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SAFETY DEVICE FOR DRILLING RIG PATENTED, 2 BUILT IN WHEELER

"Bert" Johnson has had much of his spare time the past 18 months working out the details for a safety device for the rotary table and drilling equipment. The patent on this safety device is applied and pending. The average person, however, knows very little, but enough to know that any other person on the platform of a drilling rig, it could mean a lot of trouble. Johnson has spent thirty years of his life in the oil business and knows the danger involved when working on a rotary table. The table is consuming; should a chain or water hose get caught in the rig, it would mangle anyone unfortunate to be standing in the rig if it is shut down. Johnson has devised a safety device for the rotary table. He then prepared a drawing to check to see if a piece of equipment

Opponents Outsiders Sat

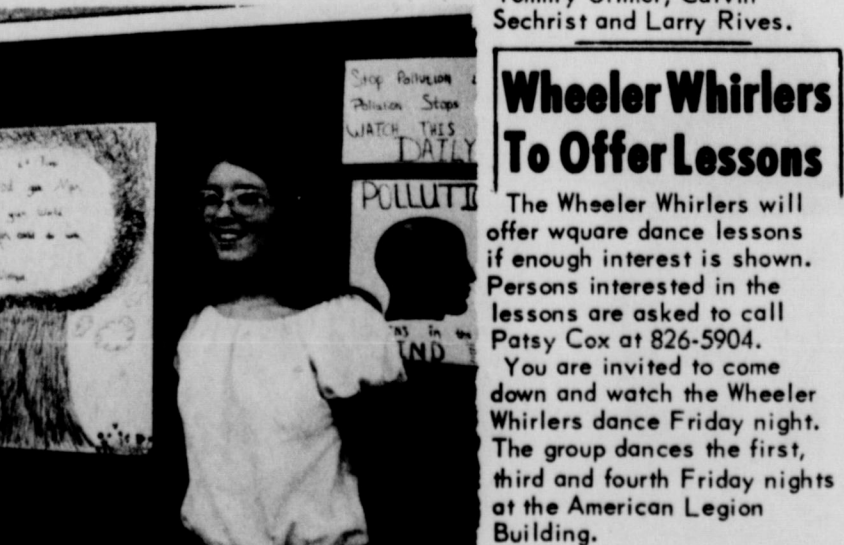

Funeral services for former Wheeler County Justice of the Peace Eugene Dixon "Dick" Guynes, 81, who died at 12:15 a.m. Thursday in Parkview Hospital here were held at 2:30 p.m. Saturday, February 10 in the First Methodist Church. The Rev. Ross Dunn, pastor, officiated at the services. Burial was in Wheeler Cemetery under the direction of Wright Funeral Home of Wheeler. Guynes was a native of Goldthwaite and had lived in Wheeler since 1900. He worked most of his life as a rural mail carrier, and had served as justice of the peace for the past 15 years. He retired Jan. 1. He was known in the Wheeler County area for his fiddle playing ability and for his ability to make fiddles and violins from imported maple and pine wood. While he still occupied the justice of the peace office in the basement of the courthouse, the walls were decorated with his violins. With the close of the basketball season this past week, the athletic department of Wheeler High School lost no time in getting right into their spring program. In fact, since the end of the football program, the boys that didn't take part in basketball have been hard at it in what is generally referred to as the "off season program". Through the avid use of a weight machine that was donated to the school several years ago, the boys have been going through a strenuous weight program along with conditioning running during the activity period. Track has now been added to the program and this spring sport will be worked in conjunction with the rest of the program. "Strength, agility, speed, and quickness, are big goals in the entire program and we feel that the discipline, sacrifice, and competitiveness that it gives a young man are essential to any good athletic program," athletic director Jim Bateman said this week. A portion of the 15 stations on the weight machine that the boys go through are: bench press, military press, leg press, lat pulls, leg curls, leg extensions, curls, dip bar, sit ups, and neck bridge. At the present time, 34 boys are taking part in the off season and track program with a lot of enthusiasm. "We have the best program going that you can find and if a young man wants to improve his athletic ability, this is the program for him," Bateman said. "The attitude the kids have to the program is great and their willingness to sacrifice and work is the mark of a winner," the head football coach and athletic director of the Mustangs went on to say. Boys that will be graduating into high school from Jr. High in the spring will be going through the same basic program but not as an accelerated basis.

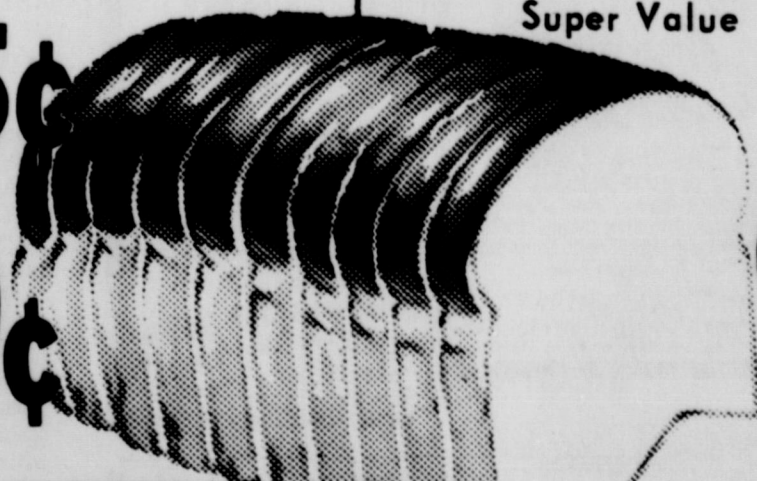

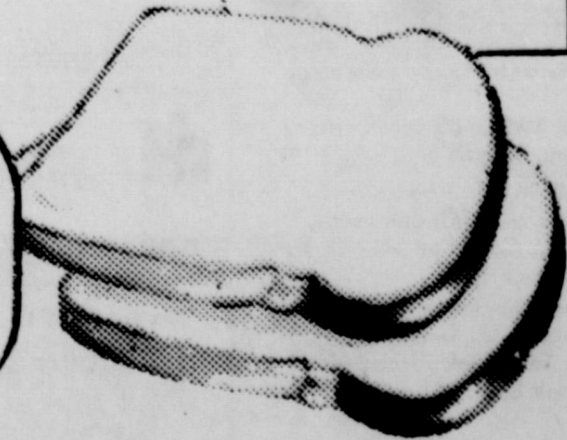

PAT'S PARAGRAPHS

Seems like time just flies by. I have worked as agent here in Wheeler County for 2½ years. I've enjoyed getting to know you and writing this column for your information. There is a quote that says "Make new friends, but keep the old. One is silver and the other is gold". Thank you for being my friends.
As of February 16, I will be moving to Panhandle in Carson County to take up my duties as county agent there. Come to see me when you're in Panhandle.
Many of you have blenders and I'm always hearing something that you like to

use yours for. For those of you with babies, you can use your blender to save money on baby food.
For example, four jars (almost 8 ounces) were made from a No. 2½ can of sliced, water pack, peaches costing 39¢. So cost of each ounce of homemade baby food was about 1.3¢.
A jar of commercially prepared "baby food" peaches cost 16¢ for almost five ounces. So each ounce cost 3.4¢.
Home makers also can prepare baby food from the family table, using food that doesn't have much salt, spices, sugar, seasoning or strong flavors.
After preparing food in the

blender, one homemaker fills clean plastic ice-cube trays with blended meat and vegetable leftovers. She wraps the filled trays in airtight freezer wrap, then freezes them. At mealtime, she thaws just enough cubes for the baby's meal.
Another money-saving idea is to buy canned or frozen vegetables especially for baby food. Cook in a small amount of water in the blender with the vegetables so vitamins that went from vegetables into the water will be saved.
Use canned or frozen fruits packed without sugar, such as water pack.
One more advantage of blender preparation is that just the right consistency can be achieved. As a young child grows and can handle food less smooth, decrease blending speed or time. This helps the homemaker make food that meets the child's needs.
I'm a soup and stew lover. Here's a recipe I really like, hope you like it too.
BEAN SOUP
1 lb. dried beans (navy, pea or great northern)
1 smoked ham bone, meaty
1 cup chopped onion
3 medium size potatoes (cooked & mashed)
1 cup chopped onion
3 medium size potatoes (cooked & mashed)
1 cup chopped celery
2 cloves garlic, minced
Wash & soak the beans. Add enough water to make 5 qts. Add the smoked ham bone (a sizeable ham hock may be used) and simmer about 2 hours or until the beans begin to mush. Add the potatoes, onion, celery and garlic. Simmer for 1 hour. Remove the bone, trim the meat off it and put meat back into the soup. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Makes about 4½ quarts.
