1.23 Rain Falls Sirens Sounded

The sirens sounded in Wheeler Saturday evening at 7:15 to alert the citizens of the possible approach of a tornado. Wheeler was fortunate enough to be missed by the funnels and hail storms which left their marks in the Panhandle. The clouds produced a general rain over the area with an official report of 1.23 inches for Wheeler. This amount added to that which fell last week gives Wheeler a total of 1.55 inches of moisture for the year. Mrs. Harvey Davis was returning to Wheeler from Pampa Saturday evening about 5:20. They were caught in a hail storm before they got to Laketon, where they stopped for shelter. The hail broke the windshield and stripped some chrome from the car. Traveling with Mrs. Davis were Hazel Parks and Lorene Errington. Bobby Vanpool also took shelter from the hail at Laketon at the same time the Wheeler Ladies were there.

Many times I've called this the put-down age...we are

"stomping" all over our nice white saddle oxfords to "age" them before wearing them in public.

The boys' garb was not tremendously different, and girls thought they were really sharp in their "zoot suits," complete with long pocket chain. Ask your dads about

this!

Maybe what I'm really saying are two things... "Love thy neighbor as thyself," ... and try for more understanding, and less condemnation of others.

 An ideal kit of tools might
 contain shears, scissors and
 embroidery scissors. Although
 you can get by with less, a
 minimum set should include
 at least a pair of bent handle
 dressmaker shear and a pair
 of scissors.
 Shears are usually larger
 than scissors and are used
 for heavy cutting jobs. The
 handle's bent to let the blade
 rest flat against the cutting
 surface.

The openings in the han-
 dle of shears and of unequal
 size so that two or three
 fingers can be inserted in
 the opening of one handle
 and the thumb in another.
 Use scissors for lighter
 cutting tasks. The handle
 features smaller openings
 of equal size.
 Later, if you desire, you
 can add some luxury items to
 your minimum kit of sewing
 tools; embroidery scissors,
 pink shears, buttonhole
 scissors, and thread clips.
 Buttonhole scissors, de-
 signed to cut buttonholes
 of uniform size, provide
 adjustable cutting edges.
 Thread clips are a modified
 form of scissors that have
 only one finger opening.
 They fit snugly in the hand
 and are easy to work with.
 For the homemaker who
 likes to carry her needle-

work with her, folding scis-
 sors offer the perfect solution.
 These tiny scissors fit into
 their case which is the size
 of a match box.
 Left-handed shears are
 also made for those who work
 with their left hands.
 Buy good quality cutting
 tools and have them reshar-
 pened when necessary. Select
 shears and scissors with
 blades connected by a screw
 that can be adjusted. Keep
 the blades in proper adjust-
 ment. Blades connected too
 tightly are tiring to use.
 Those too loosely connected
 cut sloppily.
 Since shears and scissors
 are expensive, keep all your
 cutting equipment for sewing
 only! Keep them in a safe
 place away from children, who
 need to cut paper, husbands
 who need to cut a piece of
 wire and little brother who


needs to trim fingernails.

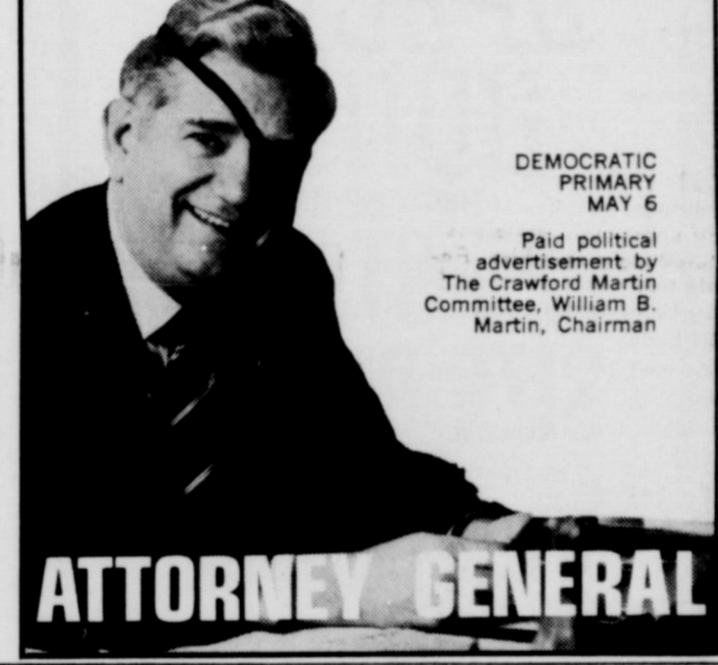

Drought prevented planting is the story down state. At least we have a chance to plant milo and cotton. We understand there is a chance that we'll get to graze set-aside acres and soil bank land if we're declared a disaster area again as was done last year.

We got a little relief from the cattle scabies quarantine. Cattle can now be moved to a livestock market and be inspected at the market, instead of having them inspected on the premises prior to shipment. The dip movement quarantine has also been postponed until July 1, 1972.

Screwworms are coming! The Texas Animal Health Commission says they will reach Oklahoma this summer. They're already as far as Hillsboro now. You'll need to take extra precautions with fresh wounds to prevent an infection of screwworms.

The Pakan community is changing. The change is being brought about by several farmers and ranchers but one of those "You've got to see it to believe it" stories is the one about Ed and Rudy Cadra. The Cadra family settled in the Pakan country and in Wheeler County in the early 1900's. They were from Czechoslovakia and came here from Chicago. The farms grew grapes, orchards, gardens and a multitude of row crops. They didn't have the modern machinery we have today, of course. The shinnery-oak wasn't a big problem then but in the drought years that followed, the cattle overgrazed the native grass allowing the shinnery oak to eventually crowd out the grass. Contesting the Contest

"Decisions of the judges shall be final." So said Rule Number Seven in the dot-counting contest sponsored by a neighborhood store. But when the judges rejected Myrtle's entry on grounds of neatness, she took the matter to court.

"Their announcement didn't say a word about neatness," she complained. "Not even the judges can make decisions that are outside the rules of the contest."

The court agreed with Myrtle, and her entry went on to victory.



Contests create a legal contract between the sponsoring company and the contestants. Accordingly, the basic principles of contract law will apply. Once the terms of the agreement are fixed, neither side can arbitrarily make changes.

However, if the contest judges keep within the limits of the original contract, they generally do have broad discretion.

In another case, contestants were supposed to deposit their entries in person at the showroom of a local automobile dealer. One contestant, disqualified by the judges for having mailed in his entry, insisted that this was too flimsy a reason for him to be barred.

But this time, the judges' ruling was upheld in court. The court said they had acted within the reasonable scope of their authority.

What about a rule against participation by company employees and their families? Again, the specific wording is crucial. In one case, the father of a company salesman submitted an entry in a football pool contest.

According to the rules, "no employee or member of his immediate family" could compete. Was the father a member of his son's "immediate family"?

In a court hearing, he pointed out that the son lived in his own home, on his own income, with his own wife and children. The court concluded there was enough separateness between the two men to leave the father eligible. He took first prize.

cattle could graze and since it took more and more row crop acreage to make a living, a lot of people left the Pakan Community to work in the oil fields after the war.

Ed and Rudy decided to come back in 1964. They leased some pasture land and then bought a 160 acre shinnery oak infested pasture, continuing to work in the oil fields.

A few years ago Ed came out to the Kelton Community to eat some barbecue and look at some slides at an annual Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Program meeting. Ed figured that some of the ideas on intensified grazing management of Ermelo Weeping Lovegrass might work on their place. He signed up in the Great Plains Program and hired a big caterpillar to plow up that 160 acre shinnery oak patch about knee-deep. The oil field had too many shinnery oak roots to plant lovegrass in with a

grassland drill. In May of last year he ordered a "sort of" battery operated cyclone seeder and mounted it on the front of his tractor. The welding shop stopped up 2 of the 4 holes in the planter plate with lead and Ed was ready to seed. We were out there last week, and from what we could see, every seed must have come up. The land was crossfenced in 40 acre pastures and watered in

CENSUS BUREAU SHOWS

679 FARMS IN COUNTY

Wheeler County showed a total of 679 farms in the 1969 Census of Agriculture, according to figures released by the U.S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census, a part of the Department's Social and Economic Statistics Administration (SESA).

In the last previous Census of Agriculture (1964) the number of farms reported

in the county was 640. Of the county's total farms in 1969, 502 are reported as selling \$2,500 or more of agricultural products in the year, as compared with 400 in 1964.

The report also shows average farm size in the county was 764.2 acres, and average value of these farms (land and buildings) was \$78,728.

Other figures from the report are:

1. Value of all farm products sold in 1969, \$7,809,809; in 1964, \$4,671,050.
2. Value of all crops sold in 1969, \$1,916,253; in 1964, \$1,920,614.
3. Value of all livestock, poultry and their products sold in 1969, \$5,893,556; in 1964, \$2,743,593.

Reported for the first time in an agricultural census is information on the extent to which the corporate structure is being used by operators of farms from which agricultural products totaling \$2,500 and over were sold. Including family farms using this type of business structure, 3 of the county's \$2,500 and over farms are incorporated.

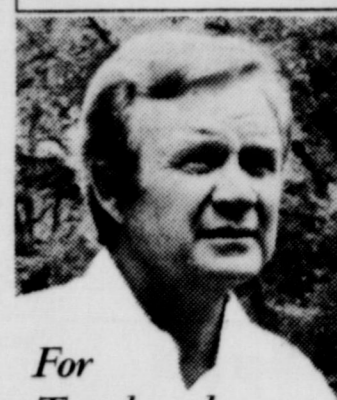

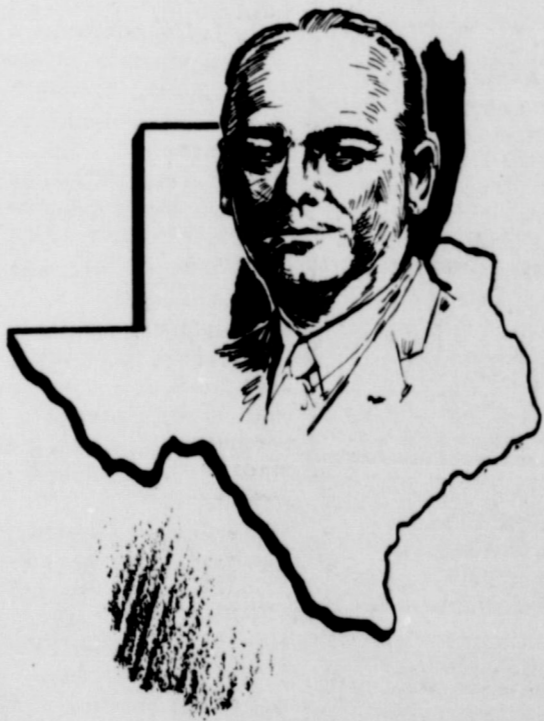
