that will come under what is called a "state dip movement quarantine order". They'll require us to dip all cattle in "movement" except in ten situations. Cattle moving to slaughter won't have to be dipped. Cattle moving to a livestock market for sale and dipped prior to release won't have to be dipped before movement.

Other cattle not requiring "movement dippings" are:

1. Cattle moving to an official dip point.
2. Cattle dipped within the past 7 days.
3. Cattle from non-control area moving through control area with no stop overs.
4. Cattle moving from one premise to another premise within the quarantine area where same owner is involved.
5. Cattle dipped within 7 days from scab infested states with permit or with permit to be dipped upon arrival.
6. Cattle from non-control area moving into control area for grazing.

Some folks are saying that you can't eradicate scab; indicating that it will be with us always like poverty. In any case, the regulation as written is going to be a lot of bother to the cowman when he sells calves as many do in the fall. Perhaps the regulations will be watered down some before June.

We were up at Dan Gatlins place north and east of the Gageby store last week looking at club calves. He reports that boys and instructors came up there from Houston buying club calves a few weeks ago. The calves were Angus-Galloway crosses. Dan's family is joining the Briscoe 4-H club program and will be feeding calves as their project. Wheat pasture looked good up that way and a lot of it is being grazed out.

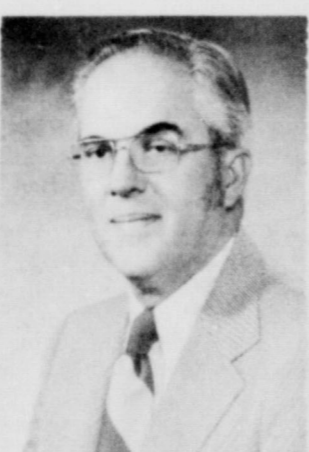

Across the Fence

There may not be enough peaches to make a cobbler after the freeze last week. A lot of folks have asked what the average date of the last killing frost here in the county is. Official records show it to be April 8th. Tender plants can be set out safely after this date, but there is no guarantee that the frost wouldn't get them then!

They're going to have a Beef Cattle Research Field Day in Amarillo on Thursday, April 20th. They'll be talking about viruses, vaccines and feedlot diseases and the effect of Season, breed, grade and prior treatment on performances of feedlot cattle. Other topics to be discussed include the effect of processing and variety on utilization of grain sorghum and the control of cattle coccidiosis. A lot of distinguished speakers will be on the program including people from our animal science and vet science department at Texas A&M. Mark your calendar for this one if you are a cattle feeder. It was once said that "agriculture is not a science and it has but little science in it. That little science can be taught. The remainder must be acquired by observation, experience, and business methods." In any case, you may want to be present to hear the "little science" about cattle fecing.

The Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Program Handbook is now being mailed to farmers and ranchers. Due to the increasing demand for the printing of our result demonstration work in progress we are only mailing it to every third name on our mailing list. If you failed to get one and would like a copy let us know; we'll get you one. If you are grazing weeping lovegrass, I would suggest you put the 1971 handbook of our demonstration work on your recommended reading list.

Winter perennials like Winter Green Harding Grass, Jose Wheat Grass and Ken-

ucky 31 Fescue are looking good on our observation plots at the Wheeler Gin.

When the "calving deals" are over, you'll need some grass for the new bunch to eat. Don't forget to seed your lovegrass between now and May 1 and manage it skillfully to get the most out of it.

Word has been received that June 1 is the target date for the Texas Animal Health Commission to expand its present cattle scabies eradication program. We are one of 34 other existing scabies quarantine counties

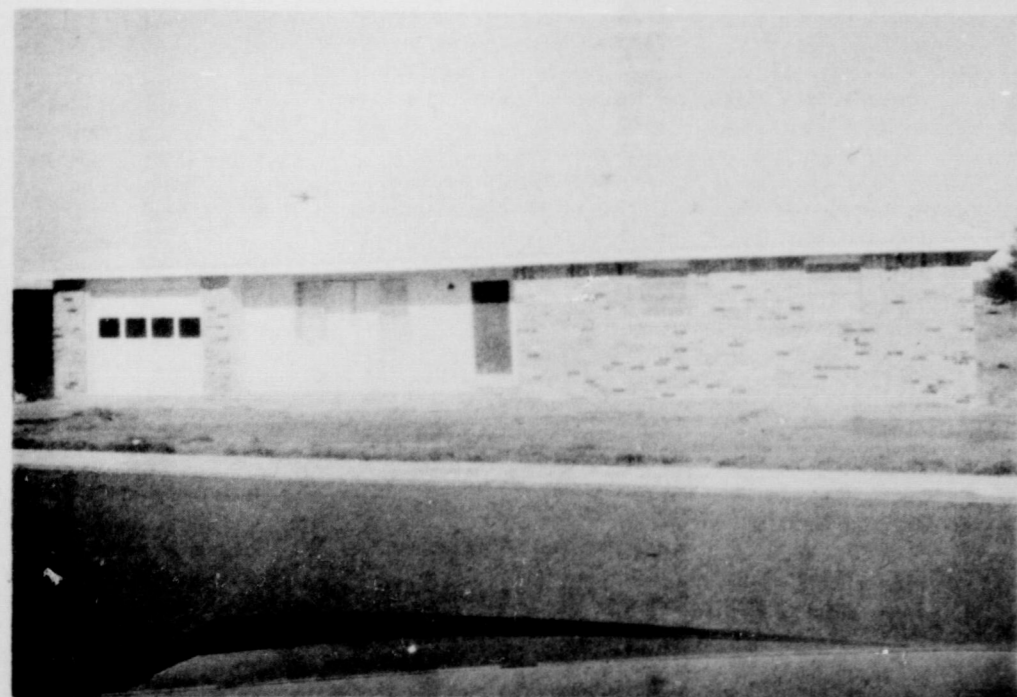

Patricia Palmer, CHDA hope you had an enjoyable holiday. I really enjoyed mine!
There's quite a stir now over food prices. I'm hoping

the investigations will pinpoint the real cause of increased food prices. The general public need to be made aware of the fact that the increase is not due to the farmers and beef producers.

In the area of food and legislation, the use of artificial sweetener, saccharin, will be limited under a new regulation of the Food and Drug Administration.

As of February 1, saccharin was removed from the list of food additives that are generally recognized as safe. The use of saccharin has been limited to the following: 12 milligrams per fluid oz. of beverage in fruit drinks

and other beverages, no more than 20 milligrams of saccharin per substitution for one teaspoon of sugar (when used as a sugar substitute) and 30 milligrams per serving in processed foods.

In addition to these, the FDA regulations require that labels of food containing saccharin state what amount of saccharin the product contains. This labeling will become effective for food sold after July 1, 1972.

Here's a recipe I've had in this column before, but I've had questions about it. So, here it is again.

"Martin's ruling had the effect of increasing the bank's capitalization dramatically and thus its ability to make large loans, ultimately giving Sharp the financial resources he used in the manipulations charged by the SEC."

"As you know, hundreds of Texans lost their life savings because of Sharp's stock manipulations and it probably wouldn't have happened but for Atty. Gen. Martin's legal opinion."

"Don't you agree, it's time for a change in the office of attorney general of Texas?"

"Just so you'll know what you'd be changing to, I'd like to tell you a little about John Hill. I'm a native Texan, grew up in Wink and Kilgore, was national debate champion at Kilgore Junior College and graduated from the University of Texas Law School. I served in the Navy during World War II, practiced law (much of the time in courtrooms) in Houston, and was secretary of state from 1966 to 1968."
