

building. The city fathers voted to grant Southwestern Public Service their request for a 5% rate increase.

By Max Hatter, CAA Zone 4 Soil Conservation Election Set:

The election of a supervisor for zone 4 will be held at 7:30 P.M. in the vocational agricultural room of the Mobpetie School

This election is important and all eligible voters should cast their ballots.

Zone 4 voters in the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District will elect a farmer or rancher who will serve as their supervisor and represenatative on the Soil Conservation District Board for the next 5 years. A report on the Sweetwater Creek watershed will be given by Bill Brooks of the Soil Conservation Service.

A qualified voter is a zone 4 landowner who is over 21 years of age or older. Wives of eligible landowners can vote and should do so since they have an interest in their soil conservation district.

Soil Conservation Districts are political sub-divisions of the state of Texas and by law are charged with the responsibility of carrying out a soil and water conservation program in their district. Through them such items as technical service, equipment, leader ship in small water shed projects and many other services are provided to cooperating land-

The area covered by zone 4 of the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District includes all land in Wheeler County north of the north fork of the Red River and west of the power-line road. No poll tax is required of voters, but, voters must own land and live in zone 4, being actively engaged in business of farming or ranching.

Qualified voters in the area surrounding Mobeetie in zone 4 have an obligation to support the work of the district and elect supervisors who direct their programs to


