





MAY 11, 1973 Nobody pulled a rabbit out of a hat last week at the Kelton 4-H rabbit show but if they had, no one would've bin too surprised. Dr. Robert Berry, Area Plant Pathologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Lubbock who judged the show, did hyptontize a few of the entries though. No kidding. Janice Lister won a blue ribbon with her buck rabbit. Brenda Harvey got two 2nd places in the buck division. Other placings were as follows: S san Harris, 3rd; Angela

Abernathy, 4th, Mark Shelton 5th (of Alli son); and Jim DeBauche of Allison 6th. Tracy Kill ngsworth placed

Numerous cases of oak bud poisoning are being confirmed in many parts of Texas, and livestock owners in Wheeler County should be on the alert for this problem.

The Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory at College Station has confirmed epidemics of the disease in cattle, and we look for cases to continue for the next month.

The problem also is known in some areas as sand shin oak poisoning. Oak buds or leaves contain tannis which damage the kidneys and other organis, producing frequent passage of urine that is red in some cases.

Additionally, the affected animals may be constipated at first, followed by diarrhea. They develop a rough coat of hair, lose weight and may die in from one to 10 days. Swelling may appear in lower parts of the body and a brownish nasal exudate is often

When new growth appears in the spring, the oak buds are both palatable and toxic. Oak bud poisoning can be diagnosed if the cattle have the symptoms outlined and if owners submit a blood sample from sick animals to the Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory. Local veterinarians should be called, however to differentiate between oak bud poisoning and other similar diseases.

A good supplementary feed will help reduce losses, and another preventive measure is to move cattle out of pastures where shin oak is growing.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, in work done by Dr. J.W. Dollahite, professor of texicology, has developed a ration that helps control losses. It should be creep fed to calves, and cows need to consume about four pounds daily. Ingredients of the ration include 600 pounds of ground alfalfa, 1,080 pounds of 41% protein cottonseed meal, 120 pounds of vegetable oil and 200 pounds of calcium
