PAT'S PARAGRAPHS

Patricia Palmer, CHDA is good to know that is out or nearly out. You're looking forward to summer of fun (in betwixt of hard work!)—The annual Mother's Day event, held Tuesday, was enjoyed by home association club women and their guests. The Wheeler Dealers Home Demonstration did a marvelous job with arrangements and decorations. The Briscoe and Shamrock Three Leaf clubs also did a good job in planning an enjoyable program.

Sure have seen a lot of people out working in their

yards. I guess that's why yards are looking so pretty! Our office has a lot of gardening information contained in pamphlets. We received some information recently concerning trees, shrubs, and annuals that are tough enough to withstand heat, drought, and pollution. Dr. William Welch, landscape horticultural specialist with the extension service, says that Texans may consider any of a number of so-called "sturdy 30".

For gardeners that weren't blessed with the proverbial "green thumb", success can probably be found with cannas. They grow quickly from tubers. New dwarf varieties are especially appropriate for container culture and provide brilliant splashes of color during hot weather. The large banana like leaves are also lovely.

Dr. Welch says that Shasta daisies have strong perennial roots that enable them to withstand periods of drought and suffering better than most plants. The flowers are one of the best for cutting.

Two vines that will grow practically anywhere are moonflowers and morning glories. Both grow and flower quickly from seed. Grape myrtle and callery pears

are long lived and easily grown in less than ideal conditions. According to Welch, the Mexican flowering plum is an excellent small native Texas tree that is seldom used. In addition to the abundance of fragrant white flowers in early spring, the small plums make an excellent jelly.

There are just a few of the plants Dr. Welch mentions. If you're interested in reading this information, let me know.

There's much more to serving eggs than poaching, scrambling and frying and unless you're on a restricted prescribed diet, you're probably looking for different ways to serve eggs.

Egg prices vary by size for the same grade. In com-

paring prices here's a hint that may help you. If there's less than a 10¢ price spread per dozen eggs between one size and the next smaller size in the same grade, you will get more for your money by buying the larger size.

This Western Sandwich is an especially interesting way to use eggs (if you're a sandwich eater!).

- 1 tsp. butter of bacon fat
- 1 tbsp. finely chopped green pepper
- 1 tbsp. finely chopped onion
- 2 slices buttered bread or toast
- 2 tbsps. chopped cooked ham
- 1 egg
- 2 tbsps. milk

1/8 tsp. salt
dash of pepper

In a small skillet heat butter moderately hot. Blend other ingredients and pour into skillet. Cook, stirring mixture to cook evenly. While still moist, shape into flat pattie to fit bread. Place between bread slices. Serve hot. Makes one sandwich.
