### WELLINGTON SKYROCKETS DUMP WHEELER MUSTANGS 26-6

Using a fumble recovery on the fourth play of the game to get a quick touchdown, the Wellington Skyrockets then turned Marvin Roland loose on the Mustangs and when it was all over the Mustangs had fallen from the unbeaten ranks with a thud to the tune of 26-6.

The visiting Mustangs were never able to recover from the first Wellington score and it looked like the night was going to be much longer as the Skyrockets added another TD in the first quarter.

Wheeler came back in the last half to play an even terms with the host Skyrockets but the 20 point advantage that Wellington held at the half was the ballgame.

Jim Lindsey fell on a fumble by Donald Rives at the Mustang 35 and it took the Skyrockets just four plays to forge into the lead. Roland got 16 big yards around his left end on the second play for a first down at the Wheeler 19. A running play picked up one more than Kenny Brown got the first of his two completions when he found Andy Henard behind the Mustang defenders and he

the pass for the TD. Roland added two points as he skirted the Mustangs left flank.

This touchdown seemed to take the spark out of the Mustangs and they could get nothing going the next two times they had the ball. Forced to punt from their own 26 late in the first quarter, the Mustangs found themselves with their backs to the wall once more. Brown returned the punt from the Wellington 38 to the Mustang 45 and from this point lightning struck Wheeler and it was in the form of Marvin Roland. Roland turned the corner on the Mustangs right side and was stopped 24 yards later.

Switching to the other side, Allred got 20 more for a first down on the one. Roland got the touchdown with a one yard jolt at his left tackle.

The quarter ended with the Mustangs hitting midfield for the first time as Rives got five at left end. Wheeler could penetrate no further than the 43 and were forced into a kicking situation as Henard broke through and three Bobby Ware for a loss back to the Wheeler 42.

Wellington put the ball in play from their 28 and eleven plays were needed for the Skyrockets with the two big plays in the drive being a 21 yard gallop by Lowe and a pass completion from Brown to Brock good for 21 more. Roland put the ball on the Wheeler one yard line with a 12 yard run and from that point Brown sneaked it over.

It looked like a new club came on the field for the Mustangs in the second half and throwing the Skyrockets for three straight losses after the kickoff the Mustangs had good field position following a punt to the Wellington 31. Dave Britt got 13 yards in four wacks and Donald Rives got 4 more in a couple of tries and the Mustangs had the ball at the Wellington 14. With third and five, misfortune hit Wheeler as the snap was fumbled and Ware recovered and pitched to Rogers who was knocked down for a four yard loss. A field goal attempt by Fred Goad was no good and Goad saved the Mustangs for the time being as he knocked the Wellington runner out of bounds at the Wheeler 23 with the runback of the field goal try.

Moving to the 43, the Skyrockets faked a punt on fourth down but came up 10 yards shy of the first and Wheeler had the ball. Allred intercepted a pass on the first play and ran it back to the Wheeler 49. Roland got five and Allred got the other 44 when he broke clear over his left guard and outran the Mustangs to the end zone. The kick was no good with 2:26 to play in the third quarter.

Midway of the final period, James Tucker recovered a fumble by Allred at the Skyrocket 22 and with lady luck lending a helping hand, the Mustangs scored in five plays. Rives got 1 and Rogers picked up 5 more before Rives got the first down at the 11. Rogers squirmed for a yard to the 10. Britt broke up the middle to the five and fumbled but the ball ended up in the end zone with Tucker draped over it and the Mustangs averted a shutout.

Wellington moved the ball to the Wheeler seven yard line but gave the pigskin up at that point. A sticky Mustang defense made the going rough but Roland kept the drive going with two big third down plays. For his nights work, Roland picked up 180 yards on 27 carries.

### NICHOLSON FIELD WILL BE INVADED BY WILDCATS FRI.

The Canadian Wildcats will furnish the opposition for the Wheeler Mustangs this Friday night in the annual homecoming game and an added attraction will be the crowning of the football queen prior to game time.

The Mustangs will be playing on their home soil at Nicholson Field for the 8 P.M. encounter for the first time after being on the road for four contests.

Canadian will bring a strong ball club to face the Mustangs and one that has the same record as the local crew. The Wildcats were defeated by Booker in their first game but a number of the Canadian players were down with the flu at the time. Since that time, Lefors, Follett and Lega have fallen victims to the Wildcats and nothing would please them more than to add Wheeler to that list. The Mustangs saw their undefeated record go by the boards last week when they

fell to the Wellington Skyrockets 26-6. "We played one of our poorest games last week and we will have to do a 100% better this week because Canadian has been pointing for us for a whole year," Coach Hill said.

This will be the final contest prior to the starting of the district race next week. The offensive lineup will be the same as started last week with Richard Sechrist and Dwight Ford at ends; Mike Holt and Ronald Rives at the tackle spots; James Tucker and Donnie Manning, guards and Dale Rogers at center. Bobby Ware will again man the quarterback slot with Donald Rives and Frankie Rogers at the halfback positions and Dave Britt at fullback.

A capacity crowd is expected for the 8:00 kickoff and a few reserved seats are still available and can be purchased on a game basis at the game.

### GRAIN PROGRAM DISCUSSION

Open meetings to discuss the feed grain situation and program alternatives for the 1968 Feed Grain Program were announced today by Mr. Ralph T. Price, Chairman, Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee. The meetings starting at 10:00 A.M. will be held in Vernon, Texas on October 5, 1967, at the Wilbarger Memorial Auditorium and in San Antonio on Oct. 6 at the Sheraton Morat Inn, 1400 Austin Highway.

Leaders and representatives of farm organizations, commodity producer groups and trade groups interested in feed grain are being invited to come and present their views. Anyone who is interested in the feed grain outlook and program is welcome to attend.

The chairman explained that the meetings are two of a series being held in major feed grain states to provide farmers and other interested people an opportunity to express their views and recommendations on the feed grain program for the 1968 crop year.

Representatives of the Secretary of Agriculture will attend each meeting to discuss the feed grain situation

review the various provisions of the feed grain legislation and outline program alternatives for the 1968 crop.

Actually, the situation facing grain producers face this coming marketing year is a new one. Whereas the feed grain carryover in 1961 was 84.7 million tons—about twice as much as needed to provide reasonable protection against adverse weather—the carryover stocks as of October 1, 1967 for 1967 - 68 marketing year now are expected to be in the neighborhood of 37 million tons. With all 1967 feed grain production indicated at 175.4 million tons (including the biggest corn crop in history) the total supply should be about 7 percent larger than one year ago. Expressed another way, on Oct. 1, 1968, with anticipated feeding, industrial and exports there will be a carryover of all feed grains of 40 to 45 million tons. This is considered by many to be an adequate carryover to the following season but not an excessive one.

The problem at this time, therefore, is no longer one of surplus. Neither is it one of scarcity; rather it is a

problem of maintaining a safe supply in relation to demand while insuring reasonable returns to producers. The Department wants the advice of farm leaders familiar with the program and its purpose before making decisions for the 1968 crop year.

Matters to be discussed at the meetings will include the feed grain supply-demand situation, the size of the 1968 production needed and the average to be diverted to conserving use in order to achieve that desired level of production under average weather conditions, the various levels at which the diversion percentage, diversion payment rate, the price support payment rate and the loan rate might be established for 1968, whether soybeans might again be substituted for feed grains, and other miscellaneous problems and decisions of importance.

Anyone who is not able to attend the meetings in person but who wishes to make a recommendation may submit his ideas in writing to the Secretary of Agriculture as soon as possible, but not later than October 10.

All recommendations will be given careful study by the Department. Various phases of the 1968 Feed Grain Program will be announced soon, possibly in late October.

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## PROCLAMATION

BY THE

## Governor of the State of Texas

43-1210

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:

BE IT KNOWN THAT I, John Connally, Governor of the State of Texas, do hereby order a Special Election to be held throughout the State of Texas on November 11, 1967, and notice is hereby given to the people as required by law. The County Judge of each county is directed to cause said election to be held on such date in each precinct in the county in the manner required by law.

Said SPECIAL ELECTION IS ORDERED for the purpose of adopting or rejecting the following Constitutional Amendments submitted by the 60th Legislature of Texas at its Regular Session in 1967.

The constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund.

The constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services or public health services.

The amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Sec 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law.

The Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties, providing that the county shall pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed.

The amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks.

The constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position, prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state, and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted.

Maybe it wasn't all fun, it was hot windy and dirty some of the time while the road ways were being cleaned, and it would have been more fun to have gone home and watched TV than to have

worked on the school yard, but believe all will agree it was worth it.

Oh yes, almost forgot, there was a very unsightly dump just at the edge of Briscoe and this was cleaned up partly due to some 4-H members constant reminding others of the unsightly mess! This, with the approximate 20 miles of road way cleaned, truly made our community a more pleasant place to live.

Lessons Learned! I doubt if any of these young people will ever again throw paper cups, bottle or any other trash out of car and bus windows along the roads, for one thing its too much trouble and work to clean up.

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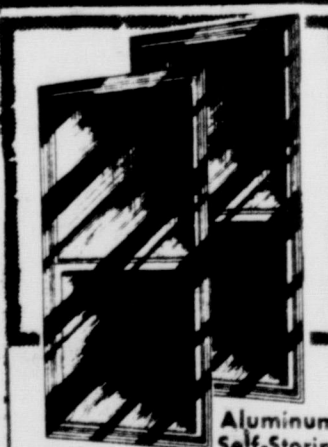

little over 8 million bales expected to be harvested in the United States. This size of this year's crop, we understand, has prompted USDA to decide on a bigger cotton crop next year. Boasting of price supports and doing away with mandatory 12 1/2 percent diversion might be the solution they choose. Some maize is coming to town now. Yields are above average. We feel late planted maize that was planted after cotton hauled out might have a hard time heading before frost.

**ROSES:** Roses in Wheeler County sometimes show signs

of iron deficiency—leaves turn yellow, but the veins remain green. Chelated iron or iron sulfate sprayed on the foliage will give a quick 'green up' but soil applications will give a more lasting effect.

**SOIL TEST:** A year like this, where we've had plenty of rain, tends to make plants pull available nutrients out of the soil in addition to carry over plant food that's been added but, wasn't used because enough moisture wasn't available to dissolve it the year before. That means maize and cotton will suffer next year for plant food. Take a soil test now to see what fertilizer you should add. We have the soil test bags at the extension office in Wheeler. DON'T GUESS, SOIL TEST.

## WHEELER COUNTY 4-H REPORT

A look at 4-H club work in Wheeler County during the past five years shows a lot of work being done by county youth. There have been between 8 and 10 clubs over the county each year with a total enrollment of between one and two hundred. 4-H club members, adult leaders and county agents have worked hard to develop a well-rounded 4-H club program in the county.

Delegates from each club along with adult leaders and the county agents make up the county 4-H council. This body is the nerve center of the county 4-H program and plays a very important role in county 4-H events.

Some of the major activities of the council include co-sponsoring the annual county 4-H rodeo; planning and directing either a county camp or county fun day each year; and planning sponsoring the county awards banquet each year. The council has co-sponsored the 4-H rodeo for nearly fifteen years. This is the only fund raising activity of the council and the proceeds are used to cover the expenses of the county 4-H events and trips. At the county camp or fun day, 4-H members attending enjoy planned recreation as well as educational group sessions. Between 50 and 150 4-H members and leaders enjoy the event each year.

As a special project one year, the council sponsored the erecting of a flag pole with base and 4-H emblem for the county court house lawn. This took lots of time and planning, but Wheeler County 4-H members enjoy sponsoring such activities. A new project of the council this year was the planning and putting up of an educational booth at the Tri-state fair in Amarillo. This was the first time for such a booth sponsored by the council at the fair and each one that helped had to work real hard. The theme of the booth was "On Target with 4-H Projects."

Although 4-H Club activities require lots of work, there is still plenty of time for recreation. Wheeler County 4-H members discovered this fact this year when they planned a recreation night. At this event, the 4-H members get a chance to meet other county 4-H members and at the same time enjoy folk games and other recreation. The recreation night has been very successful thus far with high attendance and good participation.

National 4-H club week is observed each year in the county through the erecting of 4-H booths in local store windows. These booths are of an educational nature and help to tell everyone about 4-H club work. County 4-H members have also made tapes on a county radio station which are played during national 4-H week.

The individual clubs have also achieved very much through local or community projects. Two outstanding ones have been the conducting of safety campaigns throughout the community as well as community beautification. One community in the county has been named state winner in community beautification this year.

A very outstanding group of 4-H club members in Wheeler County is the Wheeler County 4-H Texans. This group has been in existence for around 15 years and the members have drilled in rodeos over the state of Texas

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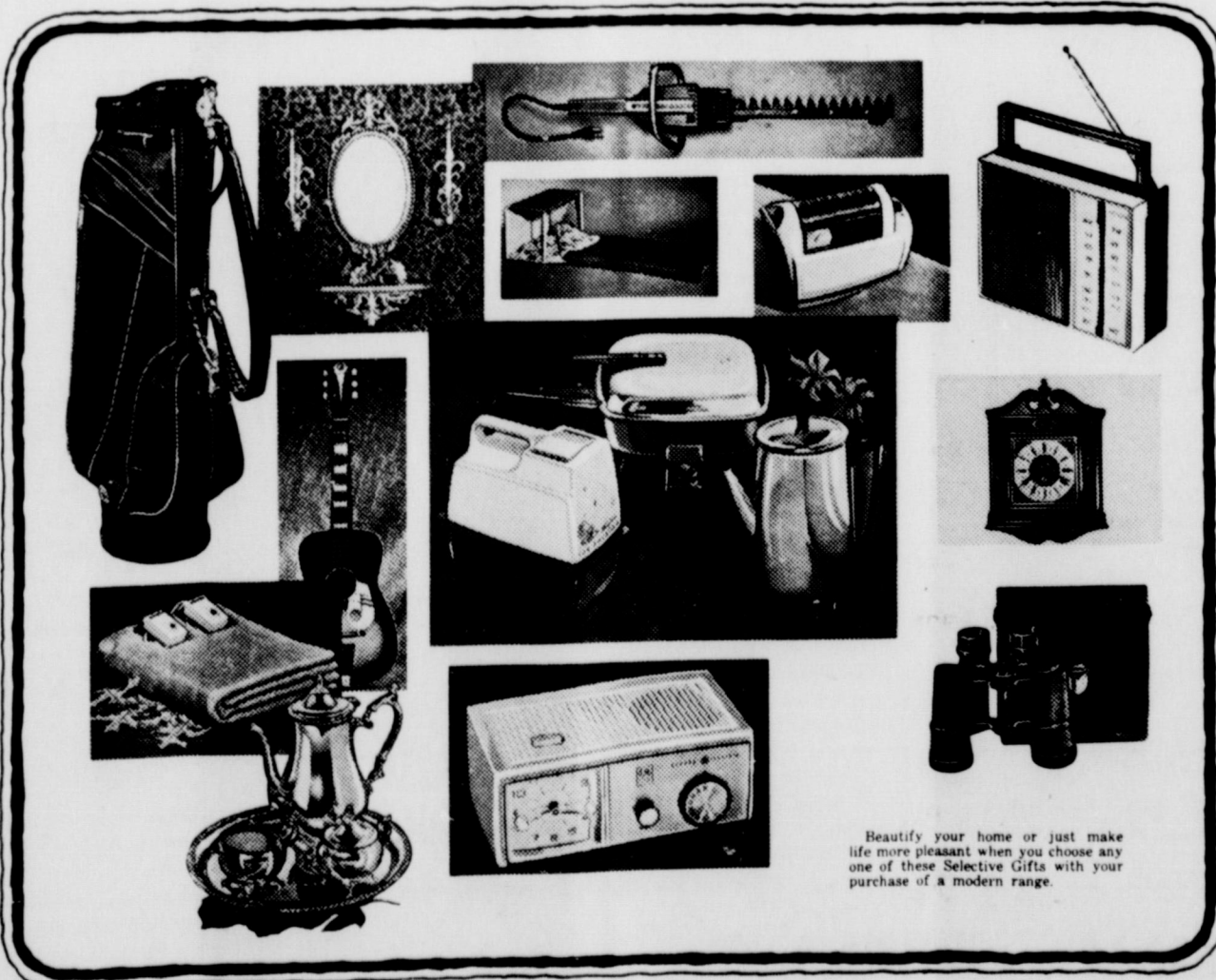
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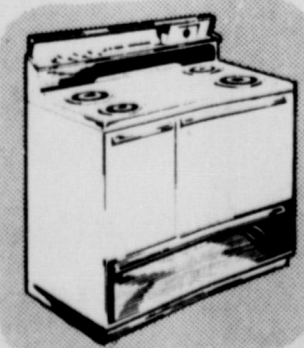

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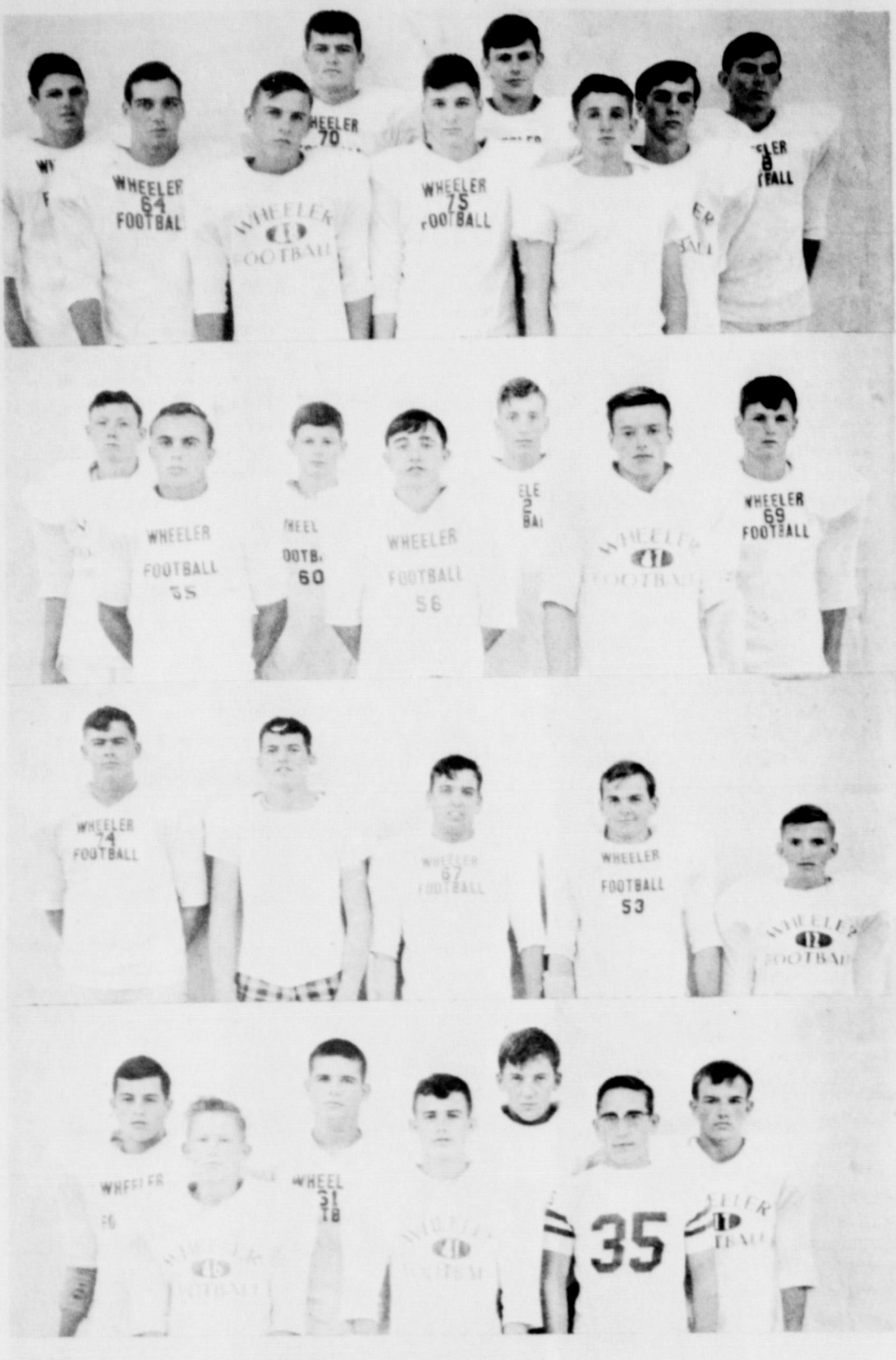
