

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Across the Fence

By Max Hatter, CEA Warmer weather boosted farmers and ranchers spirits. A hay shortage ecists in all counties of the Texas Panhandle. Another blizzard before spring could bring on a hay crisis. We have a copy of names of farmers and ranchers in other parts of the state having hay for sale. We would be glad to men who are looking for

Plans have been completed for our summer grazing research demonstration work. We will be trying to see if a ton of beef can be produced on an acre of irrigated alfalfa compared to an acre of irrigated lovegrass. There will be 40 acres of irrigated lovegrass and 40 acres of irrigated alfalfa in the research demonstration. We have talked to a number of producers who plan to do some grazing of alfalfa this summer. Some of the key points concerning bloat control are offered to producers who plan to graze alfalfa this summer:

1. Let cattle have access to the bloat preveniative for 2-5 days before turning on alfalfa.

2. Turn cattle on alfalfa about mid-morning after they have filled on other roughage. 3. Provide one lick wheel per 25 head of cattle.

4. Fence pasture into 5-6 equal sections. 5. Fertilize with approximately 100 pounds of phos-

phorus. Greg Estes, a Mobeetie 4-H member, has 8 Yorkshire pigs that he farrowed in his new farrowing crate. They were staying pretty close to the heat lamp. Greg had provided for them when we were over that way last week.

The Mobeetie community has purchased a new set of portable scales for weighing 4-H & FFA members livestock projects. These should be very helpful to their fine project programs. We helped set the scales last Thursday with their most capable ad with their most capable and enthusiastic Vocational Agriculture teacher, Orphus Tate, Jr.

The hand writing is already on the wall. Forage drops and later, the management put in a milo seed are likely to be in short supply by spring. Buy your 1973 supply early to save money and be as sured at the varieties you want.

Forage producers in Wheeler County are becoming interested in new grasses, several of which can be established from seed. In each case, good seedbed preparation is essential:

Start with a good seedbed. This means plowing the area several months before grasses are to be planted to permit the soil to settle and become firm.

One or two rains will help settle the soil and dissolve clods and large soil particles. Many of the new grasses contain 500,000 seed per pound. If planted in a rough seedbed, these small seeds frequently fall between clods and too deep to emerge above the soil.

Plant grass seed no more than one-half inch deep. In fact, planting the seed on top of the soil and using a roller or packer is satisfac-

tory in most casses. Adjust grass seed planters and drills before planting the pasture. A few minutes devoted to equipment maintenance and adjustment can mean the difference between share this list with any stock- a uniform stand and unsatisfactory planting.

More detailed information on planting grass seed may be obtained at the county Extension office.

A method of plant propa-

gation known as "air layering may be the answer for making better use of those overgrown house plants. Air layering develops a new root system on a stem that still has attractive foliage. This method works well

on ornamentals that are difficult to propagate by more conventional means. These include so-called "rubber" plants or ornamental figs as well as dieffenbachia, croton and similar plants.

To begin the air layering method, make a long diagonal cut into the stem at a point a few inches below the lower leaves. The cut should not be more than 1/3 the stem's diameter Keep the cut open with a toothpick or match stem.

Wrap the injured portion of the stem with damp sphagnum moss that has been soaked in water overnight. Squeeze the excess water from the moss and tie it in place around the wound with string. Wrap the moss and stem with a sheet of clear plastic film wide enough to cover the moss and extend an inch above and below the moss. Secure the plastic

Contract for Lifetime Care

"You get everything I own. In return, I get complete care for the rest of my life."

In effect, this was the agreement that an elderly widower made with a retirement home. And when he died a few years claim for his remaining assets.

However, the man's relatives went to court with an objection. "This was gambling, pure and simple," they argued. "No one knew how many years he would live. No one knew how much property he would have when he died. And gambling contracts are illegal."



But the court saw nothing illegal about the contract. Finding it no more of a gamble than an insurance policy, the court said the law had no objection so long as both parties understood what

they were doing. In most cases, contracts for lifetime care have been upheld as lawful and reasonable. Courts say they serve a useful purpose for those who want the security of a safe haven in their declining

Nor does the contract become invalid just because it happens to work out better for one side than the other.

In one case, a retirement home got a financial windfall because a relatively young resident, after paying a large membership fee, died within a few months. In another case, a retirement home tried to back out of its con-

tract after paying hospital expenses for an ailing resident for more than four years. But in both cases, despite conplaints, the courts ruled that a deal was a deal and had to be

carried out. Still, a contract might be invalidated by deception. One retirement home carefully avoided telling an incoming resident that

he was signing over all of his property. In this case, after the man died, his property was held to be-long to his children, not to the home. The court said it could not fairly enforce an agreement on which there was no "meeting
