## **PP&K** Contest Set for Saturday

Boys ages 8 thru 13 will again have a chance to show their skill with a football at the annual Punt, Pass and Kick contest set for Saturday, Oct. 14. The local Vanpool-Burton Ford and Golden Spread Motor Co. of Shamrock are co-sponsors of the Wheeler County contest. Young sters interested in participating in the contest are asked to report to El Paso Field at the Shamrock High School and register at 10 A.M.

County winners will travel to Amarillo Oct. 21 to compete with other county winners to determine the zone winners. This is the first year for the county winners to compete at Amarillo. In years past, the results were compared to determine winners.

Punt, Pass and Kick launched nationally in 1961 by Ford Dealers of America and the National Football League is a competition for boys 8 thru 13. Each boy competes against boys his own age in three football skills: punting, passing and place-kicking (using a kicking tee). There is no body contact, no special equipment needed.

Points are awarded for each foot the ball travels in the air. Points are deducted for each foot the ball lands at the left or right of a center line. (Measurements are made to the half-foot and half points awarded or deducted.)

Trophies will be awarded to the first three winners in each age group. Eighteen trophies will be awarded at the local contest. Upon registration each young man will receive a PP&K pin.

Recreation in rural areas is on the upswing. Shorter work weeks are providing more lei sure time for city dwellers and extra income for rural landowners.

Farmers and ranchers can supplement their farm income by developing their lands to provide recreation areas. There are several types of recreation developments and one or more can probably fit most farms. Vacation cab ins or cottages, camping grounds, picnic areas, fishing waters, golf courses, hunting areas, shooting preserves and water sports are some examples of recreation for a rural area.

Some of these recreation facilities would require a large investment while others would not. A farmer or rancher would want to consider several things before entering into a recreation pro-

One item to consider is the market or avalibility of people for recreation purposes. People who come a long di stance will probably stay longer, but come a few er number of times per year. Those that have a short drive will stay a shorter period, but usually will come more often. Secondly, investment should be considered. Vacation homes, golf courses and shooting preserves would require a heavy investment while a hunting or fishing area might not require but very little money. A persons time should also be given consideration. Some types of recreation would be seasonal and require attention only during one season. Fishing, picnicing or hunting by the day would require a great deal 3. I also commend you for

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




