

The stockman searching for low-cost feed may find it in his pasturelands, provided he has kept them free from weeds.

Pastures don't produce as much feed per acre as do the intensively tilled fields producing grain.

But, because pastures do not require the input of labor and machinery as do other crops, they can yield high quality feed at low price.

For every pound of weeds that grows in a pasture, a pound or more of good forage is chocked out.

Herbicides are a vailable to control many broad-leafed weeds infesting pastures. In most cases they are cheaper and more effective than mach inical meathods. Proper management of livestock to prevent them from grazing pastures too close also helps in controlling weeds.

The herbicides 2, 4-D; 2, 4, 5-T; dicamba and silvex have label of clearance for use in pastures. Use of the materials, as listed on their labels, will meet the requirements established by the Environmental Protection

2, 4, 5-T and 2, 4-D can be obtained as water soluble amine, oil soluble amine and low volatile ester formulations. Dicamba is usually available in the amine formulation.


We caution users to expect some desired plants to be affected by the treatments. Seedlings of forage grasses and clovers can be injured or killed when 2, 4, 5-T, dicamba or silvex is used. The amount of injury varies according to the time of spraying. The more tender the susceptible plant,

the more severe the injury. Small amounts of herbicides are capable of damaging or killing susceptible plants such as alfalfa. clovers, cotton, grapes, oaks, flowers and ornamentals.

For pastures infested with annual broomweed, cone flower, dock, eastern bitterweed, horse mint, pigweed. cocklebur, ragweed, poorjoe, mustards or any of many weeds the right amount of 2, 4-D at the right time will settle tye matter, Brush and weeds can also be controlled with 2, 4, 5-T.



on Skates

Roller skating on the sidewalk, six-year-old Teddy was hit by a delivery truck backing out of a driveway. In short order, Teddy's parents aimed a damage suit at the trucking company.



At the trial, they noted that pedestrians on sidewalks had the right of way over motor vehicles. "Maybe so," conceded the company. "But this boy was not really a 'pedestrian' at all. He

was a roller skater." However, the court upheld Teddy's claim. The judge said: While a pedestrian is ordinarily one who travels on foot, the mere circumstance that he has attached to his feet roller skates, or walks on stilts, or uses crutches, does not clothe him with any other character than

that of a pedestrian." Local traffic laws often grant special rights to pedestrians over motorists. In most cases, as in this one, courts have given the word "pedestrian" a broad mean-

But this works both ways. The status of pedestrian may involve duties as well as rights. Thus: A woman climbed down from a trolley car and started jaywalking toward an opposite corner. ruck and injured by a passing taxicab, she later sued the cab company for damages. When the company pointed to an ordinance against jaywalking by pe-

destrians, the woman replied: "Until I reached the sidewalk I was still a passenger, not a pedestrian. Therefore, the ordinance against jaywalking did not

apply to me." However, the court turned down her excuse. The judge said her status changed from passenger to pedestrian at the moment

she got off the trolley. What is your status if you have car trouble on the road and have to use your feet? In one case, a man was run down while walking behind his stalled car to set out warning flares on the highway. When he sued, he was blamed by the other driver for not walking on the left side of the roadlike any other pedestrian.

But the court ruled that, at least in these circumstances, he could not fairly be classified as a pedestrian. The court said he was simply a motorist having an emergency.
