

SHERIFF KILLED IN ACCIDENT SAT.

3-Vehicle Accident, One Fatality

A three-vehicle accident east of Wheeler Saturday morning is still under investigation. Lonnie Loyal Miller, Wheeler County Sheriff, was pronounced dead shortly after the 2:15 A.M. accident.

Miller, 56, was traveling east, enroute home, on Highway 152. A pickup driven by David Moore, 25, of Wheeler was traveling west. The two vehicles collided head-on 9 1/2 miles east of Wheeler. A second pickup driven by Dwayne Watson of Shamrock then struck Moore's pickup.

Three victims were taken to Parkview Hospital. Miller was pronounced dead after arrival at the hospital. David Moore was treated for a broken arm and lacerations; he was released from the local hospital later in the day. Teresa Watts, a passenger in the sheriff's car remains in the hospital for observation. The driver of the other vehicle was not injured.

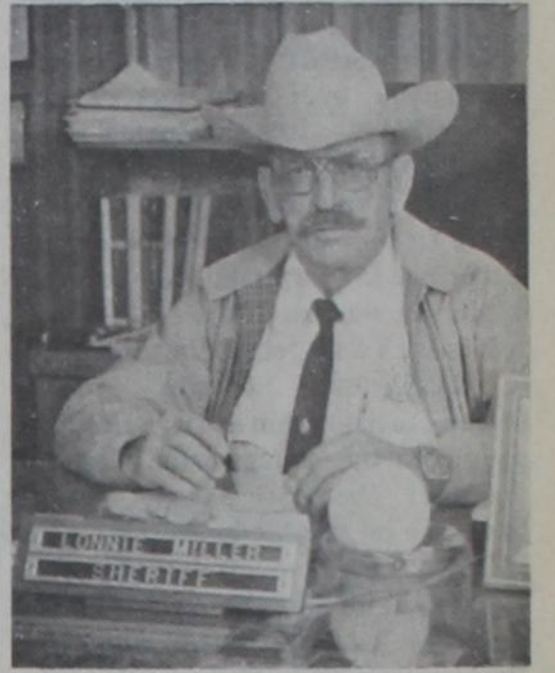
Seatbelts were not in use by any of the individuals involved in the accident.

The accident is still under investigation by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Services for Miller were held at the First Baptist Church in Wheeler Monday, September 19, 1988. Rev. Robert Helsley, pastor, officiate at the 11:00 A.M. service. Burial was in the Wheeler cemetery under the direction of Wright Funeral Home.

Lonnie was born January 10, 1932 in Wheeler and had lived most of his life in the Wheeler area. He served in law enforcement since 1958 and was a

deputy sheriff for eight years. He was completing his first term as Wheeler County Sheriff.

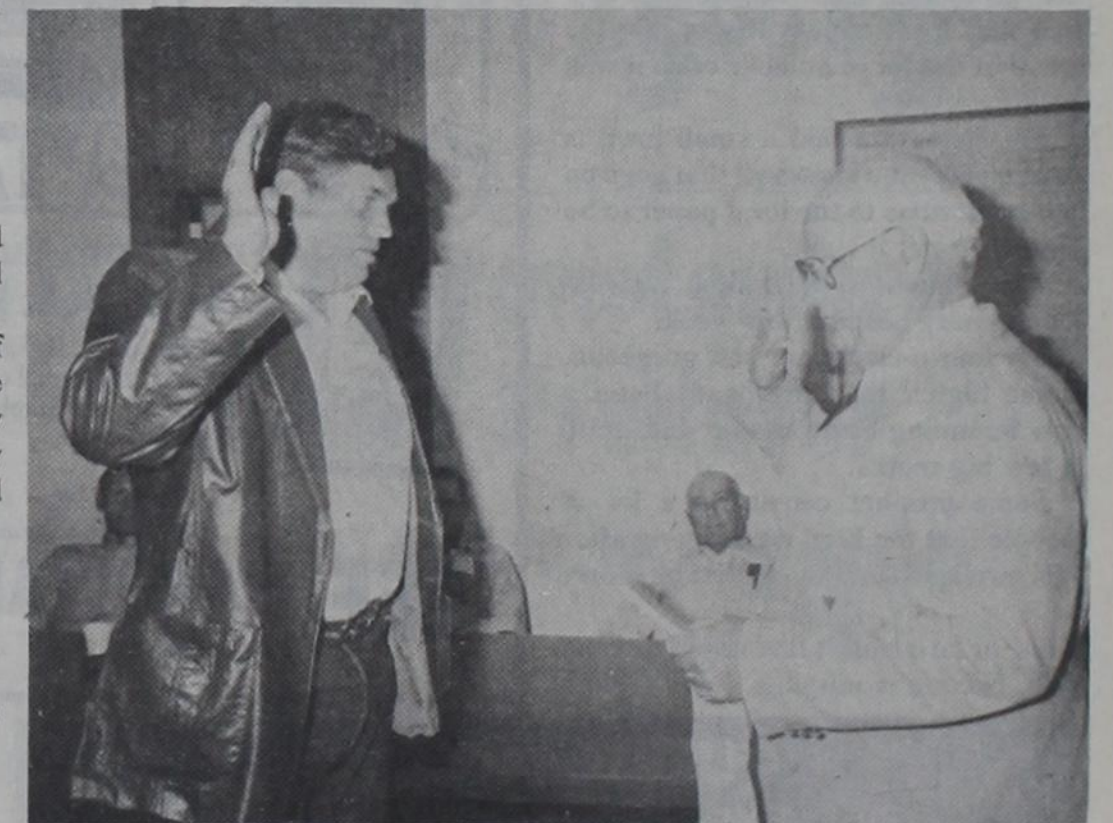
Miller was a member of the First Baptist Church, Masonic Lodge and Texas Sheriff's Association.

Vera Rogers, R.N., Enters Retirement

A group of friends gathered Wednesday afternoon at 4:30 to say "Thank You" and wish Vera Rogers many happy years of retirement. Vera is retiring after 47 years of nursing. The reception was held in the cafeteria of Parkview Hospital September 14.

Vera McNeil began as a practical nurse immediately following graduation from high school and worked in the "old hospital" for Drs. H. E. Nicholson and Glen A. Walker. At the age of 17 she was too young for nurses training.

In 1938, at the age of 18, Vera entered Northwest Texas Hospital School of Nursing and completed her "R.N. Degree" in 1942.

After her marriage to Joe Rogers, Vera entered the Army Air corp as a commissioned officer and served much of her time at a prisoner of war camp in Oklahoma. She served as an R.M., advanced to a first lieutenant until 1945.

Vera and Joe finished their tour of duty in the service and returned to Wheeler.

Upon her return to Wheeler, Vera worked for Dr. Nicholson and was a

school nurse for approximately 11 years. In August, 1964, she began working for Dr. Larry Barbour and except for a 2 year period during his absence, has continued to work for him until the present.

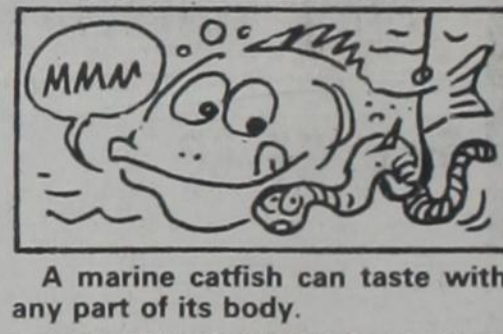

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
GENERAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 8, 1988

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. The Texas

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

From The Minister's Desk:

Let me share with you an astute observation that I recently heard. This observation was: "Please let me count my own blessings. I don't want someone to count them for me."

There are probably several circumstances of life where this observation is applicable. Buy it is particularly applicable when people are grieved. Virgil Fry, a chaplain at M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute in Houston, Texas, recently listed some statements that did not comfort people when they were grieved.

These statements were:
Just be glad you had him/her as long as you did.
Don't cry.
Try not to think about it.
It is God's will.
You shouldn't feel that way.
Nobody promised you'd have him/her forever.

The Bible teaches us "...to comfort those who are in any affliction..." (II Corinthians 1:3-5) And if such statements do not comfort those people who are grieved, it is only reasonable to ask: "How can these people be comforted?"

Consider these three suggestions.

1. Be mostly silent. To comfort

people, it is not necessary to speak an abundance of words. It is not necessary to give an explanation or to give advice. Your presence will be appreciated and remembered more than your words.

2. Be supportive. You may be a Christian who strongly believes that "...the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord..." (Romans 6:23) But this conviction should not nullify your sensitivity. The Apostle Paul wrote: "...Weep with those who weep..." (Romans 12:15) Supportive people are a genuine balm to people who are grieved.

3. Be helpful. You cannot erase or remove the feelings that grieved people experience. But you can be helpful. You can...cook food...wash dishes...shine shoes...clean house...or do laundry. Such helpful acts can comfort people who are grieved.

If you know people who are grieved, do not count their blessings for them. Comfort them. Put your arm around their shoulder, cry with them, or do a good deed for them. With such comfort, these people will eventually be able to county their blessings for themselves.

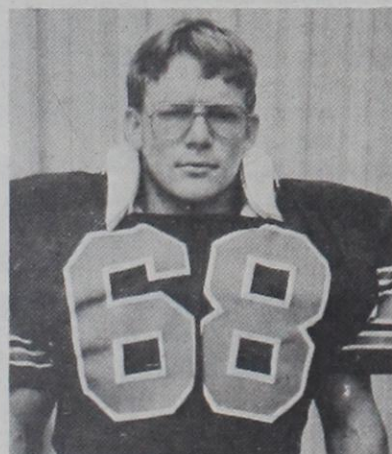

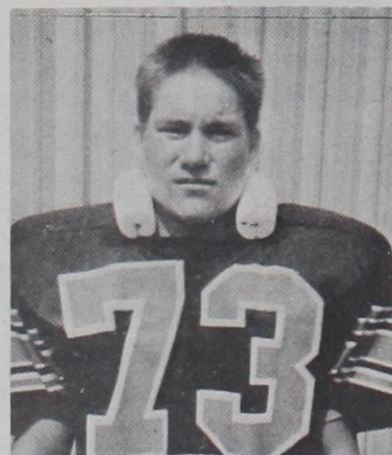

the missed Wheeler threat but the Mustangs rose up at the 5 yard line and forced a 21 yard field goal try that went wide.

An intercepted pass by Richardson on the 30 three plays after his missed field goal try put the Cyclones in business again as Richardson returned the pigskin to the Wheeler 9. Two running plays got 3 yards and then the Cyclones were fined 10 yards for illegal use of hands. Allan McCutchen threw incomplete and then was downed for an 18 yards loss on fourth down and Wheeler had stopped the second Memphis threat.

Under 8 minutes remained in the half when the Cyclones struck for their first TD. Memphis was on their 38 following a 38 yard punt off the toe of Kyle Sword when McCutchen found wide receiver Steve Georage all alone on the sideline and the speedy Georage was pulled down at the Mustang 23. Then McCutchen spied Chad Ellis by himself on the Wheeler 5 and they connected on a 22 yard scoring toss that put the Cyclones up by seven when Richardson booted the extra point.

Two and a half minutes were left on the clock in the second quarter when the Cyclones put the ball in play from the 50. An incomplete pass preceded McCutchen hitting a wide open again Georage on the sideline and there was no catching him.

Trailing 14-0, the Mustangs headed for the dressing room not only with no points but they had been unable to garner a first down in the first two quarters of play.

Trying to get back in the game midway of the third period, the Mustangs had another scoring opportunity slip through their fingers. Justin Hughes intercepted a Cyclone pass on the Wheeler 35 and returned five to the 40.

Jason Wood had taken over the man under duties and Shawn Bradstreet had moved to running back and these two hooked up to cap one of two long plays the Mustangs had for the game. Wood pitched to Bradstreet who pulled up and passed to Sword for a 34 yard gain to the Memphis 26. The drive fizzled four plays later when Bradstreet coughed up the ball and Memphis recovered at the 17.

The passing of Wood and the receiving of Chick, who was playing in his first varsity game, were about the only bright spots in an otherwise poor offensive performance.

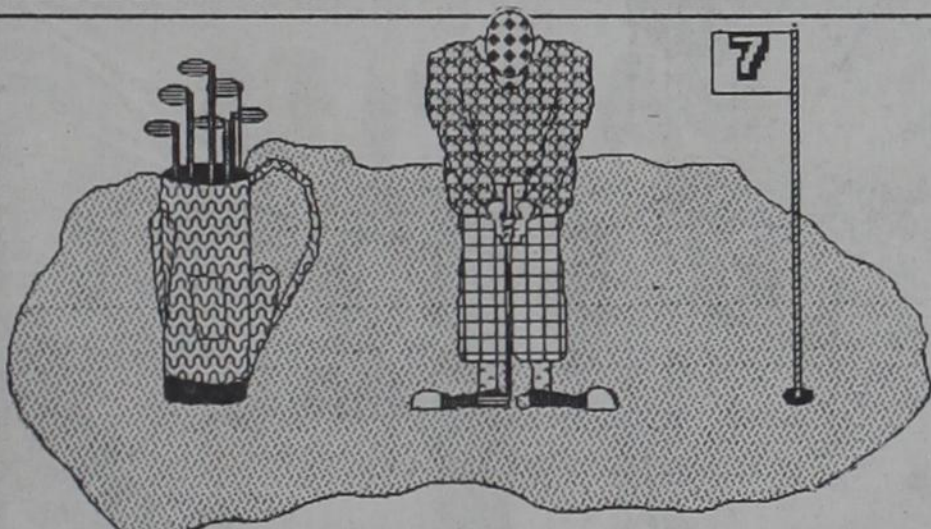
