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
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

Looks like Johnson grass has got a running sta t on the 1972 Wheeler County cotton crop. A good weed control program brought about by incorporating chemicals such as Treflan or Planauin before planting are helpful in preventing establishment of new seedlings. However, we find Johnsongrass already established in our fields. Dampon and MSMA or MsMa may be applied to emerged Johnson grass plants before the cotton crop is planted. Better kill can be gotten when the temperature is 70° or better. MSMA or DsMa are sold under such trade names as Ansar, Daconate, Weed-E-Rad, and Bruno. They are highly effective on established Johnson grass and yet safe on cotton. Don't use after the cotton begins to bloom.

We sent some of a windmill and some tumbleweeds just to make sure they know what part of the country Darville was from. There's a lot of conservation work going on in Wheeler County. If you don't think so, just take a leisurely drive out into the country and see for yourself.

Have you considered Geraniums? Geraniums fit into nearly every garden situation, and they may be just what you have been looking for to add character and color to your flower garden from spring through fall.

You can grow them in full sun or in partially shaded areas. In fact flower color is usually better when grown in light shade. Geranium colors range from snow white, pink and salmon, to bright red, lending themselves to a wide variety of color arrangements.

Use only healthy plants when placing geraniums in your garden. The new varieties produced from seed rather than cuttings are your best assurance of healthy plants. These can be obtained from almost any reputable nursery or garden center as started plants in 2½ inch pots. For quick effect use larger plants. Unless you have the facilities for doing so, it is better to allow the professional platsman grow

the plants from seed. You will find them easy to grow, too. Space plants about 12 to 15 inches apart, if you want them in beds, or group in clusters of three or four to accent other flower beds. Geraniums are also excellent container plants for window boxes, patientubs and hanging baskets. Plants

Regardless of how ridiculous the small plants may appear when spaced this far apart, resist the temptation to plant them closer

Plant in good, well-drained soils, add coarse sphagnum peat moss and horticultural perlite to loosen it up. The best soil mix is equal parts garden soil, peat and perlite.

Water thoroughly after planting. Regular waterings should be heavy enough to soak the soil six inches deep. Avoid sprinkling plant foliage. A layer of mulch will hold down soil temperatures, preserve moisture, and control weeds.

The two most common insects attacking geraniums are white fly and red spider mite. At the first sign of either of these pests use a good insecticide such as Diazinon or Meta-Systox-R for control. It is best to alternate insefticides to prevent the development of resistance by the red spider

You can avoid botrytis leaf and blossom blight disease by scaking the soil. when watering rather than wetting plants. If disease becomes a problem, spray with zineb or captan. Remove all infested leaves and blossoms and burn them. Repeat sprays weekly, if necessary.

To encourage new flower buds and attractive plants, remove dried and faded flower clusters regularly. Snip them off with hand pruners. Pulling the dead clusters sometimes damages
