changing the water
frequently. This procedure
requires 6 to 7 hours for lar-
ger sizes.

Thawing at room tempera-
ture is not recommended be-
cause of the possibility of
contamination.
