ACCIDENT FATAL TO LOUISIANA MAN

A deer crossing Highway 83 at the north end of Sweetwater Creek, 4 miles north of Wheeler inadvertently caused the death of a Lake Charles, La., tractor driver Saturday morning. Clifton J. Fuselier was killed as he was crushed between a road grader belonging to the Highway Department and the truck which he had been driving.

At 4:30 a.m. Fuselier jack-knifed his truck as he dodged a deer. The truck loaded with helium came to rest with the trailer over the embankment on the west side of the road and the tractor in the west traffic lane.

The highway department was contacted to help get the truck back on the road. Reporting to the scene of the mishap were Ross Henson, driving the road grader,

and Glen Gaines in a highway truck. The truck was parked behind the tractor of the truck to warn south bound traffic and the motor grader hooked to the front of the truck.

At 5:45 a.m. a truck driven by Roger Dale Hickey, 24, of Clifton, Texas., was traveling north; he failed to see the warning lights and hit the grader. The collision pulled off the left front wheel of the truck loaded with 3 to 500 lb. calves. The cattle truck continued past the helium truck, clipped a tree on the east side of the road, struck the highway truck and went off the embankment on the west side of the road, parallel to the trailer of the other truck.

Clifton Fuselier was standing between the grader and the helium truck when the cattle truck struck the grader. Fuselier was reported dead on arrival at Parkview Hospital.

Local trucks were used to transfer the cattle from the wrecked truck. Ten head of cattle were killed when the top floor of the three level truck collapsed. Others were crippled.

Glen Gaines saw that the cattle truck was not going to stop for the jack-knifed truck, anticipating the accident, he ran west. As he cleared the barbed wire fence, the cattle truck was right behind him.

Roger Hickey, driver of the cattle truck suffered minor injuries, but did not require hospitalization. Jimmy Rogers, Jr., 28, of Lake Charles, a passenger



in the helium truck was treated and released at Parkview Hospital.

For the second Saturday in a row, Lloyd Anglin was called to help with a truck accident. Anglin, a house mover, has the only piece of equipment large enough to pull the trucks. Anglin's truck was required Saturday, Feb. 19, when a truck turned

on its side across Alan L. Bean Boulevard. Patrolman Wayne Pierce of Shamrock investigated the accident.

The Wheeler County Pig Show will be held Saturday morning, March 4th in the Wheeler City Building under the water-tower in Wheeler. Weighing of the livestock will begin at 7:00 a.m. on Saturday morning at the city building. Judging of the barrows and gilts will start at 10:00 a.m. The livestock auction of 4-H and FFA pigs will start at 3:00 p.m. on Saturday afternoon.

The annual Wheeler County Pig Show is sponsored each year by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce which contributes some \$100 in prize money to Wheeler County 4-H and FFA members showing stock. The Wheeler County Production Credit Association is sponsoring the Pig show trophies this year.

Charles Brown, President of the Chamber of Commerce, says, "We're looking forward to a very successful show this year. We hope our Wheeler County merchants and businessmen will come out and help support the youth of our community at the 3:00 p.m. sale." 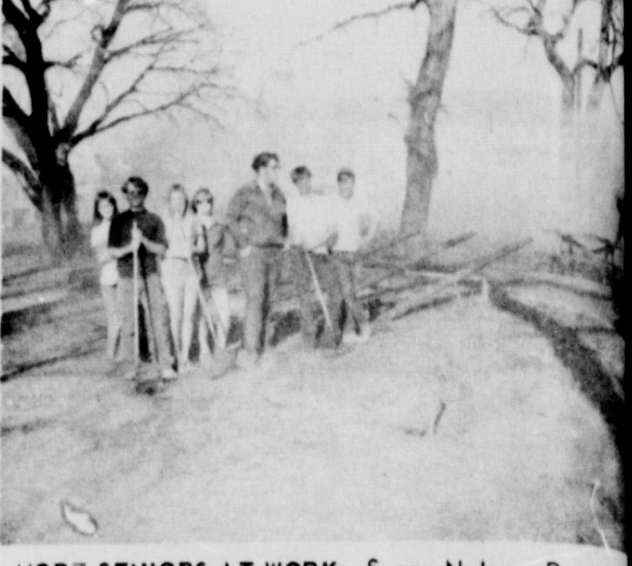

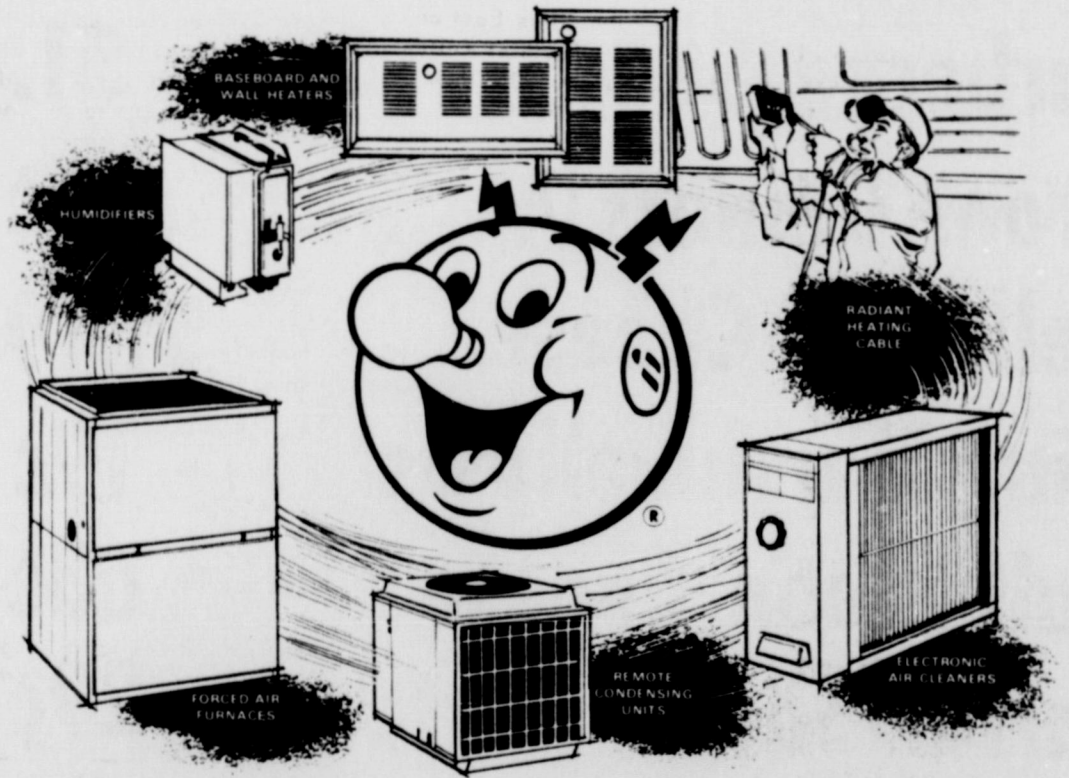

modern steer you'll see when you come out to encourage these boys and girls will be confusing to the old cowboys with lots of miles on him. Instead of a compact, short and blocky calf, the judge'll look for a long lean muscular steer with plenty of daylight

Feeding a calf or pig and exhibiting him is quite an accomplishment for some of these boys and girls. For example, if the floor price was set at 25¢ and the buyer bid 35¢, the buyer would only pay the boy or girl the difference. Assuming the pig weighed 200 pounds, a 10¢ premium would mean the buyer's bid would mean he would pay the exhibitor a twenty dollar bonus more than the pig is worth.

Many times we are conditioned to judge all things by profit or loss. It's not commercially feasible for 4-H and FFA members to feed one head and make money. Realistically then, it's not the money lost or made or feeding the pig that's important. It's the boy or girl that's important! The character and feeling of pride of ownership and the responsibility of caring for the animal can't be bought with money. In fact, we all realize at one time or another that many of the best things can't be bought, but have to be worked for. So, encouraging a

boy or girl by paying him a premium for learning those good old American virtues really makes sense when you think about it. Saturday afternoon at 3:00 p.m. is your chance to give a helping hand to a young person.

"Get the jump" on spring by buying "started" summer-flowering annuals, Common flowering bedding plants such as petunias, calendulas, snapdragons and larkspur will tolerate light frosts, but grow slowly when temperatures are low. However, this is helpful to root systems, but marigolds, zinnias, celosia, portulaca and certain other flowers cannot be planted outside until danger of frost has passed. Strong plants can be purchased during early spring saving half the time required to grow them in the flower bed.

Plants that are started indoors can be set in the garden when they are almost ready to flower and the danger of a killing frost is past.

With the warm weather, apricots, peaches, and plums appear to be ready for an early start. To control the insects that ruin peaches and plums, start spraying in the pink bud stage. One spray won't do it.

Pick up a spray schedule at our office and stick to it for best results. The first spray should be applied at Petal fall. That's when 75% of the petals have fallen. The second spray should be applied 10 days later. Three more sprays should be applied, each at two week intervals. Liquid sevin is a good choice. See if you can find a commercial spray with that ingredient.

If all this suggested spraying is making bird lovers nervous, don't forget that the population of robins and many other bird species has actually increased in recent years. (It really has!)
Of course, DDT is not suggested as a spray anymore. But, we understand that workers in DDT plants, exposed daily for 19 years to at 200 times more than the general public, averaged less cancer and sired more children than the U.S. average.

PAT'S PARAGRAPHS

I'm enjoying these past few "spring-like" days. How about you?

Several Wheeler County residents and I had an opportunity to attend a conference in Amarillo on Thursday, Feb. 24th. The conference was about family financial planning. Wills, estates, insurance and trusts were among the things discussed. I brought back information (pamphlets) on the subjects of estates and wills, which you may be interested in. Just come by my office and pick this up, or write and we'll send you the information.

Mr. N.L. Sechrist, Judge George Hefley, both of Wheeler, Mrs. J.P. Meek of Briscoe, Mr. Ray White of Shamrock and I attended this conference.

We are all set for the lingerie sewing course. As you read this we will have begun. The sessions are in Shamrock on Wed., Thurs., and Friday (March 1, 2 and 3) from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. in the upstairs meeting room of the F&M Bank.

In Wheeler, the sessions are being held on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday (Feb. 29, March 2 and 3rd) from 7:30 - 9:30 p.m. in the high school homemaking department. In Briscoe and Allison area, the course is being held in the Briscoe homemaking department from 4:30-6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday (March 1, 2 and 3rd)

Having trouble with your income tax?

Save yourself a lot of frustration and money too, by getting organized now for this time next year.

Mrs. Doris Myers, home management specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension service, suggested keeping a few simple tax records of tax deductible items.

"Sometimes a notebook serves a better purpose and is easier to keep than a printed record book," the specialist said. "Simply divide the book into categories of spending or money outlay for those items that are tax-deductible when expenses are itemized."

"You never know at the beginning of the year just how much some of these expenses will be."

Mrs. Myers said that medical expenses aren't certain until you get sick. "Then it may be too late to be able to record all of them. Start the year off by keeping up with all of them by setting aside a portion of your book to record them. Separate medicines and drugs from other medical expenses. Since these expenses are handled separately on the tax form, it saves time to keep them separate from the beginning."

At the end of the year, the columns may be added quickly to determine if medicines and drugs total more than one per cent of a person's adjusted gross income.

One-half of premiums on health insurance, up to a limit of \$150 may be deducted, even though medical expenses don't exceed three per cent of income and can't be claimed, the specialist said.

"Cost of travel to get medical or dental care may be counted as a medical expense, subject to the three percent limitation", Mrs. Myers added. "If you use your car, you may claim either out-of-pocket expenses or six cents a mile. If you claim mileage, it's a good idea to keep speedometer readings as proof of travel."

Another portion of a record book may be set up to record contributions to religious and charitable organizations. As these contributions are made throughout the year, record

the date, the organization and the amount. Save receipts and canceled checks to further substantiate deductions.

"Costs of travel as a volunteer for church or charity are deductible," she said. "Using your car, you may claim either out-of-pocket expenses or six cents a mile. Again, speedometer readings would be advisable to have in your records."

Interest paid on home mortgage, charge accounts, installment contracts and loans for personal and household use are also deductible items that should be recorded. Early in 1971 the Internal Revenue Service ruled that all finance charges in credit cards and charge accounts are deductible as interest when deductions are itemized.

Receipts showing amounts of interest paid should be kept for proof of payment.

When deductions are itemized, taxes on personal property, sales taxes and gasoline taxes are deductible.

"By keeping a simple record it's very easy to total these deductions and determine where you stand," Mrs. Myers said.
