A total of 125 people gathered to show their appreciation to Dr. Larry Barbour for the time spent and the sleep lost serving as Wheeler's physician. The banquet in Dr. Barbour's honor was sponsored by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce; it was held Tuesday evening, June 6 in the school cafeteria.

Without this connecting link, along with all else that it takes, I doubt that without a doctor or doctors and medical facilities any industry would consider coming here."

"Latest figures of the Texas Medical Association show that of the 254 counties in the state 22 don't have a single physician to call their own. Some counties suffer a moderate to acute shortage of medical care, while others have but a single doctor."

Dr. Barbour graduated from the University of Texas Medical School in Galveston, Texas in 1963. He interned in Greeley, Colorado in 1964. He practiced in Wheeler 1965-66 and from September 1968 to the present time.

"Dr. Barbour has had a total of 1135 hospital patients at Parkview. This would average one hospitalization for each citizen of Wheeler," stated Brown.

Since coming to Wheeler, Dr. Barbour has delivered 64 babies, treated 2753 emergencies in the emergency room, ordered 36,500 laboratory procedures and examined 170 couples for premarital examinations since January, 1970.

Dr. and Mrs. Barbour were presented a gift from the Chamber. The gift, a hanging lamp, will be proudly displayed in their new home at 717 S. Stanley St.

When summer comes, out- door cooking becomes the way we like to prepare food. Things taste so good cooked outside. We think of grilling

steaks, hamburgers, chicken and other meats. Have you thought of fixing veteg thought of fixing vegetables outdoors too? Fresh potatoes, carrots, whole young squash, small beets and young sweet corn rate as top choice for cooking on a grill.

Frozen or canned vegetables such as peas and snap beans also make good selections for cooking on the grill or over hot coles. Simply divide into individual portions, season with salt and pepper, plus a little butter or margarine and wrap tightly in foil. Cook 10 to 15 minutes.

Grilled corn is good with any charcoal grilled meat. Strip corn husks down to the end of the cob but don't tear off. Remove silks then drop the corn in salted water to cover for about 30 minutes. Drain thoroughly, brush with

softened butter or margarine and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Wrap two strips of bacon around each ear and bring husks up around the corn. Wrap each in several thicknesses of aluminum foil and cook or charcoal for 10 minutes, turning once.

I haven't tried this yet, but it does sound good. Pre- pare an individual whole meal on the grill by combining

ground beef, carrots, pot- atoes, onions and seasonings. Butter the center of a square sheet of heavy-duty aluminum foil. Add layers of raw-thin- sliced potatoes, carrots and onion. Season with salt and pepper and top with a season- ed ground beef patty. Seal the foil t, make a tight pack- age and cook over hot coals for 10 minutes. Turn and cook 10 minutes longer.
