these missing men and
their families in their
services and, also, to
elicit concern nationwide
and world-wide up through
their highest councils. Let
these men not be for-
gotten.

Sunday.

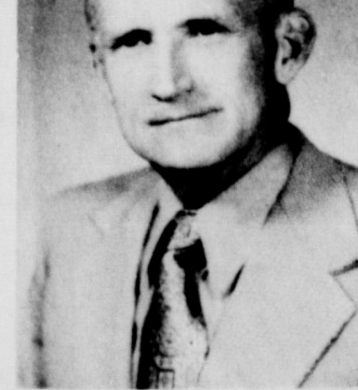
Evangelist Leroy Garrett

Statement of Non-Discrimination

"Greenbelt Electric Cooperative, Inc. has filed with the Federal Government a Compliance Assurance in which it assures the Rural Electrification Administration that it will comply fully with all requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Agriculture issued thereunder, to the end that no person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the conduct of its program and the operation of its facilities. Such complaint must be filed not later than 90 days after the alleged discrimination, or by such later date to which the Secretary of Agriculture or the Rural Electrification Administration extends the time for filing. Identity of complainants will be kept confidential except to the extent necessary to carry out the purposes of the Rules and Regulations."

A junior at Briscoe High School, she is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jeff Puryear. She is a member of the Briscoe Senior 4-H Club.

Miss Puryear earned the right to compete at the state level when she became top scoring individual of her entry class in the senior division at district competition last April.

Her winning entry was "Pumpkin Squares" which she'll prepare for a panel of judges at the state contest. Theme for the con test is "Food for All Seasons."

The educational objectives of the 4-H foods and nutrition program include helping 4-H members understand the interrelation of science, nutrition and food preparation along with signs of good health, and food needs of different age groups.

We also try to help them develop desirable eating habits and skills in buying, planning, preparing, and serving nutritious meals.

Home canning season is just around the corner. Food preserved fresh from the garden is a treat for your family's appetite and food budget. It is necessary to have your canner in top shape for your family's safety in eating home preserved food. Your Wheeler County Extension office has equipment available to test your own pressure canner. This service is free to you. please take advan-

tage of it before the height of home canning.

School's out and your family is ready for vacation. It is important to protect your home against burglary while away on vacation.

Any burglary means a severe budget upset--especially if insurance coverage isn't adequate.

But even with excellent coverage, many items have sentimental as well as financial value--and simply can't be replaced.

Therefore it's crucial to lessen the possibility of burglary by eliminating everything that suggest the house is vacant. A family can do several things before leaving to achieve this.

For one, cancel all daily papers and discontinue newspapers. A yard full of yellowing newspapers is an open invitation to thieves.

Also, connect at least one lamp to an automatic timer so it turns on at dusk and off at bedtime--creating a "Lived in" appearance. Thieves watch for lights left on too long as well as darkened houses.

Leave shades or blinds in a normal position--not completely closed.

Close and lock all windows and doors--including those in the garage and outdoor storeroom.

Use pin-tumbler cylinder locks on all outside doors. These locks require a key to both lock and unlock them.

Arrange to have lawn cut, plants watered and other yard work done.

Make an arrangement with the post office or a neighbor to either hold or forward all mail.

Notify local police and neighbors to date of departure and return.

Leave a house key in a neighbor or friend's home if your itinerary destination.

Give him a description of the family car and license number so state police locate if necessary.

Store valuables in a deposit box.

Make a current household inventory. In case of a burglary an accurate inventory helps determine what are missing--simplifying insurance collection.
