Mobeetie Comm. Improv'mt Contest Tour Is Slated

More than 10 points of interest will be visited at the Mobeetie Community Improvement tour to be held April 27 beginning at 9:30 a.m. at the Mobeetie High School.

Paul Hathaway, Community Chairman, says that community leaders are working together to present the best impression to the community judges. The Texas Community Improvement Contest has 5 entries from the Panhandle district. The closest entry to Wheeler County is Lipscomb. Some \$7,000 in prize money is available over the state to community winners through the sponsorship of the Electric Utility Companies, and the Texas A&M University Extension Service.

Some of the tour stops to be visited include the following: The Adobe Walls Boy Scout Camp, addition to the Gordon Estes home built partly from railroad ties from the old Santa Fe railroad depot at Mobeetie, the oldest home in the Texas Panhandle the Grady Harris farm, one of the fast disappearing buffalo wallows characteristic of the area, Edith Dunn's orchard, Paul Hathaway's center-pivot irrigation system, Carroll Langley's

agricultural improvements, Jack Heffley's new home, Clifford Walser's starting pens, Prime Feeders new feedlot, the old Jail, Ernest Gordon's corrals and churches in the area.

Jim Selby is gathering agricultural data to present as an important facet of the community to the judges. Carroll Langley is gathering material on the oil and gas picture in the area. E.A. Tumbow will help narrate the Boy Scout Camp stop. Melvin May and Gordon Laverty will summarize business activity in the town proper.

The school library will be the location for displays of quilts, paintings and crafts which can be viewed on the tour date.

All members of the Mobeetie Community and supporters from the area are encouraged to come out and participate in the morning tour. Sandwiches will be served at noon by community members. A good gathering for the tour will help the community in the judging.

CITY COUNCIL MEETS

Run-Off Water, Telephone Hike

At the April meeting of the Wheeler City Council, bids were opened for seal coating of streets in Wheeler. The project was tabled until the May meeting to see what effect the warmer weather is going to have on the streets and determining the need for the seal coating.

Larry Tracy met with the council and signed the contract for the operation of the swimming pool this summer. The council discussed the raising of admission prices, but decided to leave them at 25¢ and 50¢.

The water problem on Stanley, Reynolds and East Seventh were discussed with the city engineer, Bud Bowie. Efforts to correct the problem will continue.

The council voted to grant General Telephone the rate increase they have requested. The increase will go into effect with the June 7th billing.

A bid from Burrough Corp.

for a new posting machine was accepted by the council.

The council voted to foreclose on the Joe Sanders property on East Second. The city holds a lien for the amount of the paving plus interest.

The council viewed and approved the payment of the bills. Among checks to be mailed was the check for the final payment on the street sweeper.

Mayor Pete Burton assigned the Councilmen their departments. Bill Owen will continue as Mayor Pro-tem and head the water and sewer department. Dr. Tommie Hennard will head the street department. Heading the transportation department is Glen Markham. David Cross will oversee the dump grounds, airport and fire department. The swimming pool and park will be under the supervision of Louis Stas.

In addition, those who qualify will receive a forgiveness benefit on their loan of not to exceed \$5,000 based on losses that are uncompensated by insurance or otherwise.

Across the Fence

Listen closely and you can hear the lovegrass growing. The last few days have helped us in greening up grass that is going to be a month later than usual.

Looks like the cotton farmers will be eliminated quickly if government checks are cut out in new farm programs.

"Agricultural Careers" will be the topic I'll be discussing at the Career Day at the Wheeler High School on Friday, April 27. All students who are considering a career in this important area are encouraged to attend. In the area of beef production, we are going to have to double the present capacity of feedlots by 1985 to feed the present population. At the same time we will need large numbers of animal scientists, nutritionists, farmers, ranchers, and other folks to help in this task. As a nation, we produced 10 million pounds of beef in 1950. In 1970, we produced 22

million pounds of beef or double what we produced in 1950. In 1985, we will need 32 million pounds of beef.

Tom Christner says that lovegrass and alfalfa can be sowed together and grazed very effectively. Tom grazed 100-120 head on a 28 acre field of the mixture for 60 days last year. A 300 pound seed crop to the acre was harvested after the cattle were taken off. In addition, he baled 2200 bales of hay on the 28 acre field and grazed it off again. This experience sounds like a good endorsement for this mixture. Apparently the lovegrass helps prevent bloat as experienced with a straight alfalfa together.

The Mobeetie Community Improvement Tour will begin at 9:30 a.m. this Friday April 27 beginning at the Mobeetie School. Judges will view the community and judge the progress made against that of 5 other communities in the Panhandle.

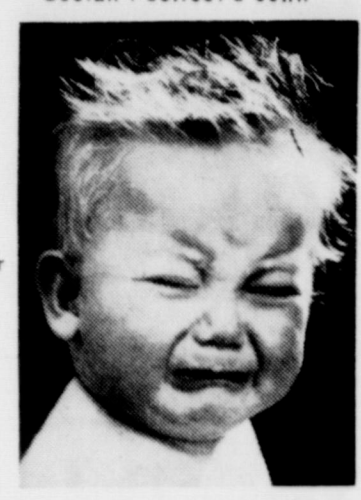

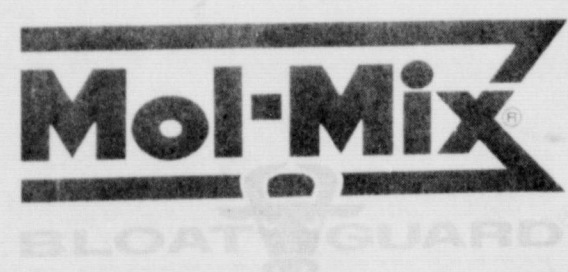
