



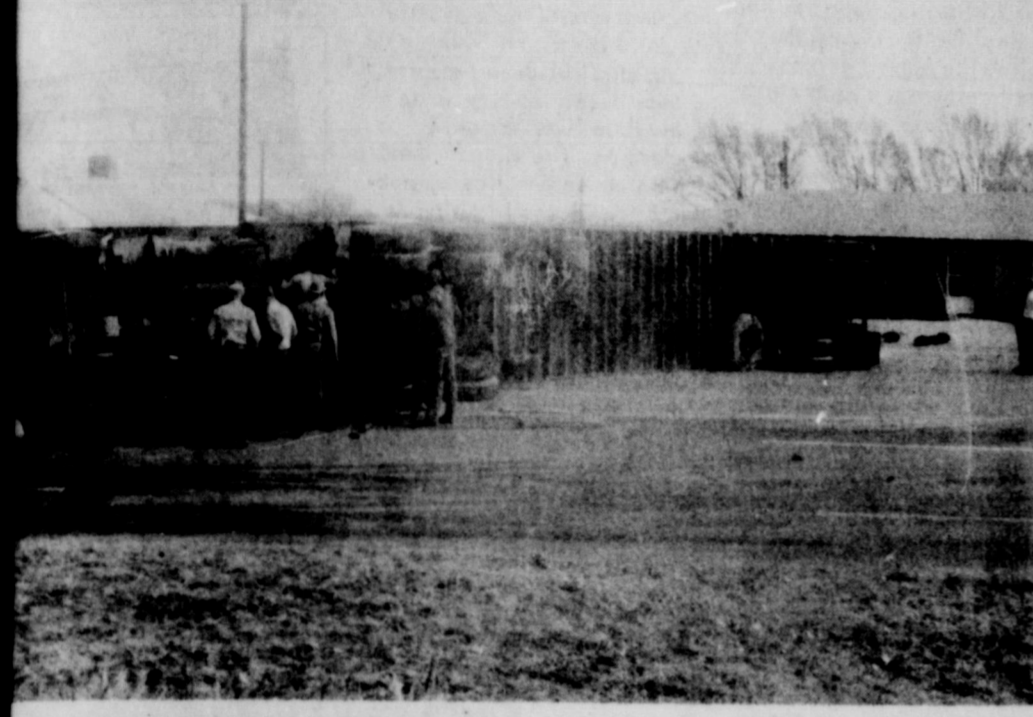

## CAR-TRUCK COLLISION SATURDAY NOON



**ALAN L. BEAN BOULEVARD BLOCKED:** An accident Saturday at noon left this empty refrigerator truck on its side across Highway 83 in the 700 block of the boulevard. Neither the driver nor the relief driver in the truck were injured. The truck skidded an estimated 100 feet on its side.



**THE CAR:** Kenny Frankenbery was the driver of this auto which was involved in a collision with a truck in the 700 block of Alan L. Bean Boulevard. Frankenbery was taken to Parkview Hospital and treated for a busted hip.

The drivers of a car and truck involved in an accident at the corner of Eighth and Alan L. Bean Blvd. in Wheeler were not injured. However both vehicles were heavily damaged. The accident left the truck belonging to Packers Express turned on its side across Alan L. Bean Boulevard.

A 1966 Chevrolet driven by Kenny Frankenbery was traveling South on the boulevard. Frankenbery attempted a left turn and failed to see the oncoming truck.

In an effort to miss the car, the truck driver, Ronald R. McCoy of Grand Prairie, Texas swerved right, shearing a light pole and splitting a second pole. He then pulled the truck back to the

left. The sharp turn carried the truck about 50 feet before turning on its side and skidding an additional 100 feet. All four lanes of highway 83 were blocked. Workmen spent an hour setting the truck on its wheels and moving the vehicles from the boulevard.

The car involved belonged to Opal Smith. Frankenbery was returning the auto after it had been serviced.

Frankenbery is the 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Frankenbery.

The accident occurred about noon Saturday, Feb. 19.

### L Verden Wins H.O.T. Award

Luinda Verden has been named Wheeler's Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow for 1972. She was chosen on the basis of her score in a written knowledge and attitude examination taken by senior girls on Dec. 7, and will receive a specially designed award charm from General Mills, sponsor of the annual educational program. Additionally, she is now eligible for state and national honors.

The State Homemaker of Tomorrow, to be selected from all school winners in the state in judging which will center on performance in the Dec. 7 test, will be awarded a \$1,500 college



Luinda Verden scholarship. Her school will receive a complete set of Encyclopedia Britannica from Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc. A scholarship of \$500 will go to the second-ranking girl in the state.

This April, the 51 Betty Crocker Homemakers of Tomorrow representing every state and the District of Columbia -- each accompanied by a faculty adviser, will be given an expense-paid educational tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, C.D. Personal observation and interviews during the tour, added to the earlier state-level judging results, will culminate in the announcement of the 1972 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow at the conclusion of the tour. Her scholarship will be increased to \$5,000, with those of three runners-up raised to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000.

In addition to the awards for school, state and national Homemakers of Tomorrow, a special \$1,000 Nutrition Scholarship has been added to the Betty Crocker Search program this year. To earn this award, a girl must be planning a college major in nutrition or a related field, rank among the highest in her state in the overall Search examination and achieve the top score, from those meeting the first two criteria, on the test's nutri-

### CITY COUNCIL MEETS; TWO MEN APPOINTED

The Wheeler City Council met in regular session Monday, Feb. 21 at the City Office.

Mayor Pete Burton read the letter of resignation for Dr. J. Robert Winslow.

David Cross was appointed and installed to serve in the position vacated by Robert Denson and Bill Owen was appointed and installed to serve in place of Dr. Winslow. Both will serve until the April 1 election.

With the resignation of Dr. Winslow, city voters will have an additional position to fill on the council. The voters will elect an alderman to serve the one year remaining of Dr. Winslow's term.

The council opened bids for three warning systems to be placed at strategic points over the town. Low bidder for the systems was Texas Fire Appliance Co. of Texas from Wichita Falls. The systems are complete with a battery back-up for use in case of power failure.

The council voted to purchase a portable generator which can be used to sound our present siren in case of power failure. The generator is complete with spot lights and can be used

as needed away from the station.

The placing of a street light at the corner of Main and Texas in front of the First National Bank was approved.

The city fathers voted to annex the R.J. Smith property into the city limits. The property will be encompassed with the continuing of East Third and South Stanley. Smith is presently building a house on Stanley Street in the new addition.

The council viewed and approved payment of the bills.

Joe Weatherly met with the council to discuss the need to correct the drainage situation on East Seventh and Stanley street.

The Council gave their permission for the use of the area behind the city office and the city garage for the Wheeler County 4-H and FFA Pig Show Saturday, March 4th.

### Services Held For Nannie Slaten

Services were held Tuesday, Feb. 22, 1972 at 10:00 a.m. in the Wheeler Baptist Church with Rev. M.B. Smith of the Alanreed Baptist Church assisted by Rev. Keith McCormick of Wheeler officiating.

Mrs. Slaten died Saturday in the Golden Spread Convalescent Center where she had resided for the past year and half in Shamrock, Texas.

She was 89 years of age. Mrs. Slaten was born March 12, 1882 in Prairie Lea, Texas. She came to Collingsworth County, Texas in 1913 and moved to Wheeler County in 1920 where she made her home until going to the Convalescent Center in Shamrock. She was married to R.L. Denham, July 20, 1900 at Prairie Lea, Texas. He died in 1911 and she married O.L. Slaten, April 12, 1913 at Throckmorton, Texas. He died in 1941. Two daughters also preceded her in death.

She was a member of the First Baptist Church of Wheeler.

Pall bearers were Ben Trout, Harry Wofford, Terrell Gunter, Stanley Latta, C.E. Later and Virgil Helton.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. Willard Ingram of Wheeler, 3 grandchildren and 13 great grandchildren and nieces and nephews.

Interment was in the Shamrock Cemetery with Clay Funeral Home of Shamrock in charge.

### Crow Shoot Is Held In Shamrock

Some 50 persons appeared for the Crow shoot in Shamrock last Saturday night, and about 25 showed up Sunday night.

About 500 to 700 birds were killed in the shooting--designed to rid the area of crows that cause heavy damage to crops.

Don Fritsche, president of the Shamrock Jaycees, sponsors of the event, said shooters from areas as far as Dallas, Amarillo, Canyon and Oklahoma City participated in the event last week.

Fritsche said that some of the crows are put to good use--about 100 will be shipped to Clarendon Junior College for school science projects.

Another hunt will be held this coming weekend, both Saturday and Sunday nights. Everyone must register with the Jaycees in Shamrock before 6:00 on the night of shooting. Registration fee is \$2.00. Only shotguns are allowed and you must have a flashlight. Officials said they expect more hunters this weekend because of a full moon casting more light on the hunt.

WHEREAS, on the 7th day of February, A.D., 1972, petitions were presented to me for an election to be held in each of the following named School Districts located in Wheeler County, Texas, to-wit: 1. Briscoe Independent School District No. 906, of said County and 2. Allison Independent School District No. 904 of said County, on the question of determining whether or not a majority of the legally qualified voters of said districts desire to be consolidated with each other

for school purposes and It appearing that each of said contiguous district have been properly established and created and are legally and validly existing school districts;

It appearing that at least 20 legally qualified voters signed each of the petitions received requesting said consolidation and that each of said petitions are otherwise in conformity with the law;

THEREFORE, I, in my capacity as County Judge of Wheeler County, Texas, do hereby order that an election be held on the 4th day of March, 1972, in Briscoe Independent School District No. 906 and Allison Independent School District No. 904 to determine whether or not a majority of the legally qualified voters of said Districts desire that they shall be consolidated for school purposes.

I further order that said election shall be held at the following places in said School Districts and the following named persons are hereby appointed election officials for said election:

1. In Briscoe at School Building in Briscoe, Texas, within said District, with Bob Zybach as Presiding Judge and Oden Hudson - Roy Meadows as Alternate Presiding Judge, and said Presiding Judge shall appoint the necessary clerks to assist him which shall not exceed 2 clerks. Absentee voting in said election in said School District shall be held at the same place as herein designated as the polling place on Election Day, and Oden Hudson is hereby appointed Clerk for Absentee voting. The

above designated place for absentee voting is also the absentee clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail may be sent.

The polls at each of the above designated polling places shall on said election day be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

The above designated places for absentee voting in each of said School Districts shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting.

None but legally qualified voters residing in said above named Districts shall vote at said election.

Each voter shall vote on the proposition hereby submitted by placing an

"X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

Notice of said election shall be given by posting a copy of this Order and Notice of Election to Consolidate Districts within the boundaries of each of said School Districts, which posting shall be done not less than twenty days prior to the date fixed for said election. The sheriff shall also cause a notice by publication of this election to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where said school district is located, which publication shall not be more than 30 days nor less than 20 days before said election.

Immediately after said election has been held, the presiding Judge holding the same in each of said respective voting places shall make returns of the results thereof to the Commissioners' Court of this County and return the ballot box and other election supplies to the County Clerk for safekeeping.

The American homemaker will no longer have to apologize for serving her family frozen convenience dinners.

The Food and Drug Administration reports that nutritional guidelines for frozen dinners will appear soon.

A frozen dinner must furnish 4.6 grams of protein for every 100 calories, to meet these nutritional guidelines. The guidelines will also contain other recommended levels for vitamin A, thiamine, riboflavin, niacin, iron and in some cases, calcium.

Today's frozen dinners usually provide nutrients at acceptable levels. These new nutritional guidelines will improve their nutritional value even more.

People must be beginning to think about gardening and yard work. Several people have phoned our office or come into our office, asking for information along these lines. Gardening is not only a good form of exercise or relaxation, (whichever it is for you!) but if you grow vegetables and fruit, you can save money on your grocery bill.

I know many of you like to bake quick loaf breads. Here is a recipe you might not have tried.

**APPLE BREAD**  
2 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
1 tsp. salt  
1/4 cup shortening  
1 cup grated raw apples

(unpeeled and cored)  
1/2 tsp. finely grated orange rind  
2 tsp. baking powder  
1/3 cup sugar  
2 eggs, well beaten  
3 tbsps. milk  
Sift together flour, baking powder, salt, and sugar. Cut in shortening with pastry blender until fine. Add eggs and blend well. Mix together grated apple, orange rind, and milk. Add to mixture and stir to blend just until smooth. Turn into well greased pan, 9 x 5 x 3 inches. Bake 1 hour at 350°F. Cool completely before removing from pan. Slices best one day old.  
Yield: 1 loaf  
This can be baked in cans for those of you who sometimes prepare cakes in coffee cans. Bake 30 minutes in cans at 375°F.
