

March 1 is the deadline for farmers to file their income tax returns. The Income Tax act of 1971, passed in December, has changed some of the regulations affecting your 1971 tax liability. The most important change is the reinstatement of investment credit.. Under this law an investment credit of seven percent is available for depreciable, tangible personal property subject to depreciation recapture and having a useful life of at least seven years. All livestock, except horses, meeting these conditions---will also now comply

For assets obtained in 1971 to qualify for investment credit, they must have been ordered on or after April 1, 1971, or if order prior to April 1, delivered after August 15, 1971. In general, if the asset would ordinarily qualify and was not ordered before April, the investment credit will apply. However, if an order was placed prior to April 1 and unless the actual delivery was delayed until after August 15 the investment

credit is not applicable.

Never before has it been more important that producers increase cotton production in 1972.
