Stonewall was removing his belongings at the time the picture was taken. Tuesday's accident was a mile south of the site of the accident which claimed the lives of two men Oct. 29, 1971.

TWO - TRUCK ACCIDENT INJURES TWO LOCAL MEN

Boyce Farris is in St. Anthony's hospital following a two truck accident on Highway 83, 6 miles north of Wheeler Tuesday evening. The accident occurred around 4:15 and involved a highway truck and an empty semi. Farris was taken to Parkview Hospital and transferred to Amarillo with serious injuries. Ross Henson, a passenger in the highway truck was taken to Parkview where he was treated for a cut on the head and bruises. Farris and Henson, employees of the State Highway Dept. were picking up trash along Highway 83. As they

pulled onto the roadway they were struck from the rear by an empty semi driven by Richard Jones from Stonewall, La. The force of the impact ripped the bed from the highway truck and scattered the contents of the truck 100 feet along the shoulder. The bed slid across the road and came to rest on the opposite shoulder from the accident. Following the collision, the highway truck traveled 265 feet across Herbert Finsterwald's pasture and stopped -- still upright. The semi-truck continued in a southerly direction and came to rest 130 feet from the point of impact in the fence row of the Finsterwald Pasture. Highway Patrolman Fred Gullidge investigated the accident. Ross Henson escaped injury in the accident of Feb. 26, 1972 which involved a highway department maintenance truck and a semi from Louisiana. The accidents were three miles apart.

Miss Sorensen Joins Internat'l Platform Assoc.

Miss Esther Sorensen of Wheeler was notified recently that she had been honored by being extended an invitation to join the International Platform Association, one of the Nation's most interesting and useful associations. It is an association for those interested in oratory; and was founded in 1826 by Daniel Webster during the presidency of John Quincy Adams and was then known as the "Lyceum". Five years later the American Lyceum Assoc. was formed and in 1903, it was reincorporated under its present name of The International Platform Association. Membership is limited to persons recommended for membership whose applications are approved by the Membership Committee and by the Board of Governors.

For over seventy years IPA membership has included many of the most distinguished men and women of our nation in every field. On its rolls have been most of the U.S. presidents since Teddy Roosevelt, many of the most prominent members of the U.S. Senate, many ambassadors accredited to the United States, and such names as J. Walter Lippman, Carl Sandburg, Werner von Braun, Barry Goldwater, Drew Pearson, Hugh Downs, Alice Longworth, "Dear Abby" Van Buren, Winston Churchill, Ralph Nader, Vice-President Angew, Senator Muskie, Betty Furness, Eliot Ness, Victor Borge, Rex Harrison, Art Linkletter and Averill Harriman. IPA's members are linked primarily by talent, imagination and friendship. President of the organization at present is Art Linkletter. Members convene annually in Washington, D.C. for five days of conversation and enjoyment. It will be held the first week in August this year and the magazine put out by the Association, Talent, keeps members in touch.

Miss Sorensen taught school in Wheeler and Shamrock and was formerly the Area Supervisor for Home and Family Life Education with the Texas State Dept. of education for 27 years when she resigned her position to take over the management of the family ranch at Wheeler where her family has held ranching interests since 1907.

During this tenure she had much experience of speaking before many groups, homemakers groups, State Teachers meetings, Federated Women's clubs, PTA meetings and Delta Kappa Gamma and she is considered an excellent speaker. Miss Sorensen holds a Bachelors Degree from Kansas State University, a Masters Degree from Columbia University and has done post-graduate work at the University of California and at Chicago University. She has participated as an active member in the Texas State Teachers Association, the American and the Texas Home Economics Associations, Delta Kappa Gamma International, Altirus, International, Omnicron Nu, Knife and Fork Club, the Federated Fine Arts Club at Shamrock and the Wednesday Study Club at Wheeler.

an oven cooking bags and wraps. Many thanks to Betty Cox for bringing this article to my attention. (Found in the April issue of the Southwestern, put out by the Southwestern Public Service Company.)

As I have mentioned before, very few accidents have been reported, but one is too many. In this article Muriel Bridge (Home Service Director) mentions the occurrence of "bumping". This is when juices boil under the fat and exert pressure on it.

She mentions shaking one tablespoon of flour in the bag to coat the inside of the

bag or wrap. Be sure to follow all the manufacturer's instructions.

Also, she gives some very important information to any cook. Should you have an oven fire, from any cause, turn off the oven and keep the oven door closed. If you should have a grease fire in a skillet, turn off the heat and cover the pan to eliminate air getting to the flame. In the absence of a fire extinguisher, ordinary baking soda may be used. Keep it handy. The best thing to do though is to practice safety and common sense, to prevent a kitchen fire from ever starting.

Here's a couple of items from the Food and Drug Administration.

The FDA is proposing the establishment of a uniform system of voluntary nutritional labeling for packaged

foods. This means that this system, if set up, would encourage manufacturers to list calories, fat, protein, carbohydrates, vitamins and minerals on food packages.

This could be a real help to the homemaker who buys much packaged, convenience food, and is concerned about its nutrient content.

Also new from the FDA is child-proof containers for furniture polish. (Something needs to be extra sturdy, or extra difficult to be "child-proof")

After September 13, 1972 manufacturers of certain liquid furniture polishes must package products in child proof containers to comply with a new FDA regulation. The FDA formulated a test that the packages must pass. First, a sample of

children under 5 years of age must be able to open the package 85% of the time. However, a panel of adults must be able to open it 90% of the time.

Second, the opening of the container must restrict the flow of polish so that only a half teaspoonful comes out from one shake or squeeze of the opened container.

Such regulations could possible prevent accidents. Again common sense and safety should be practiced in keeping dangerous chemicals out of reach of children. A locked cabinet or drawer may be necessary for extra protection for climbing, active, inquisitive little ones.

Here's a pie recipe from the kitchen of my aunt.
GLAZED BANANA PIE
1/4 cup sugar

1 tbsp. cornstarch
3-4 ripe bananas
2/3 cup water
1 tsp. butter
Mix sugar and cornstarch. Add water. Cook on medium heat until dissolved and

thick. Add butter. Set aside. Select firm, ripe bananas and fill an 8" baked pie crust with slices of banana. Cover the bananas with the glaze and top with whipped cream. Makes one 8" pie.

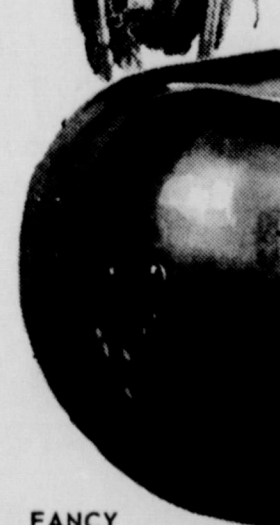
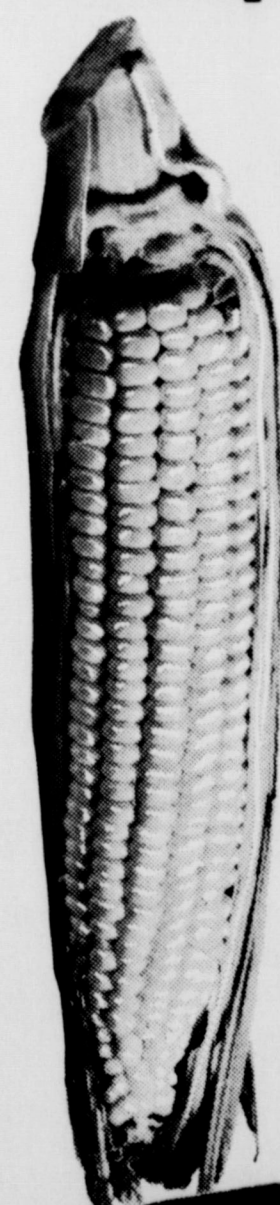
