MUSTANGS SEND TWO IN TRACK TO REGIONAL

Although finishing sixth in the District 2-A Track and Field competition last week in Panhandle, the Wheeler Mustangs qualified two members of their team to the Regional meet to be held in Lubbock this weekend.

James Vise was nosed out for first at the tape in the mile run but qualified for the trip to Lubbock with his best time of the year in the event. James made the four trips around the oval in 4:51.9.

Gary Fischer is the other Mustang to qualify and he did it by finishing second to Louis Davis of Memphis in the 330 yard intermediate hurdles. Gary also ran a seasons best in posting a 42.8 clocking.

In addition to placing second in the intermediates, Fischer placed third in the 120 yard high hurdles and

pole vault and came in fifth in the long jump.

Don Chapman and Rodney Weatherly garnered the other individual points in the meet for the Mustangs. Chapman got a sixth in pole vault and ran a strong third in the mile. Weatherly pulled down the fifth spot in the shot put.

Both the sprint and mile relay teams got points for the Mustangs. The sprint relay was comprised of Kent Ware, Rodney Weatherly, Don Chapman and Lewis Britt.

Running on the mile relay, which ran a 3:52, was Kent Ware, Rodney Weatherly, Lewis Britt and Gary Fischer.

Other members of the track team that competed in Panhandle were: Walter Simmons, Tom McIlhany, Frank Martin and Raymond Martin.

Simmons was entered in the freshman division and placed third in the long jump and fourth in the mile.

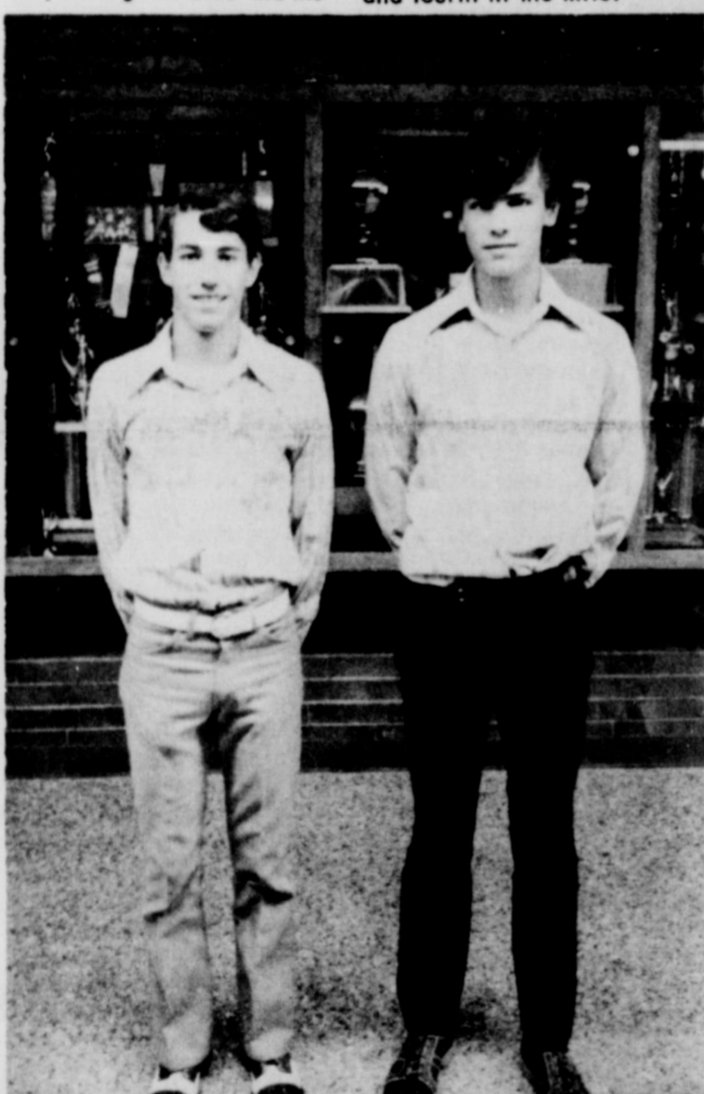
More than 2,800 degree candidates in the eight colleges and schools are to be honored in the commencement program.

FHA State Conv. Is In Ft. Worth

"We Can If I Will" is the theme of the 1972 state meeting of the Texas Assoc. of Future Homemakers of America to be held at the Convention Center in Ft. Worth, April 21-22, 1972.

More than 5,000 members and advisors representing 65,000 members in 1,600 chapters throughout the state are expected to attend. Members are home-making students in junior and senior high schools. Homemaking teachers serve as advisors.

Representatives of the Wheeler chapter will be Gayle Helton who will receive the State Degree of Achievement, the highest award of the organization; Crystal Bradstreet, who earned the trip to Fort Worth as high point girl in the Wheeler Chapter; and Mrs. Ruth Wiley, Advisor. Crystal will also stand in for Carla Marshall, who earned the State Degree of Achievement but will not be able to attend the State meeting. Carla is a member of the One Act Play Cast and will be competing at the regional meeting in Lubbock.

Keynote speaker will be Don Williams, Pepperdine University, Los Angeles, California. Mr. Williams will challenge the group to accept their responsibilities and to work together for the betterment of our world.

A State Chorus composed of 125 Future Homemakers chosen by their areas will be featured. This group will be under the direction of Dr. Scotty Gray, Professor of Music, Southwestern Theological Seminary, Fort Worth.

LET'S PUT THE RECORD STRAIGHT

Dolph Briscoe's opponents for governor are becoming frantic, grasping at anything to question his integrity. When did it become censurable to request something that was needed and lawful? Don't we follow that course in petitioning for our Farm-to-Market roads?

On Thursday, April 13, State Senators Mauzy and Moore, of Dallas and Bryan, charged that 13.1 miles of FM road in Dimmit County served only a ranch head quarters of Dolph Briscoe. They acknowledge their unfamiliarity with the road and the circumstances leading to its construction and, further, that no laws were violated--only that Mr. Briscoe may have exerted undue influence on state and county officials to use taxpayers money for private gain.

The following acts are called to your attention: Dolph Briscoe and fellow ranchers did petition the commissioners court for FM 2688; but, likewise, according to J.C. Dingwell, now head of the engineering department of the Texas State Highway System, did the National Aeronautics and Space Administration -- the latter because the first satellite tracking station in the U.S. is on the road, and heavy equipment had trouble moving until the road was paved.

Further, the road is used by ten or more ranching families, by a lone doctor who serves the entire area, as a school bus route, and has a travel count of about 100 vehicles a day, as against an average count of 40 to 50 cars per day in a sparsely settled area. Too, the road ties into U.S. Highway 83 and doesn't dead-end at Dolph Briscoe's ranch house, as intimated by the Senators.

We will leave to your good judgment, the voters, as to whether or not this road was needed, as to whether or not anything unethical or corrupt was involved. We think not. A vote of confidence in Dolph Briscoe will not be misplaced.

Mephibosheth To Appear

Mephibosheth, a young group of contemporary musicians, will be appearing at Wheeler on the Courthouse Lawn, Saturday, April 22 at 7:30 p.m. On Sunday night, April 23 at 7:30 p.m. they will be at the Youth Quake and on Tuesday thru Friday they will be back on the courthouse lawn at 7:30 p.m. each evening.

Their music style ranges from rock to acoustic to gospel sounds. The name comes from the Old Testament of the Bible, meaning literally "destroying shame". Mephibosheth formed 14 months ago and has travelled extensively the past 8 months. They began their full-time work with a 7-week tour of U.S. Military Bases in Europe, travelling through France, Belgium, Luxembourg, and Germany. This trip was completely on their own, supported by donations from interested people at home. Positive results were so great among servicemen, especially with the drug and racial problems, that the U.S. Army has invited Mephibosheth back, expenses paid by them, for an extended stay.

After returning to Texas, the group began a series of concerts in the Dallas-Fort Worth Area including nearly 50 Junior High and High School Programs this school year. A 9-week meeting in Fort Worth resulted in over 1,200 youth responding to a call to "give up drugs and follow Jesus". After the meeting concluded, YOUTH-QUAKE Youth Center in 1401 W. Berry in Fort Worth was established to continue the work with hundreds of teens weekly.

The message of the group is a genuine love between people and a peace in the heart of a man. This can only come, they believe, through Jesus Christ. "Drugs, sex, alcohol, and other similar things are only crutches to escape the hassels of life. Jesus fills the emptiness and helps solve inner problems. This removes the need for crutches," says Mephibosheth director, Jim Forrest. The group has personally talked with over 5,000 youth the past 8 months with about 75% of these testifying that they ceased the use of drugs.

Mephibosheth sings for Public Schools, Colleges, Churches, concerts in Shopping Malls (as in Stone Plaza Mall and One Main Place in Dallas recently), and planned Outdoor Concerts in the parks and lakes this Summer.

This group has just recently completed High School assemblies in Shamrock and Spearman and a joint assembly with Briscoe, Allison and Mobeetie.

Milk, egg, ice cream--soak in cold water, rub paste of soap or detergent into stain, launder as usual.
Paint--soak in turpentine or paint remover; rub paste of soap or detergent into stain, launder as usual.
Remember that stains are easier to remove when they are fresh. Try to treat them promptly. The longer stains are left on fabrics, the more difficult they are to remove. In some instances, spots will remain regardless of the procedure used.

Roasting bags and wraps. If you've used roasting bags or wraps you are familiar with them, or you may have seen them advertised. Most cooks like to use them. According to an article I read through, there have been some reports on accidents involving these products.

After much research by the manufacturers of these bags and wraps, and by the Good Housekeeping Institute it was found that in a few cases a condition called "bumping" could take place. "Bumping" occurs when a liquid, trapped under enough oil or melted fat, becomes

superheated but cannot boil. The liquid finally bursts through the oil layer with some force. This condition is a rare development, so it doesn't happen very often.

To prevent the problem, manufacturers are now recommending in their instructions that you scatter a tablespoon of flour into the plastic bag or onto the wrap or use the seasoning mix that comes with some of the bags. This flour (or seasoning) prevents the "bumping".

Just follow the directions that come with the roasting bag or wraps. You should be satisfied with your results.

Here's the recipe used by Mary Puryear of Briscoe, in the district food show. She won alternate to State in the Bread and Cereal Group with it. I can read this recipe and almost smell the bread cooking!

It's really good!
Sweet Potato Bread
3½ cups enriched all purpose flour
½ tsp. baking powder
4 tsp. pie spice
2/3 cup chopped pecans
4 eggs
1 cup cooking oil
1½ tsp. salt
2 tsp. soda
1½ cups granulated sugar
2/3 cup chopped dates
1½ cups brown sugar, packed
2/3 cup water
2 cups cooked mashed sweet potatoes

Sift together the dry ingredients with the exception of brown sugar. Add dates and pecans. In another bowl, beat eggs, add brown sugar, sweet potatoes, cooking oil and water. Mix well. Add flour mixture. Beat till well mixed. Pour into well-greased bundt pan. Bake in 300° oven for 1 hour and 30 min.

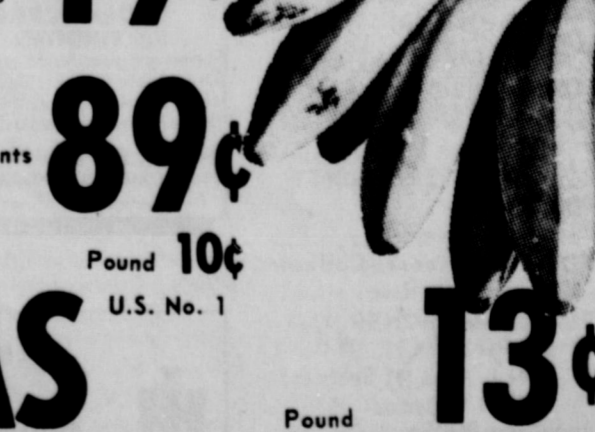

Across the Fence

We may lose our first alfalfa cutting. Alfalfa weevils, in the larvae form, are quite widespread across the county. Carroll Langley at Mobeetie sprayed last week and got fair results. A silver-gray to whitish cast coupled with skeletonized leaves on the alfalfa plants are clues to the insect's presence. Once they infest a field, they usually cause damage season after season. Cutting the first crop clean and close as early as possible while the plants are in the bud stage, deprives the larvae of food and shelter and exposes them to the sun. The exposure is usually fatal.

Screwworms are on the increase. Folks are saying this is the worst outbreak since the eradication program began. Since we may see some cases here before summer's out, ranchers need to take necessary precautions after dehorning and other operations. We have sample vials for sending suspected screwworm larvae cases to the extension laboratory for identification. Please report all suspected cases.

Vaughn Lister at Keltan says that it takes total commitment when calving heifers. We know an old cowboy that doesn't go for this total

commitment bit and sees his calves every few days. He usually sees a few dead calves and maybe a dead heifer or two on each trip to the pasture. He says that he

can think of no crime so serious as to warrant being sentenced to calving out 100 heifers. It sort of looks like he is worried more about the sentence than the crime he is committing by not giving more attention to his calving operation.

Outrage at the check-out counter, who gets all the money for beef and how family copes with food these days. Life Magazine quoting an economist at the University of Illinois at Chicago, shows who makes the money on a 1,000 pound animal dressed out to a pound hunk of beef:

Rancher - \$66
 Feedlot - \$1.55
 Supermarket - \$112
 Trucker - \$2 to \$3
 Packing house - none
 We don't think it's exactly fair to figure this thing the way the economist from the University of Illinois at Chicago figured it. The "Price Crisis" is more than dollars and cents is argued. To us, you've got to consider how much time is involved by each participant in the transaction. For example, takes the rancher over a week to produce the 700 pound calf for which he makes a \$66 net profit. In other words he has taken care of the calf and calf for a year for \$35 a month! This looks like a bargain to me. On the other hand, a large supermarket in our county told us they were able to sell a 620 pound carcass in 3 days. At this rate, the supermarket makes \$5 an hour on the beef, a nutshell, the farmer if he makes \$5.50 a month on a calf (raw products) and the supermarket is making \$5 an hour for the finished product. The consumer can draw his own conclusion. The way we figure it, the rancher considering he has 100 head, is working for \$2.70 an hour on a 40 hour week basis. This figures out to a \$4400 net income. The average farmer in our county had \$78,728 invested in his farm. Considering the investment for a 100 head of cattle and the land and equipment involved we figure a farmer is getting 3-4% return on his investment. We hope the supermarket, the trucker, the feedlot and the packing house are getting a better return than this, if they're not then the consumer is getting the real bargain!

If you water, water right! Due to the lack of spring rains, most homeowners are getting into the regular routine of watering their lawns and gardens. The key to watering for lush, green growth all summer is to base your watering schedule on the type of soil.
 If the lawn has a tight, heavy or compact soil, water movement will be slow. So waterings at a slow rate for a long period will be necessary to allow the water to move through the soil and to prevent run-off.
 For lighter, sandy soils through water moves rapidly light waterings at more frequent intervals are usually needed. With heavy watering the water will move through the soil and beyond the root zone of plants.
 Therefore, it's important to know the rate at which the soil in your yard or garden can take up moisture, a moisture penetration can be checked with a two-foot long steel rod about 3/8 to 1/2 inch in diameter. Bend one end of the rod to form a short handle. The rod should be easily pushed to the two foot depth if the lawn has been watered properly.
 Deep watering will encourage deeper penetration of plant roots. Roots will move through moist soil easily and will grow better. Thus the results will be more healthy to growth.
 Keep lawn and garden soils moist to the proper depth and you can expect dividends throughout the growing season. How to water to that depth depends on the soil type. You must be the judge.
