## **'LEFT OVER' TURKEY**

By Brenda Williams, CHDA What a horrible feeling it is to be too full. But we never remember that until after our Thanksgiving dinner. Are you tired of eating Turkey?

Do you still have Turkey to eat? Try spicing it up with this recipe. Turkey Tetrazzini (served 12 people) 2 lb. spaghetti, uncooked 4 cup chopped onions 2 clove garlic 1 T. butter 2 cans mushroom soup cup water

2 lb. shredded cheese 1 lb. diced cooked turkey 1/8 c. chopped pimento Cook spaghetti in boiling salted water until just tender but not soft. drain. Cook onion and garlic in butter until tender. Blend in soup and heat until cheese is melted.

half of cheese. Cook over low to get the grandchildren for stirring occasionally. Fold in turkey and pimento. Put spaghetti into greased baking pans and pour turkey mixture over it. Sprinkle on re-

maining cheese. Bake in 450 degree oven until sauce bubbles and browns.

### A New Look At Conservation

Ever since man has tilled the soil, he has had a management problem. All this time terraces, or some similar structures, have had a place in this management. Terraces are sometimes necessary to control soil erosion and to conserve water. they learned to advance safely For many years the use of conventional terraces has been practiced. They are

good for control of soil erosion, but they are sometimes rather inconvient to work. In the last few years engineers have developed a new type of terrace that is a great improvement over the conventional ones. This new type of terrace is called a parrallel terrace. These terraces, because they are parallel to each other will do away with most of the point rows and odd areas between the terroces. Because of the amount of land leveling done between the terraces they will also greatly improve water di stribution and eventially improve production. In some cases farmers will sow the terrace itself in small grain or sorghums and row crop the interval between the terroces. This practice makes the farming of the system even easier. In many cases in order to obtain the best system of parallel terraces it will be necessary to install waterways. Vegetated waterways are tailored to direct water into a low lying area or water course without erosion. The waterway itself should be designed to size and shape you. according to the drainage area and the rate of slope involved. If at all possible water should be blocked out of waterways until vegetation is well established. If irrigation is available this will greatly speed up the establishment of a vegetated waterway. With the establishment of waterways, a much better system of parallel terraces can be ontained. It makes it possible to vary the grade and with this method of construction, more terraces can be made parallel. This will cut down the number ofpoint rows even more. These two practices, parallel terraces and waterways, work hand in hand to make the control of soil erosion and moisture conservation much easier. Anyone desiring information on the application of parallel terraces or waterways may contact the technicians of the Soil Conservation Service that assist the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District. Cost share on these and other practices may be obtained through ACP or through the Great Plains Conservation program.





UBLIC NOTICE OF THE REQUIREMENT FOR RECORDATION AND LIMITA-TION OF CERTAIN CLAIMS OF WATER RIGHTS.

Notice is here given as required by Section 4 of the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 (Article 7542a, Vernon's Civil Statutes) that all claims of ri-tict Church in Wheel parian water rights, all claims under Article 7500a, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, to impound, divert or use public waters for other than domestic and livestock purposes for which no permit has been issued, all claims of water rights under the Irrigation Acts of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water Engineers in accordance with the Irrigation Act of 1913, as amended, and all other claims of water rights other than c'aims under permits and certi-fied filings, must be recorded with the Texas Water Rights Commission. Section 4 does not apply to use of water for do-mestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined by Commission Rules. On or before September 1.

1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement set-ting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid un-der existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, com-menced or completed the con-struction of works designed to apply a greater output of apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn state-ment is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies. Instructions and forms for recording claims may be obtain-ed without cost from the Texas Water Rights Commission, P. O. Box 12396, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.


