### RABIES CLINIC

Tommie Hennard will conduct a Rabies Clinic Saturday, May 19. The purpose of the clinic will be to vaccinate all pets against rabies. At the same time the City veterinarian will have dog tags on sale. The clinic will be held at Wheeler Veterinary Clinic on West Highway 130 until 5:00 p.m. Owners are urged to have animals on a leash to control them. The vaccination will protect the animal for a period of one year. The shot will cost \$2.50. This will be the first time licenses will be required in the city limits. Licenses will cost \$1.00 for males and spayed females \$2.00 for females. Those people who have their dogs vaccinated, even not purchased at a sale, it will be necessary to have the animal and proof of vaccination to the clinic to obtain the dog license. Dogs in the City Limits are required to be licensed and vaccinated. Citizens are urged to have their animals in time to be vaccinated against rabies. Those owners who are to bring their pets to the clinic, call 826-5821 at the time the clinic is conducted and someone will be on duty to pick up the animals.

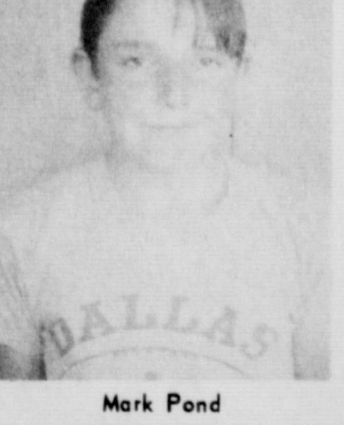

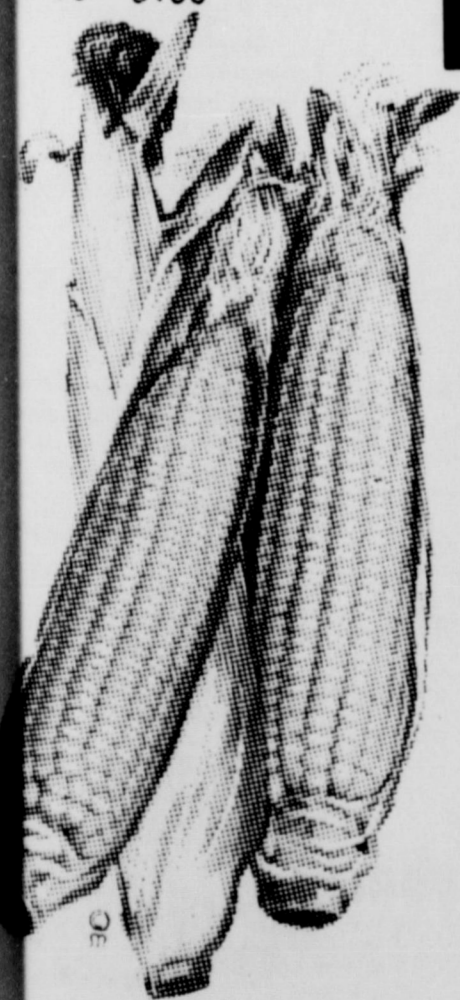

## Across the Fence

The President of the U.S. and the Chairman of the Federal Reserve Boards have mumbled off about the price of beef and reportedly suggested that cheese and fish are cheaper substitutes.

They remind me of a friend and neighbor we used to know who was an outstanding dry land crop farmer. However, to hear him talk, he knew more about how to breed, raise and doctor cattle than anybody around that had been in the business all his life.

To top all this off, proposed budget cuts in agricultural research and teaching and the philosophy of "growing two blades of grass where only one grew before", will slow the pulse of improving agriculture.

This comes at a time when world and domestic food demands are mounting at a record rate.

So now that high officials in the federal hierarchy are doing some of the County Extension Agent's work, I guess we should get out in the country and help ranchers unhook calves from those heifers, just about as

fast as we can handle 'em. We figure we better save all those calves to keep peace in the market place so the high ranking officials can stop hating in our experience.

Twenty-two head of heifers stacked on ten acres of elbon rye overseeded on lovegrass sod in early October gained 118 pounds of beef to the acre. The project was completed on May 1 when the lovegrass had made sufficient growth.

The best gain month was March when the average daily gain was 122 pounds. The value of the gain was around \$60 to the acre. Since the overseeding and fertilization cost \$22 an acre, the added value of the gain was close to \$27 an acre. We had sought to get around 200 pounds of beef before the lovegrass started, but due to the cold weather, we only got half-way. If we can record 250-300 pounds of beef to the acre during the summer, we can probably come close to producing 400 pounds of beef to the acre from lovegrass.

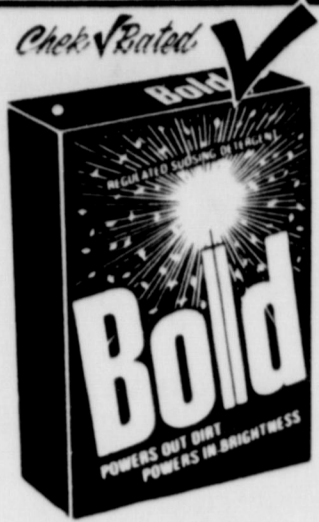
