DPS RULES ON ACCIDENT

A reconstruction of the accident which claimed the life of Lonnie Miller, Wheeler County Sheriff shows that the "Miller" was on the wrong side of the road", according to WPS Sgt. Jim Powell.

The accident on Sept. 17 at 2:15 A.M. involved three vehicles. Sheriff Lonnie Miller, 56, was the driver of one of the County Sheriff's vehicles; he topped a hill 9 1/2 miles east of Wheeler and struck a pickup "head-on". The involvement of a third vehicle caused a question of the actual cause of the accident. Miller was pronounced dead shortly after his arrival at Parkview Hospital in Wheeler.

The investigation showed Miller's car was on the wrong side of the road. When he saw another vehicle approaching, he swerved back into the correct lane. A pickup driven by David Moore of Wheeler, took incorrect evasive action to avoid a collision. Moore cut hard to the left.

The third vehicle, also a pickup, caught the rear of Moore's pickup and spun it around.

ABOUT OUR SCHOOLS

By Dave R. Summers
Today's School Library Is a Place to Grow

Much research is available that indicates that a clear relationship exist between the effectiveness of schools - as shown by their increased academic excellence - and strong library Media services. The purpose of library media centers in elementary and secondary schools has become to enhance, facilitate, and enrich the curriculum. The library is viewed as an inviting, attractive, accessible place to be: a place in which to grow, and one which promotes lifelong learning. It is the hub of the school: a focal point of the school's learning environment.

In terms of the history of schools in general, it is interesting to note that the concept of the centralized school library is relatively new. For years, individual teachers maintained collections of books in their own classrooms for student use and check-out. It wasn't until after World War II that the centralized school library was born.

Despite the relatively short history of this important school entity, major changes are occurring in today's libraries. Clearly, library media centers are now more than just

warehouses of books. The inclusion of audio-visual equipment and media, the improvement of print collections, the advancement of computer-related technology, and the realization that what goes on in this key area of the school should be integrated into the total school curriculum help distinguish today's library media center from the library of old.

It should not be surprising that the role of the librarian has also undergone major changes. Fueled by an influx of educational technology, plus the realization that librarians could be better utilized, today's library media specialist is viewed as a team player and partner in the instructional process.

Because of the importance being placed on locating, accessing, and evaluating information for use in solving problems, children are being encouraged to use the library at a younger age. Kindergarteners are instructed how to check out books independently. Older elementary-age children learn the mechanics of library organizational systems, how the card catalog works, and the use of reference materials. In many libraries, computer card catalogs and data base



searches are already being utilized by young children.

First and foremost, however, libraries serve to develop the skill of literature appreciation. Rather than expecting children to learn these skills in isolation, as was done frequently in the past, teachers are now combining

efforts with the library media specialist to integrate the teaching of these important skills into the regular curriculum. Skills development at this younger age provides a foundation for learning throughout a child's life both as a student and later as an adult.

As parents or community members, you are invited to visit our schools and observe the library media centers in action. You'll see students being taught and encouraged to use this vital facility; teachers, administrators, and support staff modeling lifelong learning; and your tax dollars being wisely invested in the development of young peoples minds. Truly, today's school library is an exciting and effective place in which to learn and grow.

From The Minister's Desk:
In my childhood, one of my favorite television programs was "Superman", starring George Reeves. As an impressionable young boy, I was very much intrigued by Superman and his powers.

Yet he had one power that did not impress me -- his x-ray vision. This power did not impress me because my mother had the same power. With her x-ray vision, Mother could see everything that I did or planned to do.

As I grew older, I learned that the x-ray vision of Superman was fictional and I learned Mother's x-ray vision was simply intuition. But I also learned that God did have x-ray vision and He could see everything that I did or planned to do.

The Hebrew writer described this x-ray vision when he wrote: "...There is no creature hidden from His sight, but all things are open and laid bare to the eyes of Him with whom we have to do." [Hebrews 4:13]

In this text, there are two words that must be carefully considered. These two words are "--Open--" and "--bare--".

"--Open--" is translated from a Greek word -- tetrachellismena-- that literally means "to expose". "--Bare--" is translated from a Greek word --Gumna-- that literally means "to be naked." With these words, the Hebrew writer affirms that the lives of people are nakedly exposed to the scrutiny of God.

This affirmation is disturbing because most of us have some weakness or failing that we do not

want known. While we may successfully conceal this weakness or failing from other people, we cannot conceal them from God. Our lives are "--Open and laid bare--" to His scrutiny.

But this affirmation is also comforting. And there are at least two reasons that it is comforting. These two reasons are:

1. It is comforting because it means that God will be fair in His judgments. It hurts when our actions are misjudged by other people. Since there is no way to prevent these misjudgments, it is comforting to know that our lives are "--open and laid bare--" to God. And His judgments will always be fair.

2. It is comforting because it means that we are never out of God's recognition. Some of us have a faith that is more visible than others of us. But while this visible faith is necessary for human recognition, it is not needed to have

the recognition of God. Jesus said: "--Whoever in the name of a disciple gives to one of these little ones even a cup of cold water to drink, truly I say to you shall not lose his reward." [Matthew 10:42] It is comforting to realize that the most obscure act of service, like the giving of "--a cup of cold water--" is "--open and laid bare--" to God.

The x-ray vision of God is disturbing and comforting. With it "--there is no creature hidden from His sight, but all things are open and laid bare--".

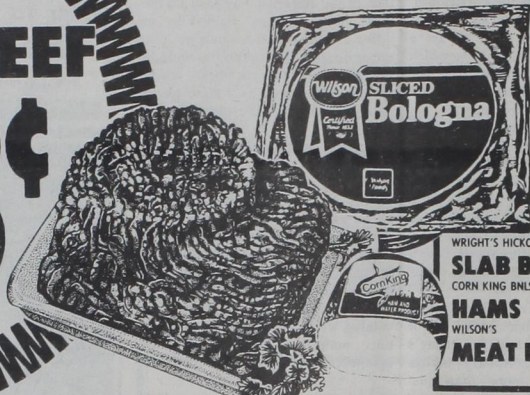

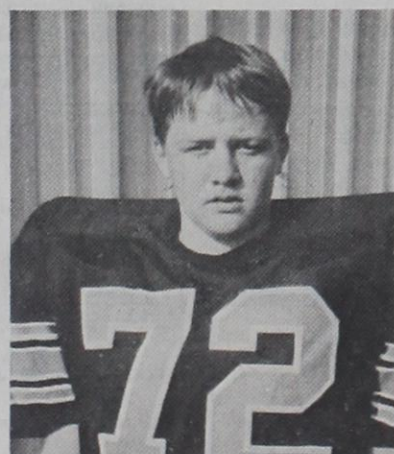

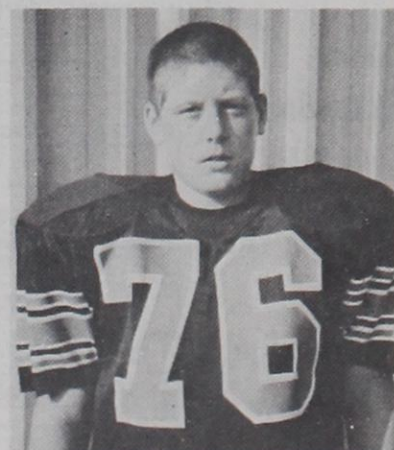
