The meetings starting at 10:00 A.M. will beheld in Vernon, Texas on October 5, 1967, at the Wilbarger Memorial Auditoriam at the Sheraton Morot Inn,

1400 Austin Highway. Leaders and representatives of farm organizations, commodity producer groups and trade groups interested in feed grain are being invited to come and present their views. Anyone who is interested in the feed grain outlook and program is welcome

to attend. The chairman explained that the meetings are two of a series being held in major feed grain states to provide farmers and other interested people an opportunity to express their views and recommendations on the feed grain program for the 1968 crop

Representatives of the Secretary of Agriculture will attend each meeting to discuss the feed grain situation

Open meetings to discuss review the various provisions of the feed grain legislation andoutline program alternatives for the 1968 crop.

Actually, the situation feed grain producers face this new one. Whereas the feed grain carryover in 1961 was 84.7 million tons -- about twice as much as needed to provide reasonable protection against adverse weather--the and in San Antonio on Oct. 6 carryover stocks as of October 1, 1967 for 1967 - 68 marketing year now are expected to be in the neighborhood of 37 million tons. With all 1967 feed grain production indicated at 175.4 million tons (including the biggest corn crop in history) the total supply should be about 7 percent larger than one year ago. Expressed another way, on Oct. 1, 1968, with anticipated feeding, industrial and exports there will be a carryover of all feed grains of 40 to 45 million tons. This is considered by many to be an adequate carryover to the following season but not an excessive one.

> The problem at this time, therefore, is no longer one of surplus. Neither is it one of scarcity; rather it is a

Said SPECIAL ELECTION IS ORDERED for the purpose of adopting or rejecting the following Constitutional Amendments submitted by the 60th Legislature of Texas at its Regular Session in 1967:

The constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund.

The constitutional amendment to permit municipalites, other political subdivisions and state-supported en tities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services or public health services.

The amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam. which amendment would amend Sec 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law.

The Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed.

The amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State

The constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted.

SOIL TEST: A year like this, where we've had plenty of rain, tends to make plants pull available nutrients out of the soil in addition to carry overplant food that's been added but, wasn't used because enough moisture wasn't available to dissolve it the year before. That means maize and cotton will suffer next year for plant food. Take a soil test now to see what fertilizer you should add. We have the soil test bags at the extension office in Wheeler. DON'T

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
