Seal Coat Work Started in Co.

A contract for seal coat work on 45.5 miles of highway in the Childress district was awarded by the Texas Highway Commission during its January meeting in Austin.

The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer V.J. McGee. The contract includes work in Briscoe, Childress, Collingsworth, Donley, Knox, Motley and Wheeler Counties.

Cooper and Woodruff, Inc. of Amarillo was awarded the contract with a low bid of \$146,649.75. The work will take an estimated 100 working days to complete. Vance L. Castleberry of Childress is the Highway Department engineer in charge.

The projects include work on Highway FM 48-1.226 miles from FM 1046 to St. 152; FM 1046-8.007 miles from FM 48 to US 83; and FM 3182, 5.958 miles from FM 1046 to St. 152 in Wheeler County.

JAYNE PARSONS NAMED HOMEMAKER OF TOMORROW

Wheeler's 1973 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow is Jayne Parsons.

Selected by score in a written contest and attitude examination taken by both senior boys and girls on Jan. 5, Jayne will receive a specially designed award from General Mills, sponsor of the annual Betty Crocker Search for American Homemakers of Tomorrow.

In addition, Jayne remains eligible for state and national honors.

The State Homemaker of Tomorrow, to be chosen from school winners in the state in judging centering performance in the December test, will receive a \$500 college scholarship, 20-volume reference work, "The Annals of America," will also be presented to the state winner's school by Encyclopaedia Britannica Educational Corporation.

The second-ranking student in the state will receive a \$200 scholarship.

In late April, the 51 Betty Crocker Homemakers of Tomorrow representing every state and the District of Columbia -- each accompanied by a faculty adviser -- will gather in Washington, D.C., for an expense-paid tour of the capital city and Colonial Williamsburg, Va. Culminating the tour will be announcement of the 1973 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow and three runners-up. To be selected through personal observation and interviews during the tour plus state-level judging results, they will be awarded stipends of \$5,000, \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000.

A hog show was planned for Allison and Briscoe W.H. and F.F.A. students to be held at Allison school house March 2nd at 4:00 o'clock P.M.

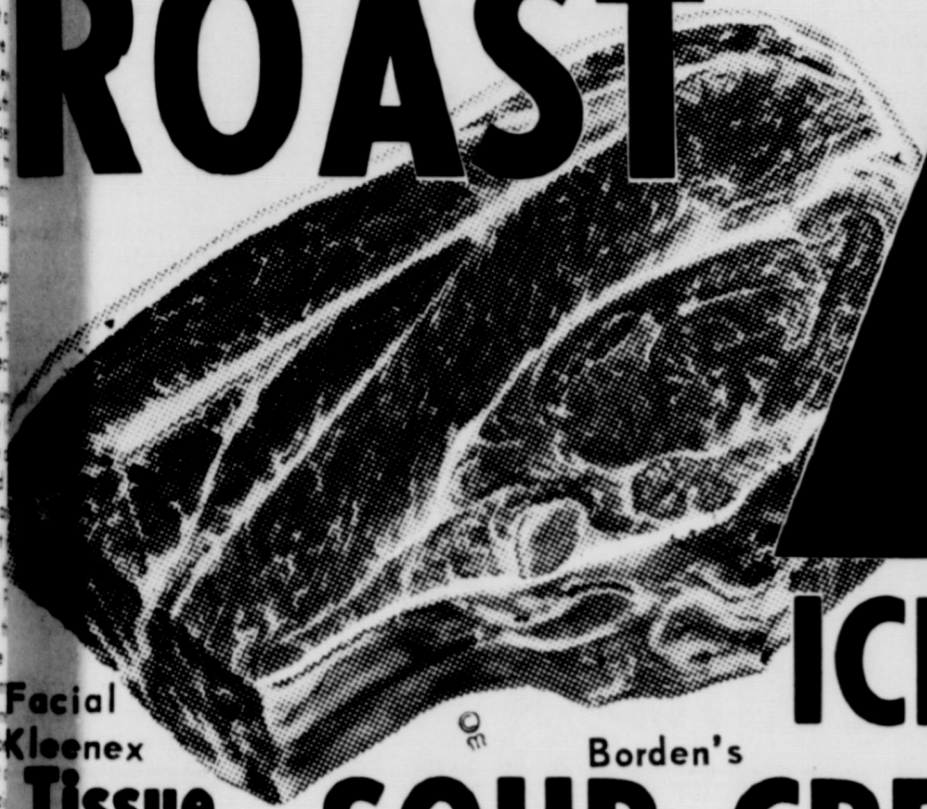

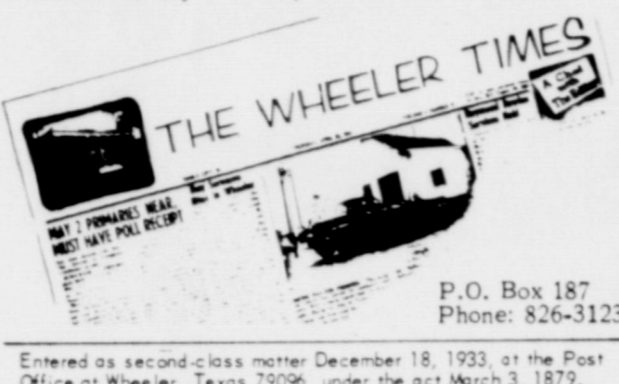

COTTAGE THOUSAND ISLAND DRESSING

1 cup cottage cheese
4 tsp. sugar
3/4 tsp. salt
dash of pepper
2 tbsps. pickle relish
3 tbsps. chili sauce
2 tsp. vinegar
1/2 tsp. prepared mustard
1 hard cooked egg, chopped
1 tbsps. finely chopped onion

Beat cottage cheese until fairly smooth. Beat in chili sauce, sugar, salt, mustard and pepper. Slice egg, pickle relish and onion. Chill to blend. Yield: approx. 1 1/2 cups
