





The Hebrew writer described this x-ray vision when he wrote: "--There is no creature hidden from His sight, but all things are open and laid bare to the eyes of Him with whom we have to do." [Hebrews 4:13]

In this text, there are two words that must be carefully considered. These two words are "-- Open -- " and "--bare--".






