### SERVICES ARE READ FOR CO. PIONEER

Funeral services were held Sunday at the First Christian Church in Shamrock for Mrs. Mary Annie Johnson who died Friday March 23, 1973 at the Shamrock General Hospital in Shamrock after a patient there for a few days. Johnson was 86 years, six (6) months and 13 days.

In September 10, 1972 Johnson was honored for her 100th birthday with a party at the American Legion in Shamrock with 300 in attendance.

Mrs. Annie Dillworth was married to Rufus Orvil Johnson on November 20th, 1888 in Vernon, Texas. Mr. Johnson passed away in 1911. The Johnsons moved to the Kelton Community in 1917 and settled on the Edward Killingsworth Farm where they lived for a few years. Later Mr. Johnson changed the farm now owned by Bill Wheeler and lived there until after Mr. Johnson passed away. After Mrs. Johnson's death, Mrs. Johnson moved 1/2 mile west of Kelton and lived there until she moved to Wheeler in 1967 to Shamrock to her home.

As long as Mr. Johnson was living he was caretaker of the Kelton Cemetery and after his death his eldest son, Albert, who still makes his home in Kelton was caretaker. In the last few years Albert has prepared a list of the Kelton Cemetery listing all the names of those buried there, "unknown graves" and graves reserved for relatives.

Mrs. Johnson is survived by nine children, Albert Johnson of Kelton, W.H. Johnson of Friona, Exer Johnson of Shamrock, John Johnson of Muleshoe, a Cooper of Optima, Okla., Lorene Tucker of Shamrock and a foster daughter, Maryemma Hamilton of Snyder, Okla., Walter Johnson of Springdale, Ark., grandchildren, of which she was present for the last two, 47 great grandchildren and 66 great-great grandchildren.

It was four years on the day that Mrs. Johnson was buried that her oldest daughter, Altha Whitener, passed away and in the same year her second oldest daughter, Clara Rutherford passed away, and on the day that she was buried her son-in-law, J.D. Rutherford, who was also a resident at the Golden Spread Nursing Home passed away. Mr. Rutherford was also an early settler in the Kelton Community.

A living "memorial day" has been set aside as on September 10th of each year it will be the date of the annual Johnson reunion.

Serving as Pall bearers were Truett Johnson, Leroy Johnson, R.O. Johnson, Lyle Tucker, Hiram Whitehead and Wayne Lee Johnson.

## LEWIS SENTENCED TO 99 YEAR TERM FRIDAY

Todd Michael Lewis of Salina Calif., was charged with Murder with Malice in District Court Friday, March 23 in Wheeler. The jury of eight men and four women sentenced the 17 year old to 99 years for the shooting death of Wheeler County Deputy Carroll Copeland on December 31, 1972.

A total of 74 petit jurors were called for possible duty in the Lewis case. Questioning of the prospective jurors began Monday and continued through Wednesday afternoon. The trial of Lewis began Wednesday afternoon at 1:15.

Testimony in the case continued through Thursday with the attorneys presenting their final arguments Friday morning. The case was turned over to the jury at 11:05 a.m. With a one hour break for lunch, the jury re-deliberated until 1:38 when they returned their verdict, "We the jury find the defendant, Todd Michael Lewis guilty of murder with malice of fore thought."

Don Copeland was called to the stand; he testified that Carroll Copeland was married and had children.

District Attorney, Guy Hardin, reminded the jurors that Carroll Copeland was cut down in the prime of life for a mere \$3.50 worth of gasoline; he gave his life for Whiting Brothers in Shamrock. He further reminded the jury that according to testimony, Copeland was shown no mercy by the defendant.

The jury retired to deliberate the sentence at 2:30 and returned with a sentence of 99 years at 3:50.

Nine witnesses were called by the state Wednesday afternoon. Testifying Wednesday was Rodney Thomas Macon, Lewis's companion on the night of the shooting. The state called 23 witnesses in the case.

In presenting his argument to the jury, Hardin went over the testimony presented in the trial. At 11:00 p.m. Dec. 31, the defendant and his companion, Macon, pulled into Whiting Bros. Service Station in Shamrock and had \$3.20 worth of gas put in the car. The pair then left the station without paying for the gas. Copeland stopped the car 9.6 miles east of Shamrock; The driver, Macon, got out of the car and walked up behind Copeland. Lewis placed the gun within 9" of Copeland and fired. Copeland fell to the ground and the defendant continued to empty the gun.

Placed in evidence were a silver motor cycle belt, worn by Lewis and a 25 cal. cartridge; at the time of his arrest, Lewis carried 25 cal. bullets which matched that which killed Copeland.

Defense attorney, Robert McPherson, tried to convince the jury that Macon was the murderer in the case and conceived the story which he told on the witness stand to clear himself. McPherson reminded the Texas, one daughter, Mrs. George Davidson of Twitty, three sisters, Mrs. M.J. Williams of Decherd, Tenn., Mrs. Rice Hancock of McMinnville, Tenn. and Mrs. C.B. Aylor of Manchester, Tenn., 2 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by his wife in 1969.

Interment was in the Wheeler Cemetery under the direction of Wright Funeral Home of Wheeler.

An Accessory to Murder charge was returned against Rodney Thomas Macon. Arraignment is set for Monday, April 2.

The jury indicted Arla Lester Thomas and Robert C. Thomas, acting together, on a charge of possession of a narcotic drug, to-wit, marijuana.

Brian T. Walsh, Annette Martinez, Edward F. Kelly and Mark Hurley, acting together, were charged with possession of a narcotic drug, to-wit marijuana.

## WORK BEING COMPLETED ON CABLE TV SYSTEM

Wheeler's new Cable TV System is nearing completion. Workmen began tying customers onto the new system Tuesday and the change-over is expected to be completed this week.

With the installation of the new system, cable customers will find stations in a different position on the dial. Channels 7 and 10 will be located in their respective places on the dial instead of 5 and 6 as they have been since the cable system was first installed. Channel 4 has been located in the correct position and will not be changed.

As workmen change over to the new system, customers may find their viewing temporarily interrupted, but service will be returned as soon as that section of town is changed. When the work is complete, customers will most likely have to change the channel selector.

It may be necessary to adjust your set when the new system is hooked up. Your fine tuner may have to be turned several rounds to bring in the signal on channels 7 and 10. These channels have not been used and the sets may have to be adjusted to bring them in.

Remote controls will have to be changed by your service man.

The new system has cost Wheeler TV System a great deal of money and the customer will have to pay for the improved service. The monthly rental will be \$7.50 per month beginning in April; this is an increase of \$1.00 per month. \$4.00 will be charged to tie on a customer if the house is wired and \$8.00 if the house is not wired. A fee of \$5.00 will be charged for the in-

stallation of each additional TV outlet.

Cable television was brought to Wheeler by the Guthries in 1958 at a cost of \$16,000. Until the cable system was completed, Wheeler was virtually without television. In order to pick up the Amarillo stations, 70-100 ft. towers were required.

The installation of the Micro-Wave system in 1964 improved reception to Wheeler Cable customers.

The new system will cost the Guthries \$30,000. Wheeler TV was required to install all new lines and amplifiers to comply with the Federal Communications Commission regulation passed in 1972.

The new system will eliminate temperature variations in the signal which are responsible for the double image on your television screen.

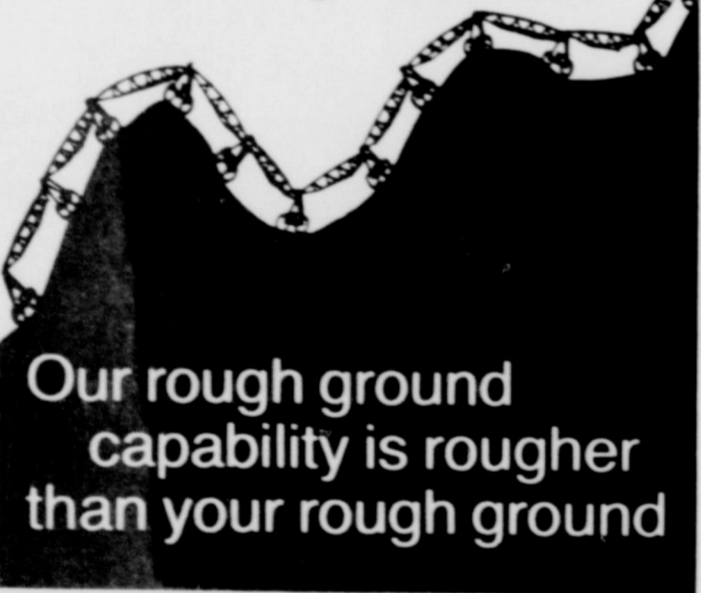

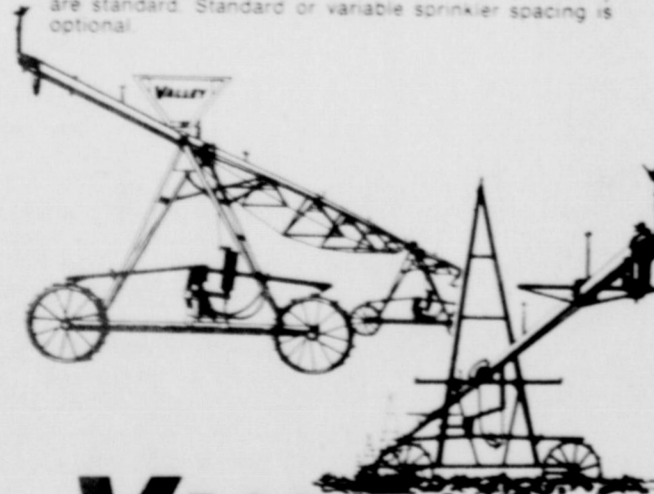

We are now recommending planting Wintergreen Hardinggrass in Wheeler County. Wintergreen Hardinggrass was developed by M.J. Morris of the McGrador, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Research Center. We have tested it for winter forage yields and winter hardiness since 1971. Forage yields and protein content is about the same as other cool season perennials like Kentucky 31 Fescue, Cool Season mixes and Jose Wheat grass. The desirability of having a grass equivalent to wheat or rye in grazing, that doesn't have to be seeded every

year is going to be a great feature in seeding this grass. This grass can be seen at the Old Wheeler plot, east of Wheeler.  
"Keeping 'em Alive" will be the topic discussed by Dr. Gene Cope, Area Extension Veterinarian, at the Stocker Calf Animal Health Clinic scheduled for Friday, April 6 at the Shamrock School at 7:30 p.m. Stocker costs make death losses more costly. Tom Christ Wheeler, will tell us how he handles his incoming steers. Research demonstrating work in progress in the county is the topic I'll discuss.

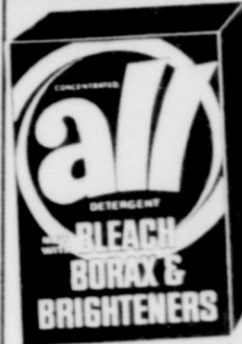

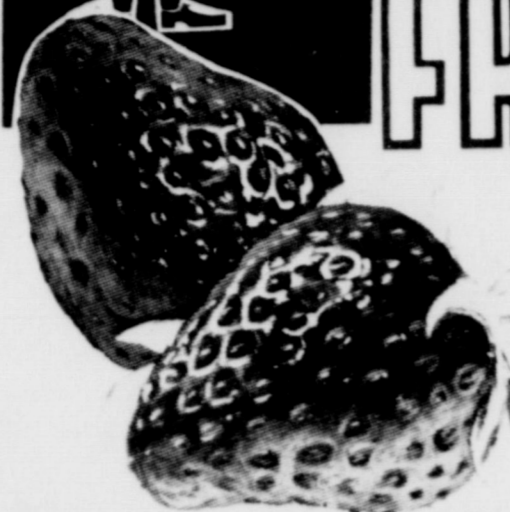
