They went off the diving board. We all enjoyed it and had a lot of fun, Roberta. The second group of beginners began classes Tuesday.

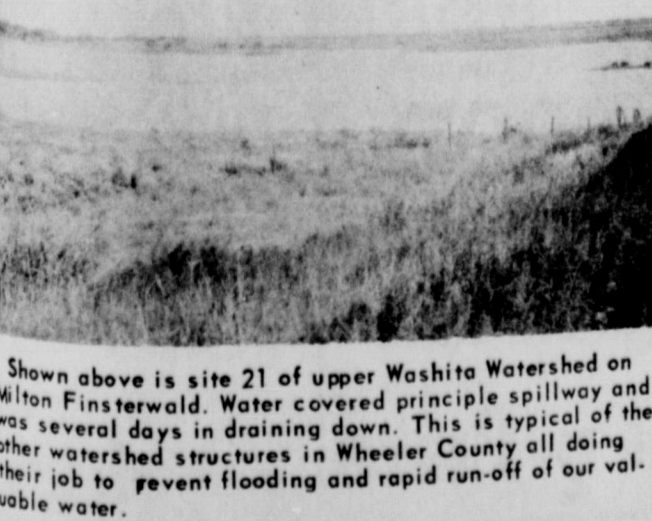
### C. of C.

Wheeler takes on its annual festive appearance Thursday afternoon when the local Riding Club kicks off the Annual Rodeo Celebration with a parade through town, Thursday. Trophies will be awarded riding clubs, wagon trains and commercial floats.

Six riding clubs have indicated that they will be present for the Wheeler parade. The number of riding clubs will be small due to the large number of rodeos in the area. Numerous covered wagons are scheduled to be in the parade. The Reydon Wagon Train will make their appearance along with six wagons from Pampa, Bus Walker's wagon and team and Quinton Jenkins and his Belgian horses.

Neil Schmidt will make his second appearance in Wheeler. Schmidt of Crawford, Oklahoma will ride his horses in the parade and will perform each night of the rodeo. Schmidt made his first appearance in Wheeler at the 4-H Junior Rodeo in June.

The Parade will take the same route as was taken last year. The parade will form at the vacant gin lot. The group will travel west to Main Street and turn South. At 10th street the parade will turn east and go to Parkview Hospital. The paraders will disperse after the pass in front of the hospital.

Following the traditional parade at 5:00 p.m., all roads will lead to the rodeo grounds where serving of the big barbecue begins at 7:00 P.M. John Hodges of Wheeler will prepare the Barbecue, which is being sponsored by the riding club and Chamber of Commerce.

Wheeler business people will serve the meal. Hundreds are expected here for the rodeo and related activities. Rodeo performances will be held at 9:00 p.m. Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 13-14-15.

### SIX EVENTS

Included in the rodeo events will be bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, calf roping, bull dogging, bull riding and ladies barrel race.

Contestants will compete in the regular events each night during the three day rodeo. Farmers Supply is rodeo headquarters. Entries close at 12 noon Thursday and persons interested in competing should contact Farmers Supply at 826-5281. Entry Fee for each event is \$15.00. Added prize money will be offered in each event of the Rodeo.

During the three day rodeo celebration, the Wheeler American Legion and Riding Club will hold a dance from 10:00 p.m. to 2:00 a.m. nightly at the Legion Hall. Playing for the dance will be Lou Hurt and the Western Swing Band of Amarillo.

Admission to the rodeo will be \$1.50 for adults and 75¢ for children. Remember the free Barbecue goes with each ticket purchased for the first night's rodeo performances.

### Mobeetie Bank Plans New Bldg.

J. T. Johnson, vice-president of the First State Bank of New Mobeetie, announced Tuesday plans for building a new bank and having it in operation within three months.

Johnson said an Amarillo architectural firm is drawing plans and bids will be opened within the month to build a modern new structure at the old bank site. The old foundation will be utilized as well as the old vault which was not damaged in the July 3 tornado which toppled the 38 year old brick building.

## ACROSS THE FENCE

Noah built an Ark in biblical times to escape the flood. Near daily thunder-showers this past week have put plenty of moisture in the ground and creeks and ponds are loaded. Though heavy crop damage occurred in the northwest part of the county, crops in the rest of the county weathered the storm.

We were out in the Mobbettie area last Wednesday looking at crop damage by hail and high winds. L.C. Powell had his maize crop beat in the ground and Dale Dyson's cotton was damaged heavily. Surprisingly enough, a few hundred yards up the road, Fat Horne's cotton and Dean Tipps milo was in good shape.

We believe Mr. Powell's milo will be O.K. and will not need replanting. However, Dale Dyson reported that he planned to plant milo on his damaged cotton acres.

Where Treflan was applied as a preplant for cotton, we wouldn't recommend replanting milo because there'll be damage.

I suppose that everytime anything is put into print, the risk is run that it may be misunderstood. This may have been the case week before last when we mentioned in 'Across the Fence' that a self propelled hay loader and stacker could cut the cost of picking up and stacking hay from 10c a bale to a little less than two cents.

What we meant to say was that several cents cost per bale could be saved by mechanizing the picking and stacking operation. By the way, Doane's Agricultural Report's 1967, Machinery Custom Rates Table mentions that 10c a bale to haul hay to the barn to be stored is a fair price quote. More than likely there will be increases instead of decreases in any custom charges that involve selling

considerable amounts of labor, according to most agricultural marketing specialists. We're pretty sure that no one has been looking for a two cents a bale price quote on the basis of last week's column. So, we meant to imply only that costs could be cut by mechanizing the haying operation and not to establish custom rates. We'll leave that to agricultural forecasters like Doan's and others.

This Friday, July 14 we'll be entering ten 4-H members in the District 4-H Horse Show at the Top O Texas Fair grounds in Pampa. The show, pitting the top county 4-H performers in barrels, poles and western pleasure, in the district will begin at 9 a.m. The members have been practicing for several weeks and according to Mrs. H.B. Freeman, 4-H adult leader, they'll be in top form Friday. If you want to see good horse show performance events, come out and see this one. If any of our members qualify, they'll enter the State 4-H Horse Show in Odessa, in August.

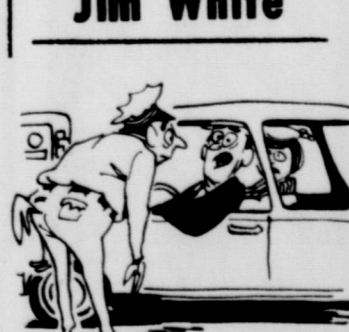

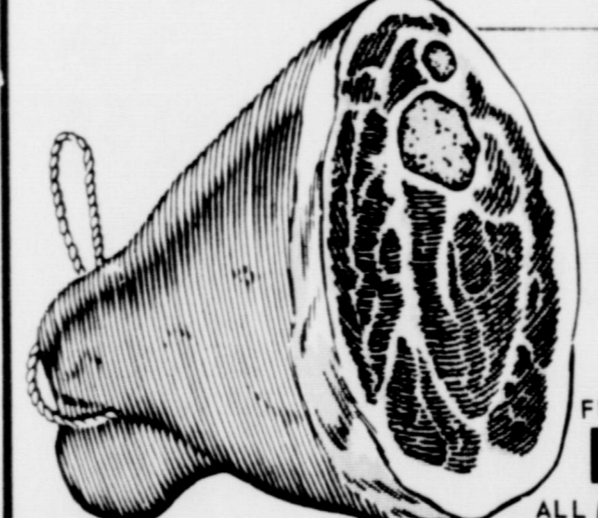

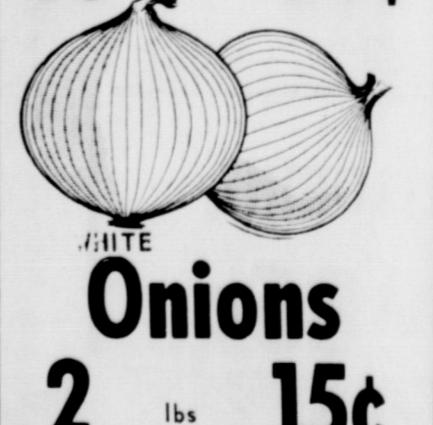
