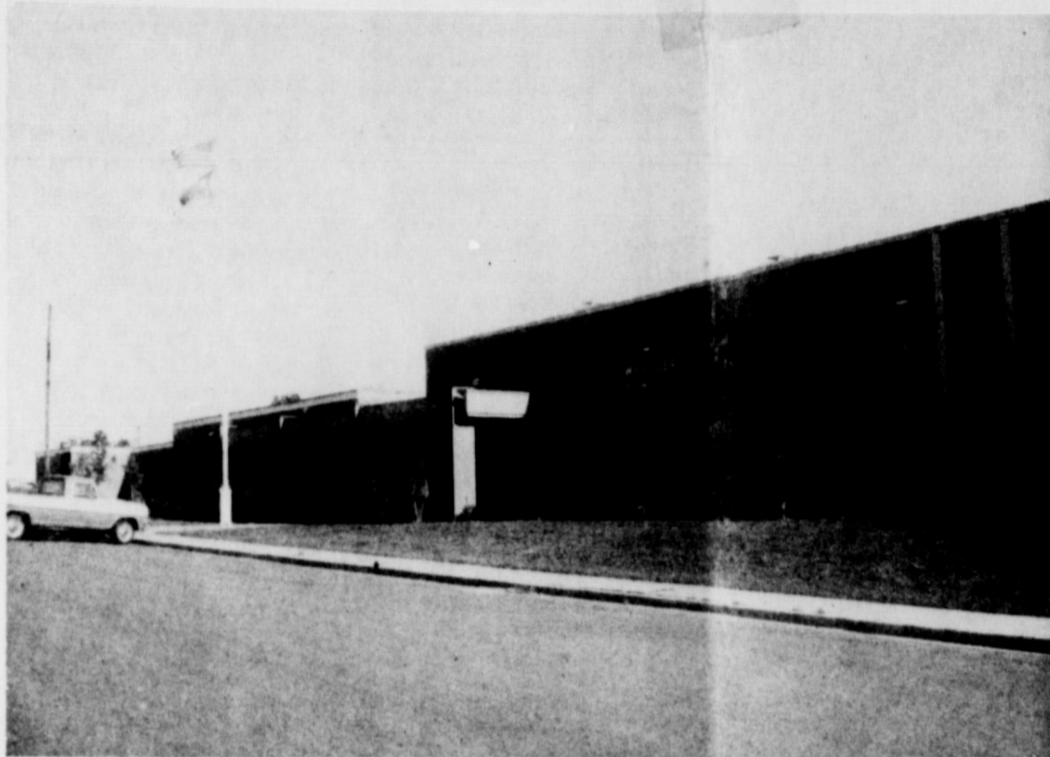

EX-STUDENTS AND TEACHERS GATHER SAT.

Ex-Students and Teacher Project Nearly Complete

Thursday, May 24, 1973
The completion date of the six-year project of the Ex-Student-Teacher Association to erect a flag pole for the Wheeler School Association voted in to erect the flag pole at the location could be selected. The flag pole would be located in the middle of the front sidewalk. Hiram Whitener, president, of the association began the pouring of the concrete on Wednesday, April 4. The flagpole was erected and Wheeler Redid finished the cement

needed.
Natural Gas Pipeline of America furnished the materials and manpower needed for the raising of the pole. The crew from NGPL completed their portion on Thursday, May 24, when the pole was put together, into place and raised.
A plaque for the flagpole and an aluminum ball for the top of the pole are on order but will not arrive in time for the reunion Saturday, June 9th.
From the time the school was completed a temporary pole had been used.

The Article Reads Cattleman Sells Direct

Young, tall with a close clipped shock or reddish-blond hair and wearing orange boots, Terry Hollan looks like the cattleman he is.

But more often than you'll find him leaning on a rough rail fence, he'll be quoting cattle prices from behind a walnutgrained desk on the second floor of a bank, manning a telephone and punching a hand calculator.

Such is the nature of cattle dealing these days.

Spurred by the spring housewife meat boycott and the subsequent ceiling on meat prices levied by President Nixon, Hollan and his business partners in the Diamond Cattle Co., are selling cattle directly to consumers, cutting out the middlemen he said make market prices too high.

Head, Hide and All

Hollan said his type of business may be the coming thing. He offers the consumers his choice of more than 25,000 head of cattle at 49 cents per pound-head, hide, bones, and all.

"You want beef? You come out here and you can cart the calf of your choice away for your family," Hollan said swinging his orange boots onto a nearby table. "Put it right in the trunk and way you go or drive away the whole herd if you're that hungry."

Hollan said there is nothing unusual about his going straight to the consumer, cutting out the middlemen. "What we're doing is a form of marketing that has been in existence since the beginning of man-one man going up to another and buying the produce he needs," he said. "When God made men and bartering, He didn't see any particular need to create a third man to stand between them and state the prices."

The Diamond Cattle Co. has run advertisements in Dallas area newspapers that are direct: "Eliminate Middleman" "Enjoy steak for the price of hamburger! Eliminate the middleman completely. Buy direct from the ranch choice Texas corned beef. No free gifts, come-ons, gimmicks or price switching just a straight beef sale from cattlemen."

If the buyer doesn't want to carry off a live animal at 49 cents a pound on the hoof he may purchase a dressed carcass for 51 cents per pound or have the beef packaged and delivered for 56 cents per pound. All prices are based on "live weight" - the weight of the cow at the time it is sold, minus 4 per cent shrinkage.

The ads have brought some calls from the Dallas Better Business Bureau, which claims "live weight" is deceptive and misleading to the public.

"We are not retailers or packers," Hollan said. "The only way we could sell these cattle is 'live weight' because the last time we see them when they're going out the gates is with their skins on and their tails a-waggin'."

"We're not going to get rich selling this way. But at least we are not going to lose any money either. BBB "A-Fussin'."

"The better Business Bureau has been feudin' and a-fussin' with us about our supposedly misleading the public. But hell, we're stating like it is. Furthermore we explain to the buyer that there's no way he's going to get more than about 60 per cent meat from that 700 or 800 pound animal. We also tell him that he's going to pay for the whole carcass - the whole 700 or 800 pounds - and that he'll still be getting a good deal. The meat he'll put in his freezer, packaged and precut, will

What Do Jehovah Witness Believe?

Easter Seal Society Listing of Services

The Texas Easter Seal Society can provide the following services for handicapped persons who cannot afford to pay all or part of the costs involved and who are not eligible for help from any other resource--public or private.

- 1. Assistance in paying for physical, occupational, and speech therapy when it is prescribed by a medical doctor.
- 2. Pay for special diagnostic evaluation (such as orthopedic, audiological, language and psychological).
- 3. Purchase orthopedic equipment such as wheelchairs, walkers, crutches, braces, etc., when prescribed by a medical doctor. (There is a \$200 limit placed on artificial limbs. This \$200 is to be used as "seed money" and hopefully will be matched by local resources such as individuals, service clubs, sororities, foundations, etc.)
- 4. Help to defray transportation costs for treatment or evaluation when the family is unable to meet these costs. This is determined by paying 30c per gallon based on 10 miles per gallon, figured on a round trip basis or by purchasing round trip bus tickets.
- 5. Assist families and individuals to reach the right person or agency to obtain help. The Easter Seal Society of Texas cannot provide. People are often eligible for services from public or private agencies but do not know the person, eligibility requirements, or place to obtain the services needed. PERHAPS WE DO.

Ten Accidents In County In April

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated ten accidents on rural highways in Wheeler County during the month of April. These crashes resulted in one persons killed and five persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of 1973 shows a total of 58 accidents resulting in one person killed and 27 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety, Region No. 5, for April, 1973 shows a total of 544 accidents resulting in 24 persons killed and 283 persons injured as compared to April 1972 with 445 accidents resulting in 44 persons killed and 232 persons injured. This was 9 more accidents, 20 less fatalities and 51 more injuries in 1973 at the same period of the year.

The veteran officer reminds you that the accident rate has increased about 20% in the 60 counties of Region No. 5. We have more than seven million licensed drivers on Texas Highways. Summer vacation time is approaching and more people will be using the roads.
