ELECTION DAY IS SAT

PLANNING FOR CITY COUNCIL ELECTION SLATED FOR APRIL 7

Plans in the Wheeler City Council will be to have three names on the ballot for the three seats on the council to be filled. The names, Glenn Markham, Tommie Hennard and Tommie Hennard with the city secretary Mildred Ramsey to their names placed on the ballot. Markham and Hennard are each seeking an annual term on the council. Hennard will be asking for a first chance to serve on the council.

Glenn Markham is the owner and manager of Wheel-Text Feeds. He has been a citizen of Wheeler for a number of years and will be seeking his second term on the council. Bill Owen, a life long resident of Wheeler is completing a one year term on the council. He had served on the council before retiring and last year placed his name on the ballot for a one year term.

Mobeetie City Election Slated

Election has been called for Mobeetie for the election of a Mayor and five councilmen. The write-in election will be held at the Mobeetie School in conjunction with the school election on Saturday, April 7. Present City Council members are Mayor Stuart, Marshall Henry and councilmen, Selby, Walter Coward, Burch, Clarence and Laura Fern.

Hospital Board To be Named

Mobeetie, Briscoe and Allison communities will each be electing directors for the Parkview Hospital Board in the April 7 Election. Each community has one director on the Board of Directors. Each of the three men filed to have their names placed on the ballots. Representing Mobeetie and filing for another term is Lester Leonard. Herbert Finsterwald of Briscoe placed his name on the ballot for an additional term on the board. The Allison board member is Lewis Grayson; he will serve on the board if elected.

A TRUSTEE ELECTIONS ARE FOR SATURDAY, APRIL 7

The school elections are set for Saturday, April 7, at five area schools. Only two have contested for the board of trustees. In Briscoe, four names have been placed on the ballot for the three positions on the board. Named on the ballot are Mrs. LaJuana Puryear, Eddie George, H.S. Austin and Grant Meek. Gordon Estes, Paul Hathaway, Douglas Corse and D. Dyson have placed names on the ballots for Mobeetie for election to

one of the three positions open on the board of trustees. Seeking a post on the Wheeler School Board are Larry Jennings and Bob Patterson. In Allison School District, Hiram Begert, Larry Elmore and Damer Miller have filed for a place on the board. Three positions are to be filled. Kelton has two openings on the School Board. Marion Bryant and George R. Davis had their names printed on the ballot.

WHEELER ELEMENTARY WINS DISTRICT LITERARY MEET AT CLARENDON! HIGH SCHOOL PLACES SECOND



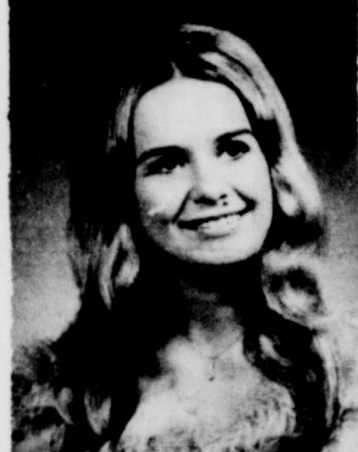

He played nose-guard for the Red Raiders for the past three years, making all-Southwest Conference twice and gaining a second team All-America berth this past fall. Larry Wartes, presently serving in the capacity of Administrative Assistant to the Superintendent in the Hereford school system, will be the principal speaker. Mr. Wartes is no stranger to athletic circles in the state of Texas. Having graduated from Amarillo High School, Wartes did all of his college work at Hardin Simmons University in Abilene where he got his bachelor and masters degrees. The new post office will contain 1,856 square feet of interior floor space when completed in September. The owner will lease the building to the Postal Service for ten years, with renewal options for an additional 20 years.

April 1 through 7 has been designated NATIONAL FHA WEEK by the Wheeler Chapter of FHA. Members of Future Homemakers of America will carry out special activities and observances designed to share their experiences and accomplishments with family, friends and neighbors.

The theme chosen for this year's NATIONAL FHA WEEK is EXPLORE ROLES - EXTEND GOALS to focus attention on what over half-a-million young men and women in FHA and HERO chapters throughout the country are doing to explore the multiple roles individuals play in family, community and career life.

1/2 cup sugar
2 1/2 cups boiling water
1 cup sugar
2 tsp. butter
1 tsp. vanilla
1/8 tsp. salt
1/2 cup sugar
1 tsp. soft butter
1/2 cup milk
1 1/2 tsp. baking powder
1 1/4 cup flour

Caramelize 1/2 cup sugar by melting slowly in a heavy pan over low heat, stirring with a wooden spoon until brown in color. Add boiling water, 1 cup sugar and 2 tsp. butter. Boil 10 min. add vanilla and salt. Cream 1/2 cup sugar, 1 tsp. butter, milk and baking powder and flour into stiff batter. Pour caramel mixture into 8x8" pan, drop batter into mixture by large spoonfuls. Bake at 400° for 15 min.

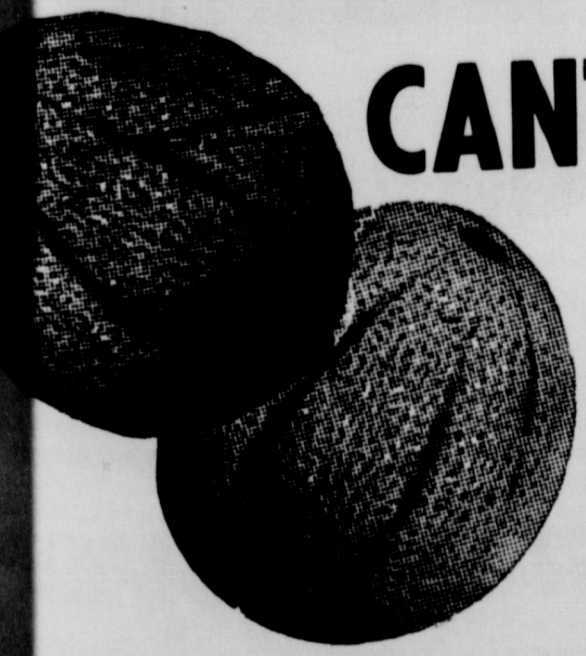

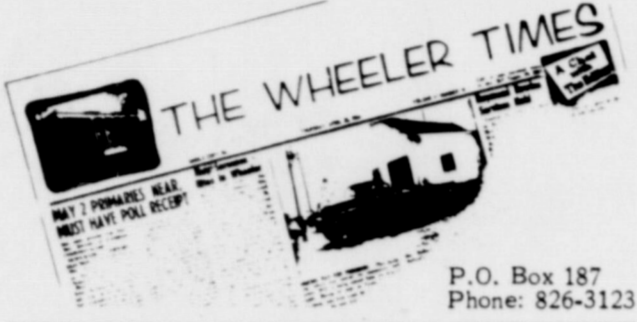

Although we haven't seen a lot of lovegrass seeded this way in Wheeler County. We would like to point out that aerial seeding may be a reasonable alternative to consider. 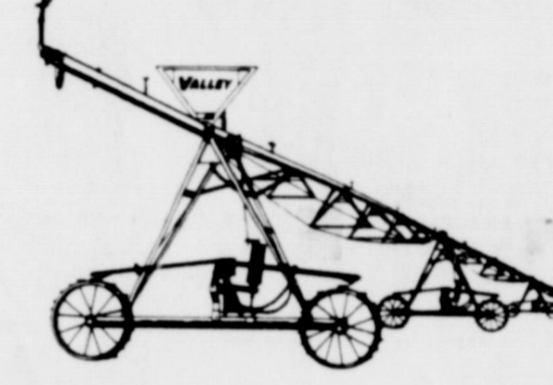

is so poor it takes twenty acres to rust a ten penny nail! So don't forget to shoot the fertilizer to lovegrass this spring. With the moisture we've got, you ought to have more grass to graze than you've got cattle. Looks like calves are so high, you may have to go by Fort Knox before you drop by the cattle sales. In any event, it's going to take more cash to stock your pastures this spring. Get that last year's growth off those pastures in the next few weeks. One fellow we know spent a lot of time beating the old growth off, then turned around and burned it off anyway. Seems like he had a problem getting thru it with his anhydrous rig.

Last Wednesday, the steer calves on the irrigated alfalfa demonstration were turned in on the alfalfa. They had been consuming the liquid palaxalene molasses mixture for about a week. The alfalfa got a starter fertilizer of 400 pounds of 8-32-16 a few days ago.

On April 6th at the Shamrock High School, we'll try to give you a progress report on the irrigated alfalfa and lovegrass demonstrations. Dr. Gene Cope, Extension Veterinarian, who used to practice his trade at Hereford, is going to talk on Stocker Calf Animal Health. Tom Christner of Wheeler is going to tell us how he handles his incoming calves. The meeting is slated to get underway at 7:30 p.m. The Shamrock Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the meeting and will serve refreshments. The meeting is open to all the public.

"That is Your Opinion"

9. Baptism is a planting (Rom. 6:5)
10. Baptism is for (unto) the remission of sins (Acts 2:38, 22:16)
11. Baptism was performed without delay (Acts 2:41, 16:33)
12. One arises from baptism to walk a new life. (Rom. 6:4)
13. Baptism puts one into Christ (Gal. 3:26-27)
14. "Baptism doth also now save us" (1 Pet. 3:21)
15. In refusing baptism, one rejects the counsel of God. (Luke 7:30)

Texas Conservat'n Farming Techniq's

Reduced air pollution, lower farming costs - these are two goals of a new farming technique being used by Texas conservation farmers. Called minimum tillage, the system limits cultural operations to only those essential to crop production. Bill Brooks, district conservationist for the U.S. Soil Conservation Service at Wheeler, said with minimum tillage farming, crops are planted directly into a mulch left undisturbed from the previous crop. Competition is controlled with herbicides. "This system leaves a year-long cover on the soil surface," Brooks pointed out. "Cover from dead stalks and leaves is one of the best known methods of reducing wind and water erosion." Cotton yields generally have been increased by minimum tillage, especially on the sandy soils, Brooks said. Grain sorghum yields have been about the same or slightly less with minimum tillage. Brooks listed these other major advantages of minimum tillage: 1. Conserves moisture. The protective mulch of crop residues keeps the soil cooler in the summer and warmer in the winter; this effectively reduces evaporation. 2. Better seedling survival. Surface residues protect young seedlings from wind damage or from being covered by soil dislodged during heavy rains. 3. Increased wildlife food and cover. Stalks, leaves, and scattered seed left on the soil surface greatly benefit quail, dove, songbirds and other wildlife. To begin a minimum tillage farming system, Brooks said farmers should either start with a high residue producing crop, such as grain sorghum, or plant the first crop into a thick mulch of crop residues. He said minimum tillage systems can fail if a crop such as cotton is plant-
