WILDCATS CLAW MUSTANGS

The rain and the Canadian Wildcats went hand in hand last Friday night and together they spoiled the Mustangs homecoming. First the rain curtailed the pre-game activities and then the visiting Canadian Wildcats put the finishing touches with a 6-0 win.

Hoping to get back in the win column after suffering their first defeat, the Mustangs not only failed but saw a whitewash posted against them for the first time in many years.

Not all was dark for Wheeler however as the defensive unit held the Wildcats at bay except for the 45 yard drive following a Mustang fumble late in the third period.

When a team finds a back that can gain at all against the Mustangs, they seem to get the maximum out of that player and the Wildcats were no exception as Johnny Curtis was their workhorse and he gouged out 126 yards in 31 carries for his nights work.

A drenched field hampered both clubs and the game was a defensive battle except for a couple of threats by both clubs.

The Wildcats made a mild threat at the end of the first quarter as they drove to the Wheeler 21 after an intercepted pass but Gary Davis blocked a field goal attempt by Robinett and the half was scoreless with both clubs appearing that a break was needed to get them in scoring position. This break came for the Wildcats as a fumble by Rogers was recovered at the Mustang 45 shortly after

Claude Falls To Colts 34-0

The Jr. high Colts got their first win of the year last Thursday night and they did it in a big way as they laid it on the Claude Jr. High footballers to the tune of 34-0.

Playing before a good crowd at Nicholson Field, the Colts took the opening kickoff and drove 66 yards for a touchdown even though they were hampered by 25 yards in penalties on the drive. Rodney Weatherly got the TD on a 19 yard run.

The future Mustangs got on the scoreboard once more in the first half with Archie Trimble capping a 47 yard march with a 24 yard scamper around his right end. Weatherly ran the two points and the outmanned Claude team was down by 14 points at halftime.

The Colts tacked another 8 on the board in the third period with Trimble returning a punt 37 yards to paydirt. Jimmy Cole ran the extra points with 1:01 left in the quarter.

Claude gained nothing against the Colts and penalties hurt the local crew more than Claude.

Wheeler scored twice in the final eight minutes with Trimble scoring on another punt return - this one for 35 yards - and Gary Fischer getting the final Colt touchdown.

The Colts are idle this week and are preparing for the contest with McLean next week.

Silverton suffered their first defeat last week as Kress rolled over them and will also be trying to get back in the win column and it will be the Owls first district game also.

Fred Good saw limited duty last week and if he is able to play more against the Owls it will add punch to the Mustang offense. Coach Hill said that it was too early to tell how much Good would be able to play. "Silverton will be one of the biggest teams we will face this year but I think our kids will be ready for them. They did a pretty good job against Canadian but little things whipped us and we have been working to iron those things out this week," Coach Hill said.

The Mustangs defeated the Owls last year on their way to a tie for the championship.

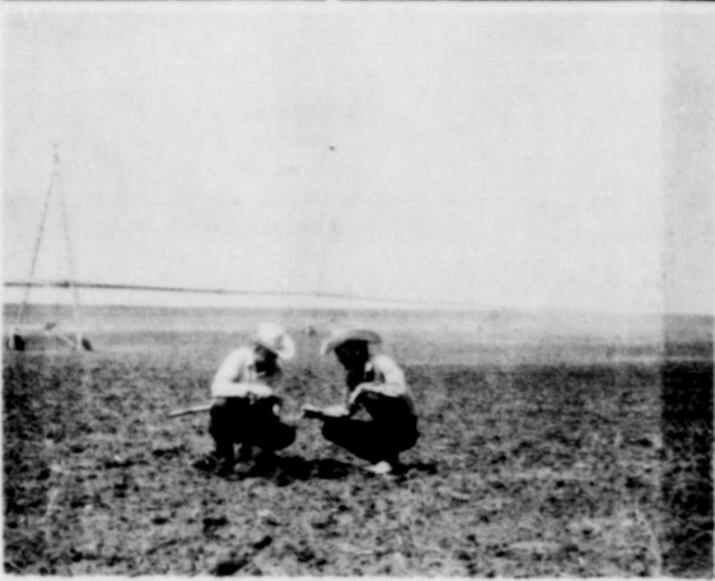

RECREATIONAL AREA DEVELOPMENT Personals . . .

Recreation in rural areas is on the upswing. Shorter work weeks are providing more leisure time for city dwellers and extra income for rural landowners.

Farmers and ranchers can supplement their farm income by developing their lands to provide recreation areas. There are several types of recreation developments and one or more can probably fit most farms. Vacation cabins or cottages, camping grounds, picnic areas, fishing waters, golf courses, hunting areas, shooting preserves and water sports are some examples of recreation for a rural area.

Some of these recreation facilities would require a large investment while others would not. A farmer or rancher would want to consider several things before entering into a recreation program.

One item to consider is the market or availability of people for recreation purposes. People who come a long distance will probably stay longer, but come a fewer number of times per year. Those that have a short drive will stay a shorter period, but usually will come more often. Secondly, investment should be considered. Vacation homes, golf courses and shooting preserves would require a heavy investment, while a hunting or fishing area might not require but very little money. A person's time should also be given consideration. Some types of recreation would be seasonal and require attention only during one season. Fishing, picnicking or hunting by the day would require a great deal

of time. Some people simply lease a recreation facility by the year to a group or club. This would demand a minimum of time and provide a fixed income.

The Soil Conservation Service provides technical assistance to owners and operators of private land in planning and establishing income producing outdoor recreation enterprises.

ing tests are made with various students and faculty members in the specially equipped car. An electric detonator which is mounted on the front bumper of the car, will fire yellow paint bullets to indicate the distance required to stop the car in an emergency.

The driver being tested will be signalled to stop by the report of the first shell. The second will be fired automatically when the brake is applied, and the third when the car halts. Distance between the spots of paint will then be measured to determine the reaction, braking and total stopping distances.

Tests will be limited to 20, 30, and 40 mile per hour speeds because of the danger of making emergency stops at higher speeds. Police officers will be used as drivers in the high speed tests.

As part of a program for safety on the highway, the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department presented this driving demonstration 196 times for 44,000 students during the 1966-67 School year. Over 750 programs have been given since 1957. The program is being brought to Wheeler under the sponsorship of Wheeler County Farm Bureau.

Every family should prepare--and rehearse--a careful plan for escape. Here are some pointers to follow:

1. Figure out at least two routes to the outside from every room in the house, especially bedrooms. Allow for blocking of stairways or hall by fire.
2. Particularly for nighttime fires, remember that closed bedroom doors will hold back flame and smoke and allow extra time for escape.
3. For upper floor escape, use any available porch and garage roofs, ladders, or trees as ways down to safety. Be sure exit windows work easily and especially that they are low and large enough to get through.
4. Pick an outside assembly point where the family will meet, and be sure everyone understands the rule "once out - stay out."
5. Know how to call your fire department and do this as quickly as the house is clear of people.
6. Always remember that it's people not possessions, which are of prime concern. Concentrate on getting everybody out of the house quickly; don't waste precious time trying to save valuables.

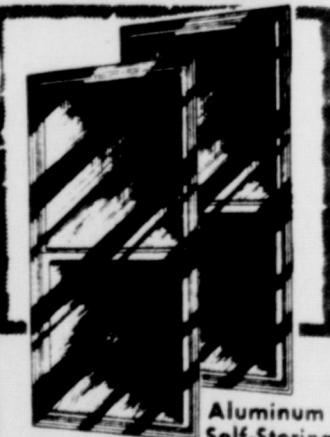

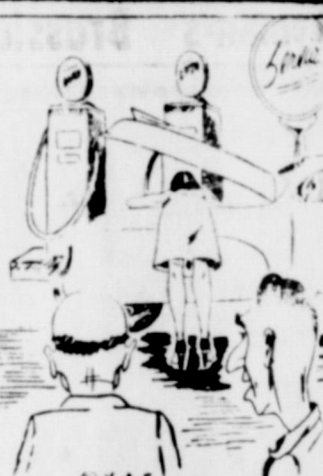

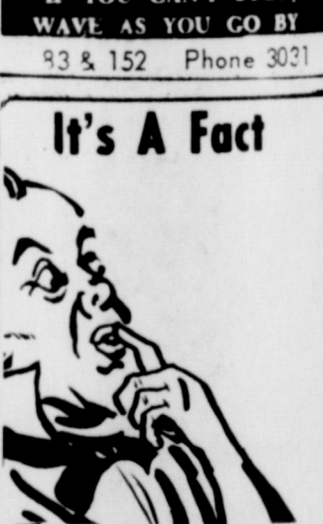

NATIONAL TESTS TO BE GIVEN

Wheeler, Allison, Mobeetie
and Briscoe students will
take the three hour National
Educational Development
Tests on Oct. 30, 31 and Nov.
1-2, according to Mrs. Mary
Tom Riley, Guidance Direc-
tor.

The NEDT batter, Mrs.
Riley said, "is a series of
tests in English, social stud-
ies, mathematics, natural
sciences and word usage
designed to measure each
student's ability to apply
basic learning skills rather
than his ability to memorize
facts.

We will use the test to
help students, parents and
teachers identify individual
strengths and weaknesses
in each student's education-
al development and in making
a realistic appraisal of his
educational and vocational
goals."

Published by Science Re-
search Associates, Inc., the
nation's largest commercial
publisher of standardized
tests, the NEDT. battery was
constructed under the direc-
tion of SRA's Test and Eval-
uation Division. It has been
administered to more than
five million students through-
out the country since it was
introduced in 1959.

Jr. Take PSAT Test
The PSAT (Preliminary
Scholastic Aptitude Test)
was given to all Juniors in
Allison, Briscoe, Mobeetie
and Wheeler High Schools,
October 9 and 10, 1967.

It is a two hour test meas-
uring the students' Verbal
and Mathematical abilities
and knowledge.

This test is designed to
be given in the Junior year
as a preliminary for the SAT
(Scholastic Aptitude Test)
which is the College Entrance
Examination Board test,
that so many more colleges
and universities are requiring
each year.

It is also an aid in pre-

this year are well above av-
erage. Fred Waters averaged
2800 pounds of maize on his
fields near Wheeler.

**On The Farm Demonstra-

farmers in making decisions
on their operations were

building committee. Folks

tion programs that would be

farmers.

Cattle: Prices on light
cattle aren't due to drop over
the winter. Farmers who have
excess feed could safely
carry lighter calves over and
get a good price for the feed
used.

Small Grain: The size of
next year's small grain crop
may well depend upon the
kind and amount of fertilizer
used at planting time.

The best method for deter-
mining the soil fertility is a
soil test. Test results provide
an index of the nitrogen,
phosphorus and potassium in

the soil and this in turn a
basis for the plant foods to
be added.

Currently soil moisture
conditions are good in the
county and proper fertili-
zation of small grains can play
an important part in turning
this moisture into forage and
grain. If the grain is to be
grazed, fertilization at plant-
ing time is especially impor-
tant.

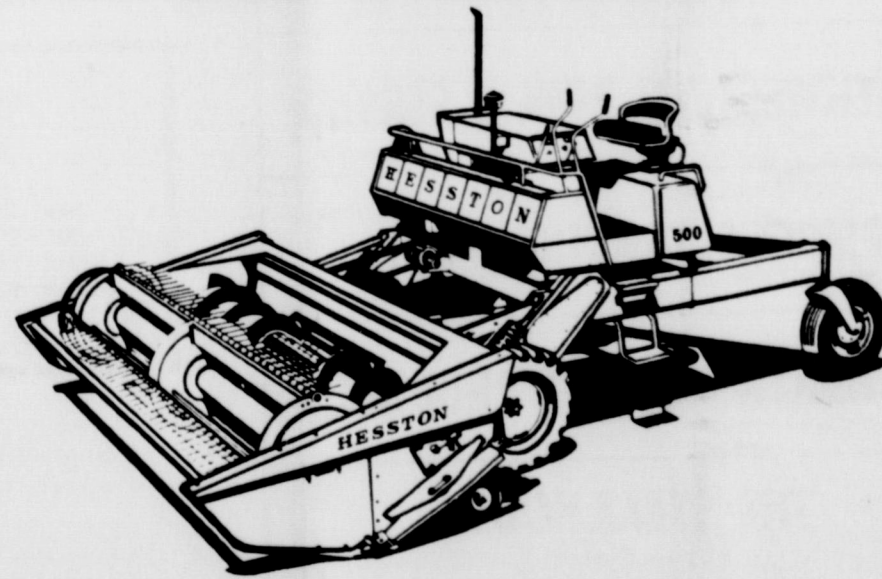

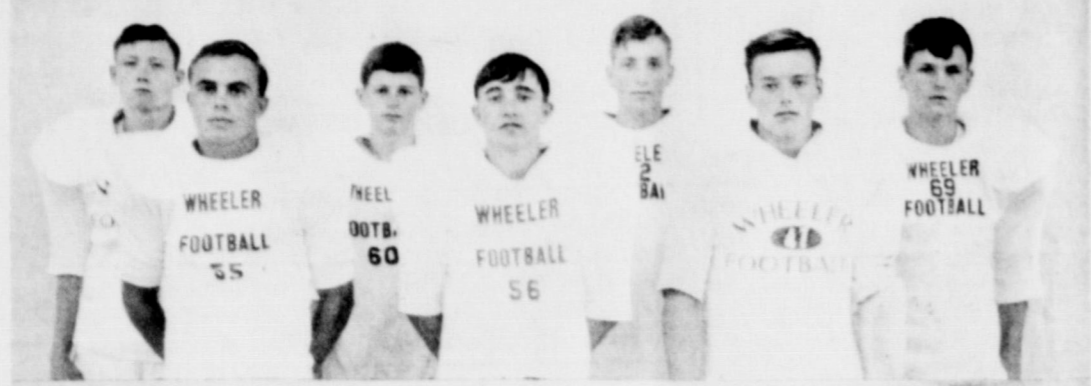
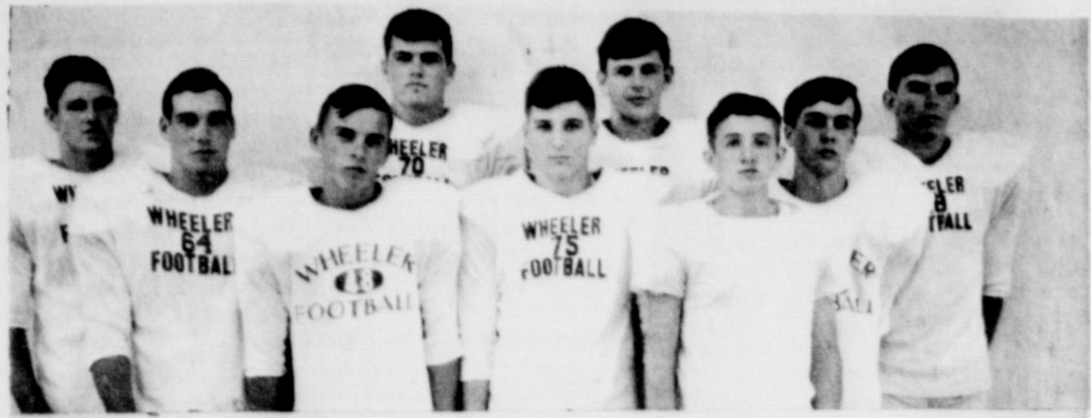
